
Cowboy Ortiz Named Chairman of Youth Commission

Letter to the Editor

"THE LISD MUMBO JUMBO!"

First, I want to comment the community for the stellar support and "telling it like it is" at the meeting of District Two called by Ms. Venita Woods-Holmes. We should have this type of response to many other meetings within the community. Support for our elected officials is essential to their effectiveness with other elected officials.

Regardless of their decision, LISD has been told, in no uncertain terms, East Lubbock demand equal and quality educational opportunities for our students. East Lubbock must continue to demand that all elected officials prove to the community's majority, that their actions are just and in the best interest of East Lubbock. To date, LISD has not come close to providing the answers that indicate they have our best interest in mind. We will no longer accept elected officials and their appointed agents "speaking to us from both sides of their mouth at the same time". Give us the "good, bad and ugly" facts of the issues, not mumbo Jumbo gobbley gook, that insults everyone's intelligence.

The mumbo Jumbo, (1) the proposal is due to lost enrollment within our East Lubbock campuses, however, over 700 students from our campuses were approved by LISD to transfer to other LISD campuses. (2) The proposal will save one million dollar, but no jobs will be lost. Are we to believe that utilities and maintenance cost total for the two schools being closed total a million annually. (3) That the proposal will provide for a better education for our students as "band and music" will be offered at Alderson. Please, oh please, tell me that this is a misquote of our Superintendent, for even our forefathers who were slaves, many not even being able to read or write, even back then, knew there was more to a quality education than band and music. (4) The proposal is in the best interest of East Lubbock. How can this be, when (a) Parkway kids will be bused from kindergarten thru 8th grade; (b) after 9 years being schooled in East Lubbock, academically excellent student must still attend Lubbock High for L.E.R.P. (c) Guardians must go to three different schools to drop off kids. (d) Undoubtedly, class sizes will increase will more total enrollment. (5) This proposal is financially generated, yet, financial incentives will be offered to teachers within East Lubbock, a Day Care facility will be created, and Dunbar Junior High will have a new Science Wing built, and student that have moved out of LISD's area will be allowed back, for no cost (free education at Lubbock's tax payers expense).

The lost of enrollment, migration out of LISD's jurisdiction, the rise in private and home schools are directly attributed to the ineptness of our current School Board. A study of this issues will reveal LISD's enrollment drops occurred within a particular area of Lubbock and East Lubbock students were allowed mass transfers to compensate for those losses. That the LISD School Board's overall agenda is not geared toward an across the City equal and quality education.

East Lubbock and those who are really concerned about Lubbock, Texas, we best put a sincere effort into getting a better control of LISD.

How You Can Help Prevent Infections Diseases

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), infectious diseases account for one of every three deaths per year around the world and are the leading cause of death among children.

Fortunately, the World Health Organization, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and many other organizations are working to stop infectious diseases. The U.S. pharmaceutical industry is a very important player in this effort, with more than two hundred new medicines in development for such diseases as AIDS, pneumonia, lung infections, tuberculosis, meningitis, hepatitis, malaria, and influenza.

But you are the first line of defense against infectious dis-

eases. The World Health Organization suggests ten things you and your family can do to prevent infectious diseases:

1. Keep immunizations up-to-date, for children, adults and pets.
2. Wash your hands often, especially during cold and flu season. Always wash your hands after using the bathroom, changing a diaper, blowing your nose or sneezing or coughing, caring for a sick person, playing with a pet and before preparing or eating food.
3. Be careful of what you eat and how you prepare it. Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold until eaten or cooked. Be sure temperature controls in refrigerators and freezers are working properly. Wash coun-

ters, cutting boards and utensils frequently with soap and water, especially after preparing poultry or other meats. Wash fresh fruits and vegetables before eating, and always cook ground beef until you no longer see any pink.

4. Use antibiotics exactly as prescribed. Take them for the full course prescribed by your doctor, but not for colds or other non-bacterial illnesses. Never self-medicate with antibiotics or share them with family or friends.
5. Report to your doctor any quickly worsening infection or any infection that does not get better after you take a prescribed antibiotic.
6. Be cautious around wild animals and domestic animals that you don't know. After any animal bite, clean the skin with soap and water and seek medical care immediately.

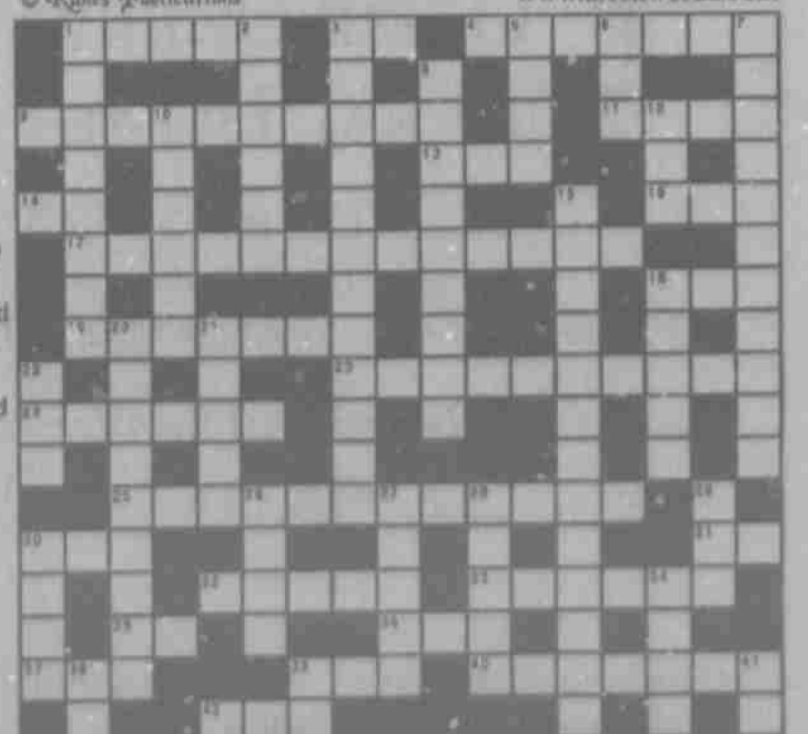

What a Predicament!

"I hear many whispering, 'Terror on every side! Report him! Let's report him!' ALL my friends are waiting for me to slip, saying, 'Perhaps he will be deceived; then we will prevail over him and take our revenge on him. But the Lord is with me like a mighty warrior; so my persecutors will stumble and not prevail. They will fail and be thoroughly disgraced; their honor forgotten. —Jeremiah 20: 10 NIV

What a predicament! When Jeremiah spoke God's words, he was beaten and put in the stocks. When he did not speak, he was tormented by that intolerable burning in his bones. What could he do?

Like Jeremiah, this writer and others leaders of this community have been beaten by their peers and put in the stocks by their own hand for acting and speaking in a positive way that would help and not bring harm to the community.

Jeremiah could hear many people talking about him, and they were defaming him. It makes fear on every side a part of what Jeremiah heard others saying. They were accusing Jeremiah of being an alarmist, saying foreigners would invade Judah and bring fear to the people. Jeremiah had said something like that in warning that Jerusalem was to come under siege. If the people had taken it seriously and had stopped doing wrong, they could have averted the invasion an been at peace as he had said (Stand at the crossroads an look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls. Jeremiah 6: f 6, NIV). However, instead of Listening to the preaching and changing their

ways, they wanted to silence the preacher.

People around Jeremiah were saying to him, Report! Go ahead and talk all you want to about how we are going to be defeated by some invader, and we will report it. We will tell the authorities and you will be in trouble for how subversive take. We will tell everybody that you are preaching against our country. When we report you, you will be arrested and jailed.

Jeremiah so called friends who had once played that they were concerned about is peace and welfare turned against him. Now they were waiting for him to stumble, to make some incautious statement that could be called subversive. They were saying, "Jeremiah is so enthusiastic about trying to reform us, so eager to tell what sinners we are, so quick to say foreigners will defeat us that he can be enticed to say something that can be used to convict him of treason. Who does he think he is, anyway? With such an attitude all around, even among his former friends, it is no wonder Jeremiah wanted to stop his preaching. However, he could not stop.

One can truly understand the plight and mindset of Jeremiah if they have ever been in a leadership positions in this community. A community in some ways that has an "all balls and no bat attitude" so to speak.

Jeremiah perhaps wanted to say and tell his people where to go. However, inside of him was an intolerable burning in his bones. He knew the Lord was with him. He knew the Lord is terrible, awesome. He is one to be feared. Since they did not fear Him, Jeremiah's opponents lacked the very beginning of wisdom.

Let this lesson from Jeremiah be a help to all of us.
