



The More You Know -The More You Save Energy saving tips from LP&L

However, the current high cost of fuel to generate power makes it imperative that all of us work to conserve electricity. Here are some tips on how you can keep your energy bill as low as possible as we head into the summer season.

Appliance Tips "Easier Chores and Easy Savings"

Turn off anything you're not using. This includes all equipment and appliances, televisions, VCR's, computers and LIGHTS!

Refrigerator: Give the unit breathing room, clean the coils, and don't set temperatures too low. Fresh foods keep at 37 to 42 degrees, frozen foods at 0 to 5 degrees. Defrost refrigerators and freezers before ice buildup becomes too thick.

If you have a microwave oven, use it for reheating and cooking small quantities.

Do laundry, vacuuming, cooking etc. early in the morning or late in the evening when the outdoor temperature is cooler.

Use ceiling fans and room fans in occupied rooms but keep fans off in unoccupied areas:

Office Tips "No Waste at Work"

At work, turn off all your office equipment (computers, printers, photocopiers and lights) at the end of the day (contrary to popular belief, this does no harm).

For large energy consuming businesses, an energy audit should be conducted periodically.

In offices, ensure that someone turns off the A/C at the end of the day. Programmable thermostats will do this automatically.

Air-Conditioning Tips "Cool Ways to Save"

Air conditioners: Clean or replace filters regularly. Provide shade for your air conditioner unit outside. Keep weeds and debns away to ensure proper air flow.

Keep the thermostat set at 78 degrees or higher when the house is occupied and turn the A/C off or set the thermostat warmer when the house is unoccupied. Installing a programmable thermostat will do this automatically.





The Liberian Social Justice Foundation, Inc., (LSJFI) is a private, non-profit organization dedicated to the restoration of a stable, democratic society in Liberia. The Foundation is also working diligently to improve the quality of life for all Liberians at home and abroad through education, development and outreach.

Our primary concerns include: education, health care, social justice, economic and community development, trade and fair labor practices.

Since December 1989, Liberia has been devastated by a civil war that has killed tens of thousands of Liberians and caused an estimated one-third of its population to flee the country as refugees. It's worth mentioning that bridges, roads, hospitals, clinics, schools, churches, homes and other infrastructures in Liberia need urgent attention.

The Foundation has been instrumental in networking politically with organizations both inside and outside the United States of America to pressure world leaders to politically intervene with diplomatic and financial support to alleviate deteriorating social and human rights conditions induces by the National Patriotic Party (NPP) led government officials against the citizens of Liberia.

During recent visits to the country, Dr. Zoedua observed rampant starvation, lack of physical infrastructure (housing, hospitals, clinics, schools, jobs, and industry), civil unrest and cruelty perpetrated on the civilian population by corrupt government officials who have destroyed the economy creating political instability.

Dr. Zoedua, a criminologist has appealed to diplomatic leadership to intervene via negotiations or use of economic sanctions to force out the National Patriotic Party (NPP) regime facilitating democratic elections, amnesty for those interred in prison camps, exiled or deported for defying government control, redevelopment of the national infrastructure, government re-organization and a truth and reconciliation tribunal to address the issue of reparations for those whose human rights were violated during the period of civil unrest.

Dr. Zoedua is the Executive Director/Chairman of the Liberian Social Justice Foundation, Inc., as well as the President/CEO of Dee Security Services, Inc., a Cincinnati Ohio based security service and consulting firm, and DSS Employment Screening Services, Inc.

Dr. Zoedua currently services on the Board of Trustee of the Urban Minority Alcoholism and Drug Outreach Program, Mental Health East Services, Retried Seniors Volunteer Program, and the Cincinnati Business Incubators.

from the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith What Your Tongue!

The other day as I was thumbing through the International News, I read that 86 people died from jumping off a Somalia Boat. As I continue to read I was shocked when I discovered that these passengers were forced

to jump into the sea at ganpoint after the cargo boat that they were traveling in developed engine problems.

Hundred of Somalians had been trying to reach Yemen in sailpowered or cargo boats in search of work since some Persian Gulf countries began banning livestock from Somalia. The ban followed an outbreak of Rift Valley fever, a mosquito-borne virus transmitted from livestock to humans, in Saudi Arabia. Livestock is Somalia's main export to Yemen and Saudi Arabia.

As I kept thumbing through the International headlines, I notice that the United States was urged to increase Sudan "peace effort.~ Rep. Frank Wolf, Republican - Virginia said that the United States must "stop the slavery, stop the killing, stop the famine, stop the death" in Sudan. Richard Armitage, the State Department's No. 2 official replied to Mr. Wolf by saying, "You're right. We've got to *stop the war. The U. S. Commission on International Religious Freedom has branded Sudan, "the world's most violent" abuser of religious freedom.

Why would the Ole Parson and the United States be interested in Sudan? Sudan is filled with a rich heritage. Archaeological excavation of sites on the Nile above Aswan has confined human habitation in the river valley during the Paleolithic period that spanned more than 60,000 years of Sudanese history. Skeletal remains suggest a blending of Negroid and Mediterranean populations during the Neolithic period (eighth to third millennia B. C.) that has remained relatively stable until the present, despite gradual infiltration by other elements.

Biblically, Sudan is called Cush. Throughout its history, Sudan has been divided between its Arab/Muslim heritage, identified with northern Sudan, and its African/Christian heritages to the south. The two groups are divided along linguistic, religion, racial, and economic lines and the cleavage has generated ethnic tensions and clashes.

African Negroid/Nubians were converted to Christianity in the sixth century. According to tradition, a missionary sont by Byzantine empress Theodora arrived in Nobastia and started preaching the gospel about 540 A. D. It is said that the conversion process may have begin earlier, however, under the aegis of Coptic missionaries from Egypt, who in the previous century had brought Christianity to the Abyssinians (Ethiopians).

The coming of Islam eventually changed the nature of Sudanese What a tragedy for these poor Americana to lose their life in such society and facilitated the division of the country into the north and south. Islam also fostered political unity, economic growth, and educational development among its adherents; however, these benefits were restricted largely to urban and commercial centers. H is said that the poor Negroid people who live in the South and are mostly Christian are famine-stricken and treated brutally by their Islamic/Arab brother to the north. Rev. Franklin Graham- son of the Billy Graham, organization runs a hospital in southern Sudan that has been bombed nine times.

> President Bush has been pressured by an unusual coalition of Americans to try to do something about the madness of the Muslim ruler in Sudan. The Foreign Minister Mustafa Osman Ismail said, "There is no country in the world at this juncture that is in need of the intervention and help of the United States like Sudan."



The city council, along with the mayor, conducts business, performs ceremonial duties, listens to boards and commissions' reports, and acts on the information presented to them. The city council also hires the city manager, city attorney, and city secretary as required by the Lubbock City Charter.


