## Pay It Forward Students Adopt Non-Profit Agencies

For the second consecutive summer students in Texas Tech's Upward Bound Program participated in a unique class called Pay It Forward. Comprised of high school students from schools within a fifty-mile radius of the University, Pay It Forward students adopt non-profit agencies each year and use their interpersonal and academic skills to assist these agencies and their clients.



This summer the class adopted two non-profit agencies and granted them a wish list of specific requested items and projects needed to enhance their operations. One of these agencies was the Texas Commission for the Blind's Summer Work Experience Enrichment Program (SWEEP). Some of the projects the Pay It Forward class did with SWEEP this summer included creating Braille greeting cards and Tee Shirt designs, hosting a talent show, participating in a Ropes

Course, and treating the SWEEP students to an evening to Joyland.

According to Shirley Green, the Pay It Forward Instructor, "Both the sighted and the visually impaired students learned a lot from each other and confirmed the fact that regardless of their physical differences, they had many things in common." The students of Pay It Forward helped build a web page and created a resource brochure for teen mothers at New Direction. They also all contributed money to help establish the Dorothy-Phea Novell Scholarship for graduates of New Direction. This class-farcey the students many skills, as well as how to contribute to the community. As the Pay It Forward slogan in the movie says, "Don't pay it back, pay it forward."

## Local Resident Receives Guide Dog

Ms. Shannon Geihlsler of Lubbock graduated recently with a yellow Labrador Retriever Guide Dog named "Bergen" at her side. The duo completed a month of intensive training at Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc., in San Rafael, California. Graduation took place on Saturday, July 26, at the 11-acre campus, located 20 miles north of San Francisco. Shannon is a criminal defense and family lawyer with her own practice. She resides with her husband, Ken. "Bergen" will be joining two toy poodles, "Ginger" and "Sydney," at home.

During the course of training, Guide Dogs and their new partners learn to work as teams. They practice safe travel techniques on stairways and elevators, on crowded sidewalks and across busy streets. Guide Dogs learn to stop at all curbs and wait until their partners command them to go forward or turn. They will disobey a command to cross a street if traffic is approaching. They guide people safely around pedestrians and obstacles, including overhead obstacles, and avoid distractions. Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc., has produced more than 10,000 trained guides for gradu-

ates across the United States and Canada since 1942. These services are provided free of charge. The organization is supported entirely by private donations. Guide Dogs for the Blind also has a second campus located in Boring, Ore. The 27-acre facility

## from the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith Septicemic Politics

The recent opinion by Randy Sanders, editor of The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal about Texas redistricting fight and the actions of some of the leaders of the Republican Party is to be commended. It is good to know that there are those among you who are free thinkers and have like ideas for the growth and development of all of West Texas.

In today's political environment, it appears as if House Majority Leader Tom Delay, R. Sugar Land, Governor Rick Perry, and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst does all of the thinking for the bright and intellectuals Republicans of the majority group across the state of Texas.

Is there a political similarity here between them an Adolph Hitler, Idi Amin, and Saddam Hussein? Which one is like Idi Amin? I am ashamed that these males are not allowed to think for themselves for fear of alleged retribution down the road.

In Austin, Governor Rick Perry let it be known that he would call as many special sessions as necessary to get redistricting. The so-called Albuquerque fugitives from justice (Eleven Democrats) are across the border in the state of New Mexico to protest the actions of Governor Perry.

The remaining Republicans and one lone Democrat voted to assess fines against the Democrats at \$ 1000 per day each and the amount of the fine would go up every day until it

reaches a maximum amount of \$5,000.

The special sessions that Governor Perry call cost an estimated \$55,000 a day. The special sessions run 45 days and when this \$55,000 a day is multiplied by the 45 days, the cost to the taxpayer is nearly \$2.5 million.

I agree with the words of Randy Sanders: "Delay and others in the national Republican power structure are so determined to turn the Democrats' 17 to 15-margin in the 32 member Texas delegation into a GOP majority that they will destroy a region geographically larger than many states to accomplish their goal. There is no denying that keeping both Stenholm and Neugebauer in Congress is a parochial issue for those who live on the South Plains. If the

**Question:** Why is the kind of clothing you wear important?

fashionably coupled with modesty than simply to wear the latest fashion. Permit me to make this statement as boldly as I can: everyone cannot wear the latest fashion and just because you have the body to wear the latest fashion doesn't mean that you should.

*And let not your adornment be merely external; braiding the hair and wearing gold jewelry, or putting on dresses...*

I have been amazed with the apparent disregard for decent clothing for young and old alike.

I am finding more frequently that the latest fashions are presenting more for the eye to see and less for the imagination to ponder. Quite honestly some of the clothing being worn should not be worn by some of the people wearing it.

Let me offer you some guidelines for decent attire. (1) If the waistline on your pants fall beneath your buttocks then get some pants that fit. (2) If you have more layers of midriff exposed than you have covered clothing. (3) If you can't figure

out in which direction the bill of the cap goes, ask somebody. 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## National Grant Approved for Study of Local Transportation Need/Fundings

The South Plains Transportation Alliance and Texas Citizen Fund, partnering with Citibus of Lubbock, have received a \$50,000 grant to assess the transportation needs of this community. Focused in part on employment transportation for workers who cannot or do not drive, the grant will produce a community-wide action plan by March, 2004.

The grant comes from Easter Seals "Project Action" and the Community Transportation Association of America. Those organizations received 98 grant proposals from throughout the nation. Only 9 have been approved.

Officials of "Project Action" and the C.T.A. say the local proposal distinguished itself by a broad base of community interest—indicated by dozens of letters from such diverse supporters as the mayor of Lubbock, the chancellor of Texas Tech University, the Lubbock Independent School District, Goodwill Industries, Covenant Health System, University Medical Center Health System, the Lubbock Regional office of the Texas Department of Transportation, the Texas Commission for the Blind, and the Texas Rehabilitation Commission.

The study will also seek to identify future sources of funding for Citibus, which is currently facing budget constraints because of changes in federal guidelines. Citibus General Manager John L. Wilson says, "Because transportation represents a critical issue to our passengers and to our entire community, we are committed to supporting the successful progress and completion of this study."

## State Funds Available for Energy Assistance

The City of Lubbock has received an energy assistance grant from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, and the funds will be available the week of August 11 to assist low-income persons with their utility bills.

The state-funded Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) Grant is designed to help low-income persons pay their energy bills. Priority is given to the elderly, disabled, and homes with small children.

This is not an entitlement program, and people who apply for funds are not guaranteed assistance. Each application will be evaluated and the level of assistance will be determined.

The City of Lubbock will work with two local agencies to implement the program - Neighborhood House (741-0459) and Catholic Family Services (765-8475). Neighborhood House will handle elderly and disabled applicants, and those who seek assistance due to a weather crisis. Catholic Family Services will assist applicants who are transitioning out of poverty and who have to provide a co-pay for the assistance.

All applicants must call the appropriate agency and make an appointment for an interview. Walk-ins will not be seen. Both agencies will start taking appointments beginning Monday.

The elderly and disabled part of the grant helps qualified applicants with utility bill assistance during the year. Lubbock residents who think they may qualify for assistance should contact Neighborhood House. Neighborhood House also will handle the weather crisis component of the grant, which pays for energy usage only during a crisis month.

Weather crisis is defined using the temperatures of each month and the City has declared July a crisis month. Residents who receive their July utility bills and need assistance in paying them may qualify for these funds. This program does not assist with arrears, late charges, or deposits. This component is open to income-qualified persons.

The final component to the CEAP grant emphasizes energy reduction in the home. Referrals to this program will come from Neighborhood House and Catholic Family Services. The goals of the CEAP program are to reduce energy consumption and assist low-income persons with energy bills during peak times.

## In Cinque

When we listen to the news on the radio, on the television and read the newspapers, we wonder, "Where are we going? What are we doing?" All of the indicators of the status of our communities, our states, our nation, our world, say that we are in the midst of great troubles. The troubles are reflected in our homes. Wherever we turn, there is trouble. There are those who will say that we are in our last days. Maybe we are, but who knows the length of a day?

Ministers of the Christian faith would have us believe that these are the last days and the length of a day is short. A couple of writers, one a ministers have written a series of books about the last days and they are best sellers. The first was called Left Behind and it was fol-

lowed by at least eight other novels in the series. There are twelve topics in this series for kids between the ages of ten and fourteen.

Reading these books can put something on your mind especially if you have read St. Matthew, chapter 14, verses 5 through 8 in the Bible. "5 For many shall come in my name, saying; I am Christ; and shall deceive many. 6 And ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars; see that ye be not troubled; for all these things must come to pass; but the end is not yet. 7. For nation shall rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom; and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in divers places. 8. All these are the beginning of sorrows.

This passage from the Bible, coupled with the variety of books on the market about the last days and the ministers on the air who speak of this every day, appears to cause some people to believe that if they are not going to be here long, that they may as well do pretty

much whatever they want to do, regardless to whom they hurt. People are dying every day because someone wants something that he does not have a right to, unless he tramples on someone else's territory. Fighting in Bosnia, Afghanistan, Iraq and Liberia demands huge war efforts from a country which is considered to be a peacemaker and watchdog of human rights. Must one nation fight on all of these fronts? Is there really any peace-keeping going on? Is the end in sight?

Any day can be your last day when you are careless, disrespectful, dishonest, over-bearingly demanding and in general not concerned about how your desires affect others. It is time that we get 'in cinque' and realize that the amount of time that we have is so often not nearly as important as the quality of our time. We need to love one another, all of God, children, and keep the great commandment by loving and believing in a higher order.
