## Combest Promotes Vatican Art "Vatican Exhibit is Awe Inspiring"



Lubbock. Their journey to Lubbock has been long. Preparations to bring the exhibit to Lubbock began 14 years ago. The tireless efforts of people including Father Malcolm Neyland and other community officials eventually convinced Vatican Museum officials to procure the exhibit to Lubbock. The exhibit will remain open to the public through September 15. The exhibit consists of 31 medieval frescoes created by master painter of the Roman School during the 12th and 13th Centuries. These priceless works of art were originally painted on drying plaster, which became part of the Roman churches of St. Agnese outside the Walls and St. Nicola in Carcere. The works have recently been cleaned to revive the colors their creators originally intended, and which many Romans likely appreciated hundreds of years ago. In viewing frescoes and the other items included in the exhibit, a person cannot help but be awestruck by their brilliance. Art historians say

that these medieval paintings, that we can all appreciate for their intrinsic beauty, have much farther-reaching significance. These works were created at a time when few people could read. Therefore, artwork was one of the important media through which stories were told. The events and people portrayed in the paintings remind us, as they did the people who admired them 900 years ago, of the morality lessons crucial for a responsible and constructive society. The paintings also are important in what they represent artistically. Art historians suggest that the frescoes were done by students in the Roman School, which was believed to be strongly influenced by Pietro Cavallini, an important Italian painter and mosaic designer.

The exhibit of important works of art reflects well on Lubbock and the people who devoted so much effort to bringing them to residents on the South Plains. Lubbock is today a place of international impor-

tance. The Vatican Museums in Rome has never before exhibited this collection of frescoes. Securing these priceless artworks in Lubbock for residents and visitors to see this summer is a remarkable accomplishment for Lubbock. I believe that all who see this exhibit will cherish the experience, as I have, and it is a historic occasion for us to enjoy some of the world's treasures with our families and friends. It has been a privilege to work with the Vatican Exhibit Foundation and many others to bring this amazing exhibit to West Texas. I had the opportunity to participate in numerous events this

week celebrating the Vatican exhibit's opening and, throughout the process of bringing these priceless artworks to Lubbock, I have had the pleasure of helping with numerous visas and passports and acting as a liaison to the Customs Service and the State Department. The Vatican exhibit is truly an example of the Lubbock community pulling together to accomplish a world-class, cultural event. I encourage everyone to take advantage of this great opportunity and travel to the Museum of Texas Tech University to see the internationally important works of art that might never again be displayed on American soil.

## The Outreach Prayer Breakfast

The members of the Outreach Prayer Breakfast met last Saturday morning, June 1, 2002, in the home of Sister Annie Mae McBride, beginning at 9:00 a. m. Sister Christene Burleson and Sister Mary Crawford led the devotional period- What a time! All members were very pleased over the presence of Sister Annie Day, as she has come back.

Our teacher for the morning was Sister Elnora Jones who brought a wonderful message on the subject, "Praying In The Spirit" Philippians 4:6.

Sometimes when we pray, we may not feel like praying. We pray simply because we want to be faithful. Then at other times, we find it easy to pray. Perhaps we sense a great need, or we're aware of how much God loves us- For whatever reason, we feel in touch with God.

Always "pray in the spirit", Paul instructs in Ephesians 6:18. It is our privilege to always do this. The Holy Spirit within us is a "spirit of grace and supplication." Zech. 12:10, and we are simply called to beware that we do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God. (Ephesians 4:30).

Without the spirit helping us to pray, God would often have to say to us, as Jesus said, "You don't know what you are asking for. The spirit's counsel, we often ask for improper requests, asks with wrong motives, and find it hard to believe.

If we're praying "in the spirit" or with the help of the spirit, the attitudes we have when we pray will be the attitudes the Holy Spirit has. The fruit (attitudes) of the spirit has. The fruit (attitudes) of the spirit is found in Galatians 5:22.

LOVE - If the spirit helps us to pray, we will be aware of a strong love. If we truly love someone, we pray as if we are praying for our own need. The Holy Spirit is the spirit of intercession. We don't think of interceding as we sit in church, while we stand in the grocery store line, or when we drive along in our cars. What a great habit it is to lovingly pray for various ones throughout our day. Who could you pray for briefly today? You can love people through prayer than any other way. You can love people anywhere in the world. The more you pour out God's love through your prayer and actions, the more the spirit will pour in as you ask him.

JOY - When did Paul pray with joy? Paul mentioned giving thanks always, which helped both his faith and joy. When you enter into his courts with praise is like having a direct connection.

PATIENCE (Long Suffering) - If you go to prayer with an impatient or unforgiving spirit the Holy Spirit will not guide our praying. Matthew 5:23-24.

PEACE - The peace of God is promised to those who do what, according to Phil. 4:6-7.  
 Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving. Present your request to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

KINDNESS (Gentleness) - If in our prayers we keep in step with the spirit, we have sympathy with those who have failed. Instead of focusing on faults, we focus on love. When we think with kindness toward those we pray for, we prepare our hearts for the spirit to pray through us. We grieve the Holy Spirit when we are unkind. Read Ephesians 4:30-32.

GOODNESS - If we possess the fruit of goodness, we will be guileless, without hypocrisy. Such praying is solely for God's glory rather than for personal benefit. If we pray for carnal desires, the spirit becomes quiet within us. We discover we are praying on our own. It's like the Holy Spirit is saying; "I can't approve that prayer." You may mean well but you are not asking for my desires." If we listen to the spirit he will guide us to a better way of praying.

FAITHFULNESS (Faith) - We pray spirit led prayers when we pray knowing God hears and will answer. Since Paul tells us to always pray in the spirit. (Ephesians 6:18). We should always pray with confidence. He will answer. Read Hebrews 11:5-6. Satan wants us to think we're unable or unworthy to trust. He wants us to forget that God is delighted when we come believing his promises. As we pray in the spirit more, we find it easier, simply to talk to God at his word.

GENTLENESS (Meekness) - We will be in harmony with the Holy Spirit if we have a teachable spirit. Receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save our souls (James 1:21). Often the Holy Spirit taught you that your request was not scriptural, or a time when he taught you how to refocus your praying.

SELF-CONTROL (Temperance) - Children learn that self control is doing something even when I don't feel like it. It is sometimes defined as an "instant obedience to the initial promptings of the Holy Spirit. Do you want the Spirit to help you to pray? Claim his promise in Luke 11:13.

CLOSING PRAYER - Holy Spirit teach me to pray. Deeply possess me and enable me to pray the prayers you long to answer. Touch my desires, my faith and my ability to preserve. Provide all I need to pray always in the spirit. I ask this in the powerful name of Jesus. AMEN!

We are blessed with the word at our meetings, and the word comes with power. Thanks, Sister Jones! For the word: Keep praying for your neighborhoods and communities and schools. For those of you who are hurting, God knows. He will give you peace. He specializes in what you are going through. Thanks for reading. You will be blessed by doing so.

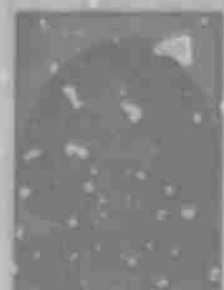

Memorial services were held at Trinity Church with Paul Jantzen officiating.

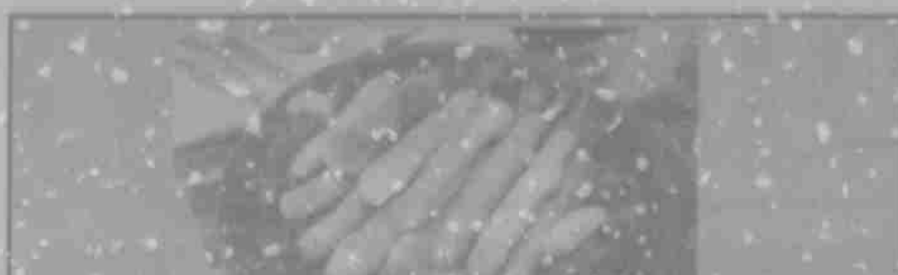
She died Sunday, May 26, 2002.

**Texas Tech Fundraising Continues Upward Spiral**

LUBBOCK - Texas Tech University System Chancellor David R. Smith today announced that more than \$27 million in contributions had been raised by the System since September.

The amount demonstrates the impressive commitment of Texas Tech supporters and ex-students, particularly in light of the Sept. 11 tragedy and economic uncertainty, Smith said.

"At a time when giving is declining across the country, Texas Tech supporters set the example for generosity. It shows the remarkable bond between our supporters and the students of this university system," Smith said.

"We often say that Texas Tech is a family. We demonstrate that in our partnerships with our communities, with building projects that make our students aware that this is their home and in a classroom environment that focuses on individual students," Smith said.

"It also is demonstrated by our alums whose activities in their day-to-day lives make them role models to this generation of Texas Tech stu-

dents. These ex-students also serve Texas Tech and its students by giving back financially to this system. All of us at Texas Tech are truly blessed with a level of commitment that is unprecedented across this country," Smith said.

Smith said his fundraising goals for the immediate future are increasing the endowment for scholarships for students at the university and health sciences center and increasing contributions earmarked for faculty enhancement.

The total to date includes \$9 million raised for scholarships, including the \$4 million Montford Legacy that Smith established to honor chancellor emeritus John T. Montford.

Of the total amount raised since September, alumna students, faculty, staff and other individuals have contributed about \$11 million. Corporations have contributed about \$11 million; foundations, \$4 million; and other organizations, \$708,000. There has been a total of 59,651 gifts or pledges.

**STRENGTH FOR TODAY; HOPE FOR TOMORROW**

**Question:** Can the church do anything to encourage the children of our Lubbock to appreciate getting a good education?

**Answer:** I was challenged with this question by a brother, with considerable influence, who has tried to help the children in our community. He has experienced very little success for the amount of effort he has put forth. I might also add that other influential members of our community have experienced similar frustration. In the African-American community it is well known that if you want to succeed in any endeavor, the church is the place to start. I would suppose that the brother who challenged me with the question started in the right place.

Let me begin to answer the question with a definition of education and then give an explanation of the church's role in educating the members of the community. Webster defines education as, "the process of training and developing the knowledge, skill, mind, character, etc., especially by formal schooling; or study; teaching; training." This process of education is summed up in one word in the Bible...wisdom. Wisdom means learning how to live skillfully according to the word of God. Godly wisdom gives instruction in every area of life. His word teaches us everything we need in order to live by and how to be successful in the process. The book of Proverbs was written for the purpose of educating people (see Proverbs 1:1-7).

Educating the members of our community is not the primary responsibility of our schools. In fact, our schools should rank third in the educational process. Parents are the first formal education for children (Ephesians 6:1-4). Many of our public schools are failing to educate because there is no discipline in the classrooms. Learning cannot take

place where there is no discipline. If parents would begin and/or continue to instill godly discipline in our children, the education process will be greatly enhanced.

The church should be the second institution in the educational process. We are the pillar and support of the truth (1 Timothy 3:14,15). The church should aid parents (not relieve them) in developing moral character, developing proper work ethics and understanding and appreciating the honor of serving one's community.

Our schools (usually government supported) should be the third institution in the educational process. Unfortunately, many parents and churches have given the responsibility of teaching our children how to live skillfully over to the school system.

Well what can the church do to help educate the members of our community? Firstly, let's once again assume the responsibility of educating our children and not leaving it up to the government. Secondly, let's encourage and enable parents to once again engage in the very difficult task of parenting. After all, if the purpose of God's word is to give wisdom, who better to teach this truth than the people who have been entrusted with the word of God (see Nehemiah 8:1-8).

Thirdly, our churches can be more helpful in educating children by developing ministries that support our neighborhood schools. One suggestion is organizing like minded members of our churches who will help develop reading programs for our children. How about opening the church-house doors to provide after hours help for tutoring our children in math or science?

God's people cannot restrict our activities to Sunday morning wor-

ship services and mid-week prayer meetings and ignore the need of educating our future generations. The beginning of wisdom is the fear (reverence) for God. The church has a responsibility to aid in educating our children.

The church is filled with talented people who can use their imaginations to help educate our children. If we don't engage Satan in the arena of learning, we have no reason to complain when our welfare roles, unemployment lines and prisons increase. To allow ignorance to spread among our community is no less an evil than the slavery that brought our ancestors here. There is nothing wrong with being ignorant that is for a time. There is something wrong with staying ignorant. Encourage every one you know to get involved in educating our children. Let's help those who are trying to help us.

### Investigating Medicaid Fraud

Q: My father recently discovered that his doctor had been billing Medicaid for services my father never received. Where can I report this fraud?

A: Medicaid is a federal/state cost-sharing program that provides health care for the poor and disabled. In Texas, the Medicaid program is administered by the Texas Health

and Human Services Commission. A provider is any person, group of people or health care facility that supplies medical services to Medicaid recipients.

The Medicaid Fraud Control Unit of the Office of the Attorney General of Texas has conducted criminal investigations into allegations of wrongdoing by Medicaid providers since 1979. In 1995, the Texas Legislature enacted the Medicaid Fraud Prevention Act, which gave the Office of the Attorney General the authority to investigate and prosecute civil Medicaid fraud as well.

The Unit investigators and auditors conduct criminal investigations into allegations of fraud, physical abuse, and criminal neglect by Medicaid providers such as physicians, dentists, ambulance companies, laboratories, podiatrists, nursing home administrators and staff. Common investigations include allegations of assault and criminal neglect of patients by Medicaid providers or occurring in a Medicaid facility, fraudulent billings by Medicaid providers, misappropriation of patient trust funds, drug diversion by Medicaid

providers and/or their employees, and filing of false information by Medicaid providers. Many times, these cases are worked in conjunction with other state and federal agencies, such as the FBI and the IRS.

The Unit does not have prosecutorial authority. Criminal fraud cases are presented to state and federal authorities for criminal prosecution. Once referred, these prosecutors determine whether a case will be accepted or declined for prosecution. And once a case is accepted, the prosecuting authority determines the course of the case. In the time that I have been Attorney General, the Unit's investigations have resulted in 107 criminal convictions and the identification in excess of \$41 million in Medicaid overpayments.

In August of 1999, I created the Civil Medicaid Fraud Section within my Elder Law and Public Health Division. Prior to that time, the Office of the Attorney General had conducted relatively few investigations and no lawsuits regarding civil Medicaid fraud. With the creation of the Civil Medicaid Fraud Section, we have dedicated

the resources and efforts of the Elder Law and Public Health Division to fighting fraud, waste and abuse in the Medicaid system. Under the Medicaid Fraud Prevention Act, my office has the authority to investigate and prosecute any person who has committed an "unlawful act" as defined in the statute.

The Elder Law Division is authorized to obtain documents by issuing civil investigative demands, require sworn answers to written questions, and elicit sworn testimony through examinations under oath. The remedies available under the Act are extensive and include the automatic suspension or revocation of the Medicaid provider agreement and/or license of certain providers. To report suspected Medicaid fraud, contact the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit at (512) 463-2011, or by e-mail at [mfcu@oag.state.tx.us](mailto:mfcu@oag.state.tx.us). You can also report suspected fraud or abuse, or fraud committed by Medicaid recipients to the Texas Department of Human Services at (800) 458-9858.

## A Historic Israeli Statement

In January 2002 an ad—historic and urgent—signed by 52 Israeli army reservists, was published in the daily newspaper Ha'aretz stating, in part:

"We, reserve combat officers and soldiers, ... were issued commands and directives that had nothing to do with the security of our country, and that had the sole purpose of perpetuating our control over the Palestinian people. ... We shall not continue to fight beyond the 1967 borders in order to dominate, expel, starve and humiliate an entire people... We hereby declare that we shall continue serving the Israel Defense Forces in any mission that serves Israel's defense. The missions of occupation and oppression do not serve this purpose—and we shall take no part in them."

Over 300 additional Israeli soldiers have since joined in taking this ethical stand. And in a groundswell of support, on February 9th, a demonstration was held by more than 10,000 Israeli and Arab people in Tel Aviv. We are Israelis who proudly support them. We, including some who served in our country's army, respect and are tremendously moved by the great courage of those soldiers. We agree with Ellen Reiss the Class Chairman of Aesthetic Realism, who writes in

The Right of Aesthetic Realism to Be Known about the Israeli army reservists:

"I see their statement... as beautiful, brave, patriotic, true to Judaism, and necessary. What it represents, beyond the immediate situation, is the need for people to look at themselves and ask what it is they truly feel—not what others tell them to feel: not what it is convenient to feel."

We want this historic protest to be a complete success, and we are so grateful to have learned from Aesthetic Realism, the philosophy founded in 1941 by the great historian and poet Eli Siegel, the crucial knowledge that can have peace—the real thing be. Every person, each of us has learned, is in a fight between respect for people and things, and contempt, which Mr. Siegel defined as "the addition to self through the lessening of something else." In a lecture he once said:

"[T]he cause of war cannot be understood until ... contempt in the life of every person is understood, and the thrill [of feeling] that the person you have contempt for, you ... have a right to destroy. ... You cannot be decent while you are not opposed to contempt as steadily as you can be."

The unprecedented objection now being expressed in Israel is an objection to contempt and it is a beautiful thing. It can become a turning point in history. And we feel passionately that what Ellen Reiss explains further in The Right Of, will fortify the resolve in every Israeli and Palestinian to end what has been a centuries-old cycle of brutality:

"... Cruelty and wars will not stop until people are studying contempt ... the feeling, so ordinary, that the way to establish oneself is to look down on someone else. It is this ordinary contempt which, when circumstances arise, has had average citizens agree to "humiliat[e] an entire people." It happens that if we see an unjust feeling of ours truly, really see it, we want to stop having it."

We admire those soldiers who question and refuse to go along with injustice in themselves and in their country. And yet we say too, with great sobriety, the study of contempt is imperative. This study has enabled us to change permanently the way we see Palestinian people - from wanting to be superior to wanting to be just. As far back as 1982, Ellen Reiss gave a vital assignment to Israeli persons studying Aesthetic Realism: to write a 500-word soliloquy on "What does a Palestinian person feel to himself? What are his hopes, what are his fears?" This we did, writing in detail, trying to see with the eyes, mind, and heart of a Palestinian person—for example, a mother, a student, a laborer, a girl. And the feelings of people we once unknowingly, as Mr. Siegel described, got a thrill having contempt for, felt justified in destroying, became real. We really saw the unjust feeling in ourselves and wanted it to stop. We want every person - Israeli and Palestinian alike, from Tel Aviv to Gaza, to join in the ethical campaign to see the feelings of other people as real as our own by this urgent assignment. And then, instead of terror and death overrunning our dear land we will have a safe, kind future. 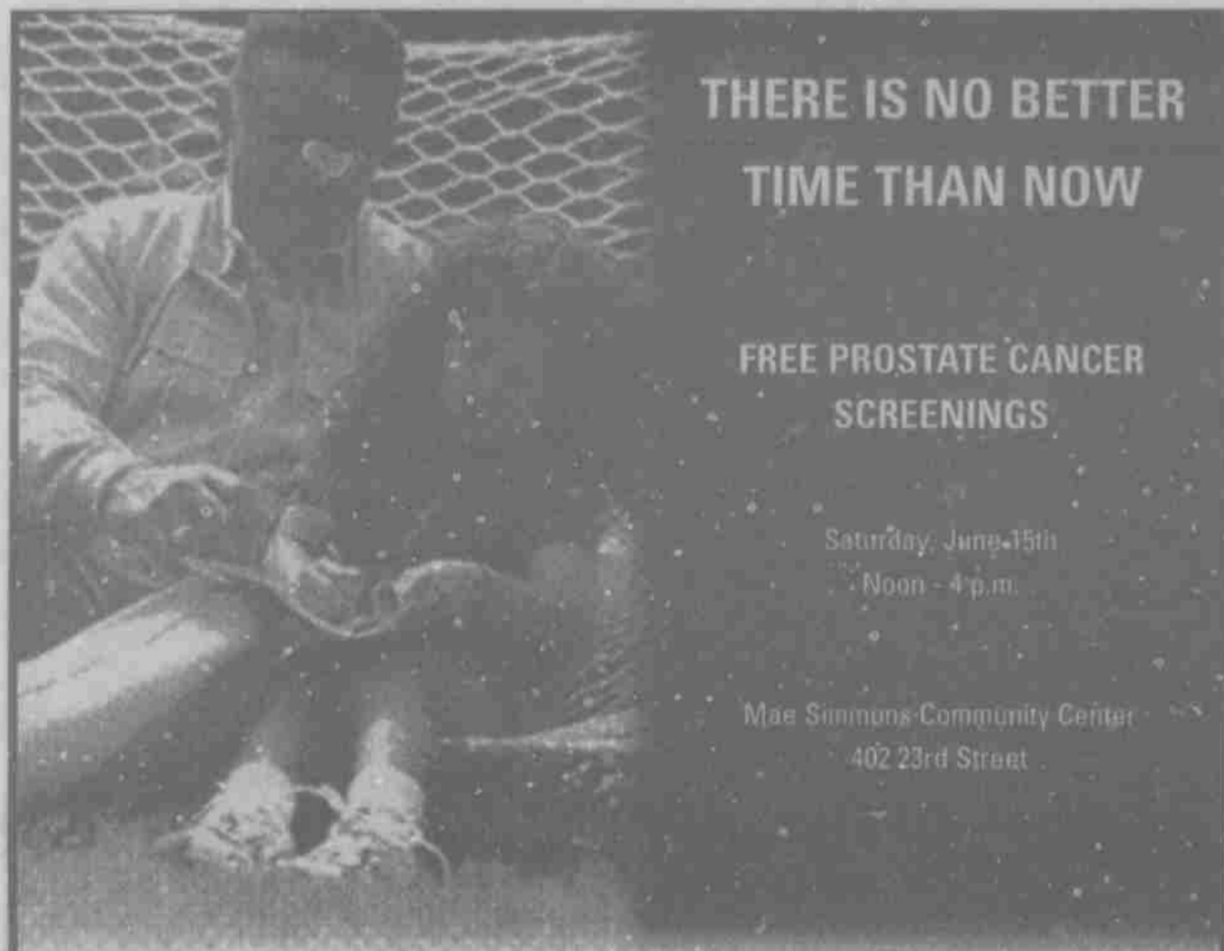
