### Summertime is the Perfect Time to Think About College

When you talk about Black colleges, what colleges come to mind? Howard, Morehouse, Spelman and Grambling. There are many historically - Black colleges that hardly get any props at all. Fisk University in Tennessee is one of these colleges.

From its earliest days, Fisk has played a leadership role in the education of African Americans. Faculty and alumni have been among America's intellectual, artistic and alumni have been among America's intellectual, artistic and civic leaders. Among these peoples are W.E.B. DuBois, the great social critic and co-founder of the NAACP. The distinguished artist of the Harlem Renaissance Aaron Douglas attended and also taught at Fisk.

In proportion to its size, Fisk continues to contribute more alumni to the ranks of scholars pursuing doctoral degrees than any other institution in the United States. Fisk is committed to a liberal education. Attention is given to Afrocentric perspectives which permeate the whole curriculum of the university. Fisk was the first Black College to be granted a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa - one of the highest academic awards that can be granted.

The campus is located approximately two miles north of downtown Nashville a very colorful and culturally enriched city.

Nashville is known as the Athens of the south for its academic and artistic attributes and has become sort of a "mecca" for students and tourists.

Okay, so now you know what Fisk has to offer, the question is do you have the ducks to attend this great school? In the past, Money magazine rated Fisk 19th as the best education bargain among 1,000 public and private colleges nationwide. In other words, if you qualified you're getting in.

So when applying to a college one should do research and make sure you know everything there is to know about the school.

**Search For Truth Continues In Mississippi**

The Rainbow/Push Coalition (RPH) will launch its own investigation to determine what led to the tragic death of 17-year old Raynard Johnson, an honor student from Kokomo, Miss.

Gary Flowers, the RPH's national field director, and Lou Myers, prominent civil rights attorney, are enroute to Mississippi to extend support to the family and launch the new investigation.

This current trip to Mississippi was prompted by Mississippi authorities, who on Wednesday officially declared Raynard's death a suicide. This was the third time that local authorities have ruled that Raynard was responsible for his own death.

Several weeks ago the RPH offered a \$25,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone responsible for Raynard's death. Despite no leads, Rev. Jackson said he will continue to support the family.

"They are trying to make this a suicide, but there has been evidence to support this," Rev. Jackson said. "The struggle continues."

Raynard's body was found hanging from a small pecan tree in the front yard of the Johnson's home by his father on the night of June 18th. The Johnson family and the RPH believe Raynard was killed because of his association with white girls.

"We said the announcement by Mississippi authorities is nothing new," said Flowers, explaining why the RPH is forging straight ahead. "They (Mississippi authorities) concluded suicide an hour after he was dead. Then they proceeded by inductive reasoning to attempt to justify the premature conclusion with an array of distorted facts and selected press leaks, now that their investigation is concluded; it is time to let the real investigation to begin."

If necessary, Rev. Jackson said the organization is willing to have Raynard's body exhumed to get to the truth.

Added Flowers, "We anxiously anticipate the cooperation of local and state officials to turn over evidence used in the attempts to investigate. This information will be used to bring about justice."

## LHA Director takes post as Assistant City Manager



LHA Director takes post as Assistant City Manager Quincy White, Executive Director of the Lubbock Housing Authority, has accepted the position as Assistant City Manager for Administrative Services with the City of Lubbock. He will begin his duties on September 25.

White, 53, will oversee the Finance, Human Resources, Information Technology and Management Services divisions. He is a former City employee, having served as Youth Services Coordinator, Interim Recruitment Coordinator and Assistant Director of Human Resources from November 1992 until May 1996.

A Lubbock native, White moved back home from Houston in 1990 and served as Program Director for the Drug Elimination Program for the Housing Authority until he became the Executive Director of the Lubbock Black Chamber in January 1992.

White took the position as Executive Director of the Lubbock Housing Authority in May of 1996. In that post, he has been responsible for all LHA services and activities, and he has served as staff liaison for the Board of Commissioners.

"We are extremely pleased that Quincy is rejoining the City as Assistant City Manager," said Deputy City Manager Debra Forte. "Under his direction, the Lubbock Housing Authority has made a substantial financial and operational turnaround. He has done an outstanding job for that organization and the community, and we know he will serve the citizens of Lubbock well also."

White's experience in the private sector includes stints with Xerox Corporation and Federal Express Corporation. He began as a sales manager with Xerox in 1981 and became a district sales manager in 1983. During those

years, he developed a work-force representative of the demographics in Houston and his district ranked in the top 5 percent nationally. In 1984 White moved to Federal Express where he established and managed a district office to market a new electronic mail product.

Assistant City Manager for Developmental Services Richard Burdine said, "In addition to his public sector experience at the Housing Authority and the City of Lubbock, Quincy brings a wealth of private sector achievement. He motivated his sales force at Xerox to become one of its most productive divisions, and his experience with Federal Express has direct application to customer service for the City of Lubbock."

White is one of three Assistant City Managers for the City of Lubbock. He joins Burdine and Tommy Gonzalez, who oversees Community Services.

## Riding into History

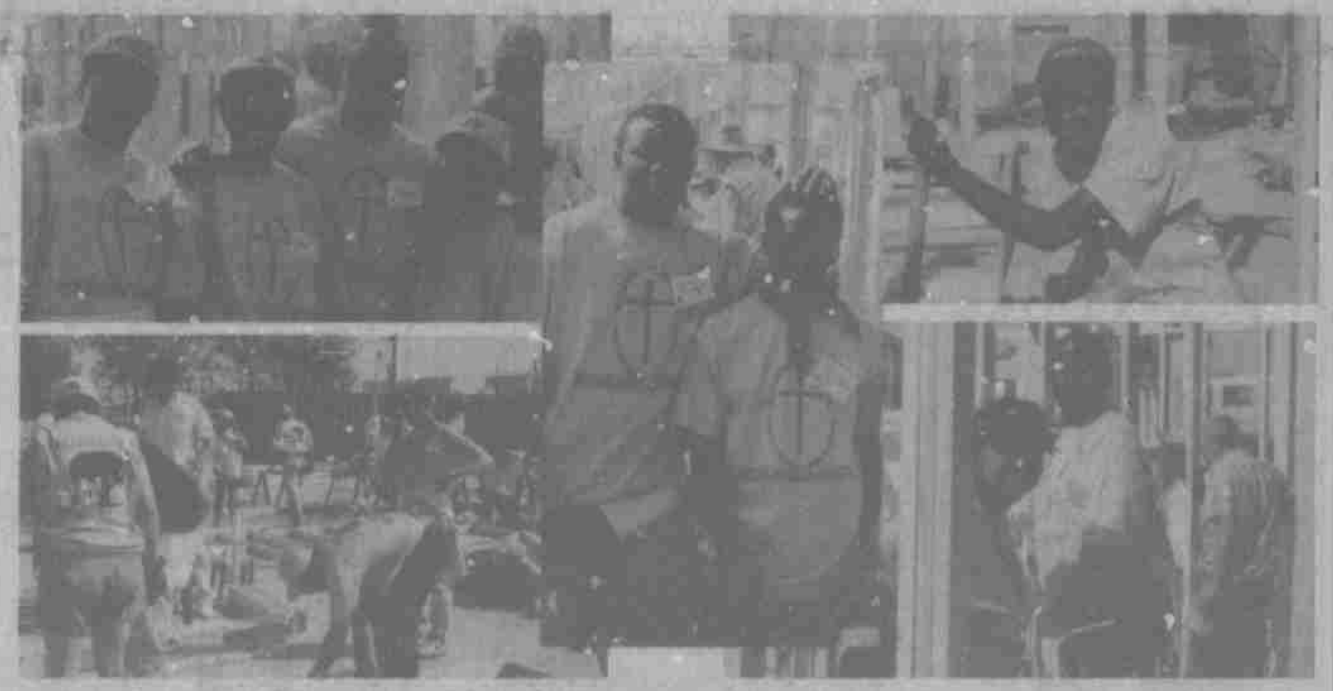

He and his family moved to Lubbock, Texas in 1949. He attended and graduated from Dunbar High School. While in school, he was captain of the basketball team, class treasurer, and a member of several other organizations. He was crowned "Mr. Dunbar" in 1962. Joe received a Bachelor's Degree from West Texas State University in Canyon, Texas, and a Masters of Education Degree from Sul Ross State University in Alpine, Texas.

He was united in Holy Matrimony to Carolyn Ann Woodard on October 24, 1965. To this union, two sons were born: Gregory Louis and Michael Linn. Because of the bond developed CJ during her school years, Charlotte Dickson McCarty, was accepted and welcomed into the McWilliams family as a daughter and sister.

In 1996, Joe retired after thirty years in public education. He taught and coached in Amarillo, Odessa, and Lubbock. He served as boys basketball coach at his high school, Dunbar-Strugg Dunbar-Strugg High School, for twenty-two years. He was a member of the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches as well as the Texas High School Coaches Association. Because of his love for children and a desire to impact their lives, he and his wife, Carolyn, opened Precious Steps Early Learning Center in March, 2000.

One of the most important events in Joe's life occurred in May of 2000. This is when he received Jesus Christ as his personal Savior after being witnessed to in his home by Supt. W. C. Kenan.

Joe departed this life Tuesday, September 12, 2000, at 7:25 p. m. at Covenant Lakeside Medical Center. He was surrounded by his family.

Explains Phill Wilson, director of AAPTI, "Those attending the meetings should leave with a better sense of what can and should be done to address HIV/AIDS in our

communities. AIDS does not have to be a death sentence. There are things we can do to care for ourselves if we are infected and protect ourselves if we are not. We will also be recruiting for the next class of the African American HIV University, a two year program housed on the campus of the University of Southern California."

## Consumer Alert Bridgestone/Firestone Tires

You have probably heard of the recent safety recalls of certain Bridgestone/Firestone tires. Texas Attorney General John Cornyn is monitoring this situation very closely to ensure that all Texans are treated fairly. All unsafe tires must be swiftly and properly replaced. The current recall applies to all Firestone Radial ATX and Radial ATXII tires in size P235/75/R15 produced in North America and to Wilderness AT tires in size P235/75/R15 produced at the

Decatur, Illinois plant. These are light truck tires, many provided as original equipment on Ford Explorers.

Bridgestone/Firestone and Ford have announced that customers who have these tires on their vehicles may have the tires replaced at no charge at any Bridgestone/Firestone service center or Ford/Lincoln-Mercury dealer at no charge. In addition, customers may buy replacement tires at any tire retailer, as long as the replacement sizes and

models have been approved by Ford as suitable for the vehicle. Customers will be reimbursed by Bridgestone/Firestone up to \$100 per tire, including taxes and mounting and balancing charges. To obtain a refund, customers must keep their receipts for the replacement tires and return the receipts to an authorized Firestone retailer.

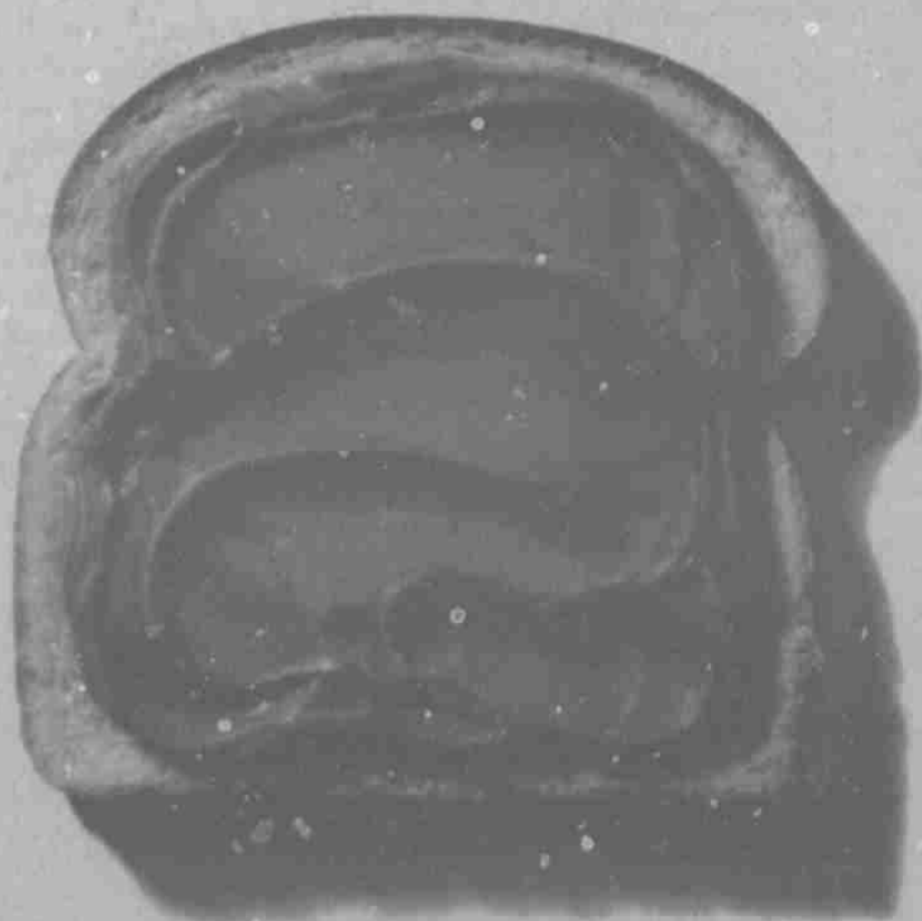
Let us continue to pray for our sick and shut. Among them is a relative of the Roberts family who was hurt in a football game.

Brent Lowery is the new principal of Frenship Junior High. He has worked previously in the Lubbock Cooper and the Lubbock Independent School Districts.

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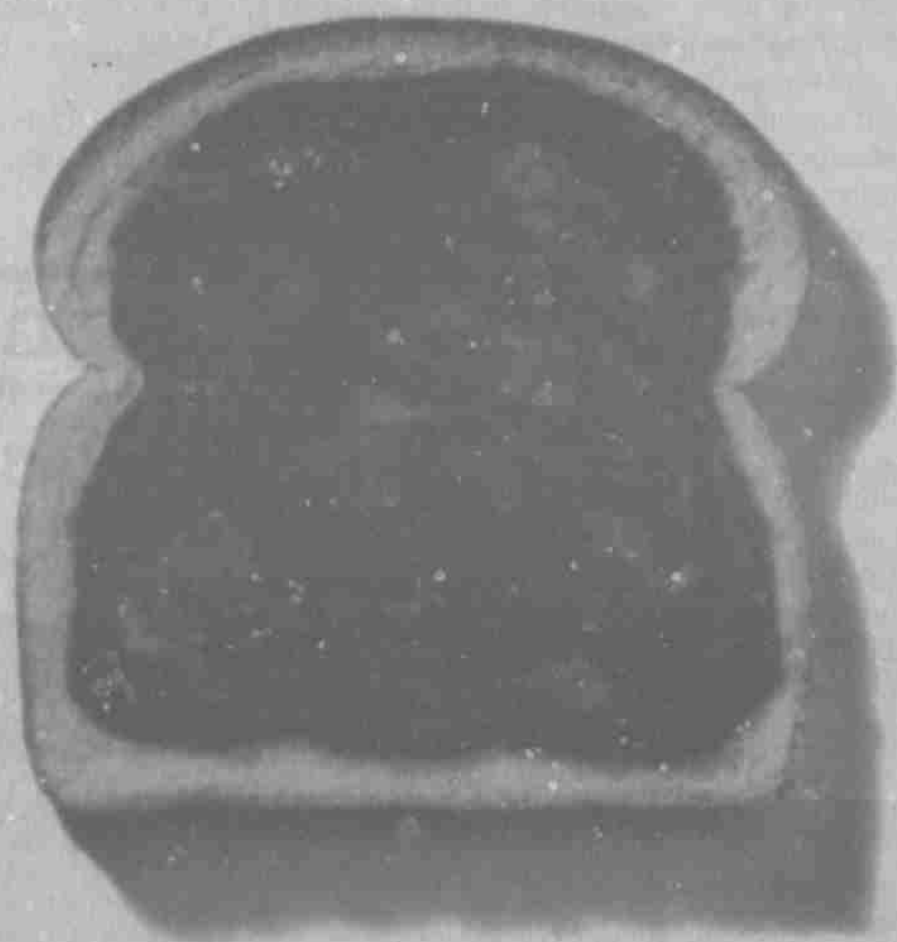
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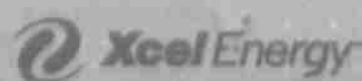

As for those who do not support our communities, organizations and needs, we must train our money to stay away and not go where it is not wanted.

The same principle should apply to building and rebuilding our long-denied communities. We lead and take the initiatives to work with those outside the communities who recognize our needs; using their resources, advice, cooperation, work, supplies and money to help us help ourselves get off the relief rolls and on the tax rolls by becoming producers and not just consumers; competing competitively at the marketplace with our goods and services.

# Volunteers Rebuild Churches, Help Promote Interracial Harmony (continued from last week)



After the Alabama workcamps, the church rebuilding effort moved to South Carolina where eight more churches were reconstructed with the help of volunteers organized by the Interfaith Rebuilding Partnership, a coalition of nonprofit organizations led by WSC and including the Congress of National Black Churches and Presbyterian, Episcopal, Quaker, and Reform Jewish groups. Many other churches and secular organizations have contributed volunteers and/or money to the effort.

Dr. Washington pointed out that the workcamps have been learning as much as social and spiritual experiences for the volunteers. For example, she noted that the rebuilding project in Summerton was located at the birthplace of one of the major civil rights victories of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

It was in Summerton where a small group of African-American families, led by Rev. Joseph A. Delaine, began a grass-roots campaign to get better transportation, textbooks and supplies for their children's segregated schools. The case caught the attention of NAACP lawyer Thurgood Marshall, who filed suit on behalf of the Summerton residents. The challenge by the Summerton residents was the first of five court cases consolidated in *Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka,*

Kan., a landmark case that resulted in the 1954 decision by the U.S. Supreme Court that "in the field of public education the doctrine of separate but equal has no place."

Coincidentally, while the WSC volunteers were rebuilding the Summerton church, a local newspaper noted the death of Eliza Briggs, who, along with her late husband Harry, "changed America," the newspaper said in an editorial. In 1952, the Briggses were among the 20 Summerton residents on behalf of whom the NAACP filed suit. For their efforts, Harry Briggs, who worked at a gas station, was fired on Christmas Eve, and was refused work anywhere else. Rev. DeLaine, minister of a small African-American church in Summerton, saw his home destroyed by fire in what black residents argued was an arson attack. The house went up in flames while the all-white fire department watched without doing anything to put out the blaze, because they said the building was just outside the town boundary line.

Among the volunteers at the workcamps were five members of the Unitarian Coastal Fellowship of Morehead City, N.C. It was the fourth year that volunteers from the Morehead

City church have helped to rebuild burned churches, beginning in Boligee, Ala., and continuing in Summerton, Dillon and Buffalo in South Carolina. "Member of my congregation have come back re-energized and more deeply committed to social justice," said the Unitarian Coastal minister, Rev. Bob Murphy, who has organized the delegations to all of the workcamps. One of the largest groups to participate in the workcamps came from the small town of Charlotte in northern Vermont. Rev. Mark Bolles of the Charlotte Congregational Church organized volunteers for both the Summerton and Buffalo workcamps. He said his church first became involved in the church rebuilding effort by donating money collected at a special Christmas Eve service in 1997 to the Interfaith Rebuilding Partnership. "When I learned how the operation worked, I decided we wanted to do more than just send money down there. I thought it would be great to bring a group from Vermont to participate."

Bolles, who also drives a school bus in Charlotte, rented a commercial bus and drove the volunteers from his church and the nearby Williston Federated Church, who filled all 48 seats on the bus, to the Summerton workcamp. He said the workcamp had at least as much of an impact on the Vermont volunteers as on the Summerton parishioners. "I didn't necessarily bring them down there because I felt it was necessary for the (Prayer House Mission) church," he said. "I brought them there because I felt it was necessary for them. The opportunity to mix with a different race and culture has really changed people."

The bonds of respect and friendship that connected South Carolina and Vermont continued to

grow after the completion of the rebuilding project. The Charlotte church arranged for the Prayer House Mission choir to travel to Vermont for a fund-raising concert. Along the way, the Summerton parishioners broke up the long bus ride by spending a night in Bethesda, Md., where they also performed a concert at the River Road Unitarian Universalist Church that had sent a group of volunteers to the workcamp.

One of the church's directors, John Bennett, said his small rural congregation was "overwhelmed" by the support from volunteers from around the country. "It's great knowing that people outside the area were thinking about helping us," he said.

For the volunteers, the opportunity to meet and work with a diverse range of people while taking a stand against racism is as important as rebuilding the church. "In these groups, you get an interracial mix; you get an intercultural mix; and interfaith mix... a complete cross-section," said Ed Pittman, the Service Committee's on-site workcamp director for the past two years in South Carolina. "I absolutely guarantee that the stereotypes have gone away, and friendships have formed. Being able to create a place for that to happen is the nicest thing about these camps."

As former commissioner of the Texas Department of Health and a member of the U.S. Health and Human Services National Vaccine

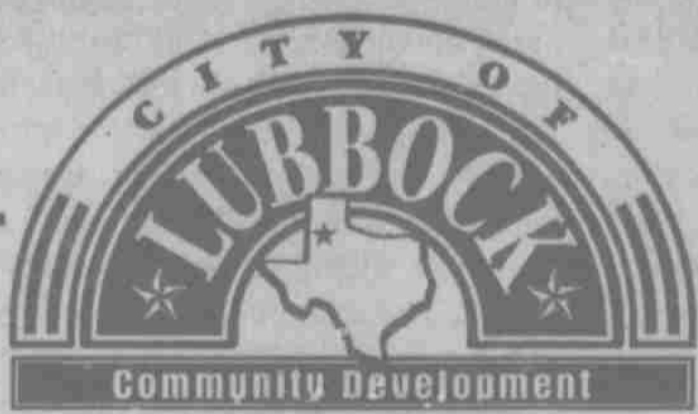

## from the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith "Yield Not To Temptation"

"The devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor. All this is I will give you," he said, "If you will bow down and worship me". Jesus said to him, "Away from me, Satan! For it is written: 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.'"

—Matthew 4:8-10

A group of my male peers told me when I was a young preacher that they would believe in me if I would do certain things with them to prove that I was as tough as they were. They even promised that they would become Christians and unite with a church of their choice.

In the community I was raised up in, a certain fellow made home brew. He would keep it in a keg covered with leaves in a hole dug in the ground and in bottles in his corncrib. The word in the community was the brew was very potent and a cup of the cooled brew from the hidden key in the ground was something else. My friends told me that I would have go with them and removed a bottle of the home brew from the crib that also housed snakes without the owners consent and not be caught by the "high sheriff." The other thing I would have to do was removed the lib from the home brew in the ground and drink a 2 metal dipper of the brew and be able to walk straight. If I passed this test they do what they promised me.

I thought about the offer of my peers and how good this chilled home brew must have been. However, after

giving it some thought, I refused. I wanted to make an influence on my friends, but I wanted to do it the right way.

When we look at the temptations of Jesus, we see that Satan's temptations had ever-widening appeals. First there was the satisfaction of His own hunger; then the adulation of Jerusalem; and finally power over the whole world. Jesus had come to win the world to himself. In following the path that lay before Him, He would meet resistance, rejection, and finally death. And He knew even though He would sacrifice His life, a large part of the world would not be won. Satan proposed an easier way. He would withdraw his opposition; he would let Jesus have the world, and He wouldn't have to die to gain it.

However, there was a price tag Satan put on his offer: "If you will bow down and worship me". Satan would give Jesus the whole wide world if Jesus would only bow to him. Satan was suggesting that the whole order of the moral universe be reversed that the Creator stoops to pay homage to the created. This thought was intolerable, so Jesus would hear not more.

With but a little thought, we see the abhorrence of Satan's suggestion. His approach to us may not be as bold and direct. He may simply ask us to compromise a bit: to blur the line that divides right and wrong, to remain silent in the presence of evil.

God and God alone is to be worshiped, not idols, nor animals, nor human beings, nor Satan, regardless of how much power he may possess.

## The Outreach Prayer Breakfast

The members of the Outreach Prayer Breakfast would like to ask you a question: Who is a spiritual Christian??

Galatians 5:18-21 and II Timothy 1:7. The apostle Paul identifies three distinct classes of people in the world — the natural man; the carnal man, and the spiritual man.

The natural man is not a christian. This person's self will is at the center of his own life. He lives a life that is control controlled by satan.

The carnal man is one who has received Christ into his life, but has not completely surrender to the Lord. This person's self will is still in control and Jesus Christ is kept on the fringe of his life. This person finds it impossible to live a righteous life.

Then there is the spiritual person. This person spiritual christian.

What is a spiritual christian? This is the person who is a christian and has come under the total control of the Holy Spirit. The spiritual christian's life is ~ different from that of the natural person or the carnal person.

The spiritual person's life has been crucified with Christ. His life is in total control by the Holy Spirit. Paul identifies two innately opposing forces which are fighting within us — the Holy Spirit and that sinful nature. The Spiritual Christian has faults and battles the flesh. However, he knows the secret of enduring in the will of God by submitting to the Holy Spirit. A spiritual christian is also one also one who possess-

es qualities produced by the Holy Spirit. These qualities are exemplified in the daily walk of the believer. The qualities that the spiritual christi-n exhibits are Love, Joy, Peace, Long-Suffering, Gentleness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Meekness and Temperance. These are fruits of the spirit that will characterize a spiritual christian's life. It is the Love of Jesus Christ and the indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

We cannot make fruit. It is as we yield our minds, our wills and our hearts to the teaching of the Holy Spirit that the fruit will develop within us. Contrary to popular teaching, the spiritual christian recognizes, identifies, submits to God and allows him to deal with the issues he faces. How do we determine the extent

of our spirituality as christians? It is a standard which has been developed by God, not by man. The Bible says that we are known by the way we love. It is through our works that we glorify God.

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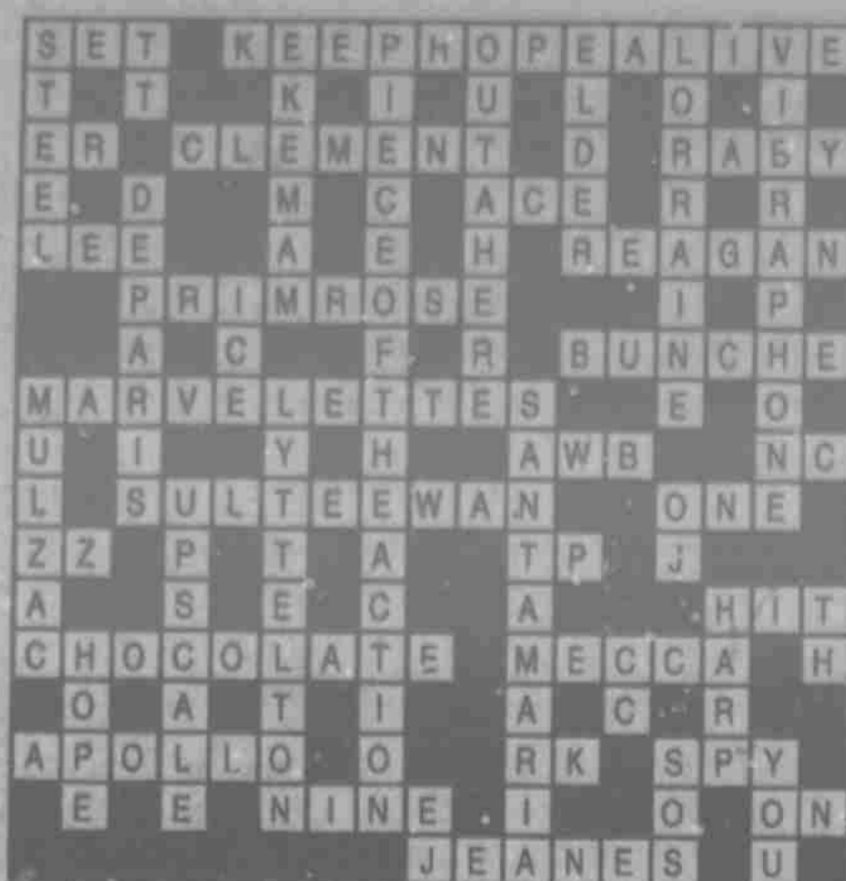
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
