






Think About It!



Strengthening and securing Social Security: Four Pillars to Retirement

'Four Pillars To Retirement'

There are four pillars to retirement security and only one that is risk free - Social Security. The others pillars are pensions and savings; continued earnings; and health insur-

But, less than half of working Americans have a pension plen where they work. Personal savings are at an all-time low.

The average older American now spends nearly a third of his or her income on health care. And although many older Americans are having to work longer, age discrimination and a weak job market limit what they can earn.

The fact is, Social Security supplies nearly half of the income for many older Arrericans. The percentages are even higher among minority populations. And for one-third of beneficiaries, especially older women, Social Security is all that stands between them and a life of abject poverty.

The first thing we need to know is that Social Security is strong. Instead of a major overhaul, it needs fine-tuning to

make sure it remains strong. While it is true that in 2018, Social Security will begin paying out more that it takes in, the Trust Fund will be large enough to pay 100 percent of promised benefits through 2042. After that, if no changes were made, there would still be enough Social Security money coming in to pay about 70 percent of all benefits for decades beyond,

> Here are two examples experts that could strengthen Social Security for the future:

> First, the current maximum wage subject to Social Security payments in 2005. Raising that cap to \$140,000 - phased-in over 10 years - would lower Social Security's projected shortfall by 43 percent.

This is fair because higher wage earners have recently benefited from substantial tax cuts and other subsidies for their investment and retirement accounts. Second, Social Security's Trust Fund investments could be diversified to increase the likelihood of higher returns.

Investing some of these funds in a broad stock index and, as most other pension systems do, could yield higher returns. This would spread the risk across the whole population and all generations, unlike private accounts.





West Texas Dust: Just dirt or a health risk?

A lot has been said about the dust bowl days of the 1930's. William Faulkney's Grapes of Wrath painted a vivid picture of those fleeing the devastation of the dust boy'l and the Great Depression. Today, in Lubbock, Texas, we still have the occasional sand storm. Some storms are so. dark that they block out the som; the streetlights turn on in midday. But is all of this "dirt" in the air really sand?

measured in a gatton bucket.

What was this "dirt"? Was it sand and clay (inorganic compounds) or was it bazardous organic compounds? Mold. leaf litter, cotton list, cetton stalks, cartle manure and my other living, or dead, piants or animals, or their waste products, are organic compounds.

When the wind blows in West Texas, the dirt moves. The National Arbor Day Foundation reports from the Cooperative Extension Service that an acre of I renovated a house built in topsoil can contain "about 900 pounds c. earthworms, 2,400 pounds of fungi, 1,500 pounds of bacteria, 133 pound: of protozoa, and 890 pounds of insects and other arthropods". Now, when the "dirt" blows in from a cotton field in West Texas, how much of the "dirt" is inorganic sand or clay and how much is an organic product?

Few of us are allergic to sand dirt in 48 sq. ft. that it could be and other organic compounds.

When hie "dirt" blows it streams imo older houses and creops and seeps into even new and tightby built houses and buildings.

Heating and air conditioning units with forced air circulation pick up this fine dust and deposit it. on coils, in ducts, on grills, on walls, ceilings, floors, and furnisture. The bulk, probably morthan 99%, of this material is often organic.

Mold, mildew, and mushrooms are all fungi. Mold spores are one of the most common and abundant particles in air. We are almost constantly breathing in mold and mold spores. Most prople tolerate mold and mold spore at low levels. However, nigh efficiency particulate arrestors, commonly called HEPA filters, may concentrate mold on the filter surfaces of forced-air heating and cooling systems. Mold produces, and releases, gaseous compounds called mycotoxins. These toxic compounds pass through the filters and are circulated by the

forced-air system. Some air cleaning technologies such as activated charcoal filters will absorb and remove gastous compounds such as mycotoxias. However, activated charcoal, like a cup, can only hold so much macrial and then it fills up and the mycotoxins spill

Technologies using ultraviolet lights and light-activated reactors can not only kill mold, and mold spores, but will also destroy myco-

With 1,500 pounds of bacteria per acre of topseil, a large component of the West Texas "dirt" is bacteria. Most bacteria are harmless and some are even essential in healthy people. However, others such as the coliform bacteria (Escherichia coli) are found in the gut of warm-blooded animals. E. coli presents a human health hazard when they contaminate food or become airborne and are taken in by breathing.

Nevember, 2003, reported that 23 people were sreated in a hospital after visiting a county fair in Ohio. Initially, it was thought that the patients suffered from food poisoaing. After further investigation their illness was attrabuted to airbome E. coli of the C157 strain from an animal show barn. Six individuals were hospitalized and two suffered kidney failure. Seven months after close of the fair, viable B. coli was found in dust on the rafters of the show bam. E. coli has been known to survive in the environment for over 10 months.
