Illiteracy Crisis Facing Black America

Nearly two out of every three Black children in the fourth grade tested as barely being able to read last year. This was the lowest level of any racial group."

Many of these students might have been able to recognize words, but had difficulty comprehending what it was they read.

We've been told that in at least two states, corrections officials calculate how many prison calls they'll need based on the proportion of children who read poorly in elementary school."

Some are saying this is Black America's most pressing issue of this new, young millennium. They are fearful it may result in me creation of a permanent Black underclass.

There was a saying we had in Oakland," recalls Fannie Haughton of Los Angeles. "You can't drop your child off in kindergarten and pick them up in the 12th grade. I had to tell parents: 'We're going to do this together."





Ausman really likes.

Besides easy transferability and account control, Ausman is considering 529s because they allow her to pay for all kinds of schools and related expenses at qualified institutions nationwide and some abroad.

"One child may want to go to a state school, while another could opt for the private college in Iowa where his dad and I went. Our youngest may decide carpentry is for her and attend vocational school. I like the 529 plan's flexibility to accommodate so many choices."

Another thing Ausman likes is the investment option that matches the child's age.

"The 529 plan has an agebased investment option that starts aggressive and becomes more conservative as the child ages," she says, "With the agebased option. I feel more comfortable knowing that as we near the time we'll need the money, the account will have become more conservative, reducing our investment risk."

But the benefit that earns an A+ from Ausman is the 529's extraordinary tax advantages.

"If I put the kids' savings in 529 accounts, the earnings grow tax-free and the withdrawals will be federal tax-free beginning in 2002. That's too good to pass



REWARD OFFERED FOR INFORMATION STOLEN ARTIFACTS

AUSTIN, Texas - The FBI, Bureau of Indian Affairs and University of Texas (UT) police are investigating the theft of 24 near-perfect Caddoan vessels from the Texas Archeological

Research Laboratory (TARL) in Austin. The artifacts are invaluable to archeologists because of the information they provide on the ancient inhabitants of Texas and adjacent states. UT archeologists collected many of the artifacts, used primarily in association with Caddoan Indian burials in the late 1930s in an effort to salvage information on Texas Native American ancestors before the sites were destroyed by looters or other destruction.

The theft took place in late July and TARL officials are now offering a \$5,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible. Racism Means Never Having to Say You're Sorry

What The Constitution Demands of Secretary of State Colin Powell

(This commentary is running in lieu of Eddic P. Richardson's regular column.)

Under the Constitution, the President of the United States determines U.S. foreign policy. The Secretary of State appointed by the President with the vice and consent of the Senate, is the President's foreign affairs adviser. The Secretary carries out the President's foreign policies through the State Department and the Foreign Service the United States. In addition, the Secretary of State retains domestic responsibilities that Congress entrusted to the State Department in 1789. These include the custody of the Great seal of the United States, the preparation of certain presidential proclamations, the publication of treaties and international acts as well as the official record of the foreign relations of the United States, and the custody of certain original treaties and international agreements.

Along with 1) serving as the President principal adviser (i.e. the main man when it comes to conducts negotiations relating to U.S. foreign-affair) 3) grams and issues passports to American citizens to foreign consuls in the Unites States, 4) advises the President on the appointment of U.S. Ambassadors, minister, consul, and the other diplomatic representatives, 5) advises the President regarding the acceptance, recall, and dismissal of the representatives of foreign governments, 6) personally participates in or directs U.S. representatives to international conferences, organizations⁴ and agencies. And, although there are 10 more of the 16 important daties of a Secretary of State, we can stop right there at number six to discuss Gen. Colin Powell's outright refusal to head the U.S. Delegation to tan international conference on racism in Durban South Africa.

Gen. Colin Powell, the nation's first Black Sec. of State was conspicuously absent. Surely, when a descendent of African slaves became the third most powerful person, in the most powerful nation in the known, civilized universe, Black faces in the world's most oppressed and depressed places glowed with renewed hope that there were brighter days ahead. Especially for dark people on "The Dark Continent."

However when it was announced that Powell, nor America didn't even want to discuss racism; not to mention do anything to alleviate it, that hope diminished somewhat. May Robinson, who is serving as secretary-general of the conference and former president of Ireland, reminded the Associated Press, "The United States has a huge store of good practice, of experience, of problems to bring to the table and can have a huge influence on the discussions and the output at the World Conference."

President George W. Bush Jr. countered however "We will have no representative there so long as they pick on Israel if they use the forum as away to isolate our friend and strong ally, we will not participate." Conversely, every person of color believe that Powell, his chief advisor on foreign policy should have related the importance of America (that had stayed away from the conferences in Geneva in 1978 and 1983, in support of Israel), attending a conference on the world's racism. Woebeit, Powell simply echoed his boss's somewhat nebulous excuse. Powell, in fact, said in no uncertain terms, that he had no intentions of being anywhere near Durbin, South Africa on August 31, or anytime during the Conference on World Racism.

However, after the American Civil Liberties Union joined a diverce group of civil and human rights advocates, including Rev. Jesse Jackson, who flew into Durbin a day early, a While House press release to the Associated Press stating, "A mid level State Department official is heading an 11th-hour U.S.lobbying effort to soften language hostile to Israel in draft documents prepared for the UN Conference on racism.

However, tee article stales that Michael Southwick, a deputy assistant secretary of state, would head the America delegation rather than Powell himself William Shulz, executive director of Amnesty International, said in a statement; "I believe the best way to resolve conflict is to get into the game and not sit in the stands. The absence of high-level representative in Durbin suggests 'stark disinterest in the United States having a leader-ship role." You can bet, however, our Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee. (D-Houston); who is among Congress members attending the conference will tell it like it was when she gets back home. Rev; Jackson has already concluded: "This issue of racism is too big to reduce it to the controversy about the Middle East. One can be against West Bank settlements, against the assassination of leaders and not have to label Israel as a racist stale."

Nevertheless, can one not refuse to officially apologize, or address reparations for centuries of slavery, discrimination, bigotry and Jim Crow oppression and not be labeled a racist nation?'Need we answer a question that's been answered ad nauseam?
