Sister Gives Gift of Love to Brother

A Slaton woman, Sharon Mask-Lusk, wanted to share a gift of love on Tuesday, August 5, 2003, when she donated one of hir kidneys to her younger brother Jerry Mask. You'see, they are very close. They best of friends.

It was one year ago when Jerry, age 33, approached his older sister, Sharon, and asked if she would consider donating a kidney to him. Jerry, a 100 percent service connected veteran, has been ailing with kidney disease and on dialysis for years, needed her kidney.

Sharon desired to help her brother, but she was afraid. A few morths ago, Jerry collapsed and was placed on artificial life support. It was a touch and go nearly two weeks. It was known whether if Jerry would sur Ove. When the ventilator was removed, and Jerry continued to breath on his own, Sharon knew that it was by the grace of God that her brother was alive.

It was then that she made the decision to share one of her kidneys with her brother. With a smile on her face, Sharon shares that God answered her prayers. "The fear is no longer there, I conquered the fear through my faith in Jesus Christ," Sharon states.

Conquering this fear led to testing which revealed that Sharon and Jerry were perfect matches for the kidney transplant.

Sharon is married to Roger Lusk, and are parents of three children, ranging in ages from 10 to 16. Jerry has four sons, ranging in ages 7 to 16.

Sharon and Jerry are residents of Slaton, Sharon is employed with the Lubbock Veterans Administration Outpatient Clinic in Nursing Service.



Jesus lived in a society that placed high value on the sense of hearing. Few people could read. If they could, reading material was costly and rare. To acquire knowledge, people depended largely on word of mouth. They were accustomed to listening and memorizing. On the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus says to the crowd, "You have heard this" or "you have heard that," and then he goes on to make his point. There were no textbooks, no pamphlets, and no news releases. To know what Jesus was preaching and teaching, one had to listen.

Being born with the ability to hear is not of our doing. But the ability to listen is an art that we must develop ourselves.

(parents, children, spouses and friends) involved in a soon to be civil war. This scene cannot possible be healthy.

As difficult as this situation is, it is possible to resolve it but not without a great deal of pain in one or more of the relationships. In 2 Corinthians 6:14,15 the apostle Paul gives a serious admonition about this kind of relationship. "Do not be bound together with unbeliever; for what partnership have righteousness and lawlessness, or what fellowship has light with darkness? What harmony has Christ with Belial?"

Although Paul addressed the relationship between a Christian and an unbeliever, there can be

equal strife between different Christian persuasions. Do not underestimate the significance of religion in the life of a potential mate. Do not casually think that you can just love each other enough to get through this issue. This kind of reasoning is not clear thinking, it is the feeling of infatuation. A relationship cannot endure on the foundation of infatuation. Make sure that you get the necessary help in dealing with this issue before marriage. If not you will find yourself in divorce court a lot faster than you expected.








John Census Bureau **Updating Information** on Nation's Veterans

The nation had 24.3 million veterans as of 2001, of whom 1.6 million were women and 2.2 million had a service-connected disability. Have these numbers increased, decreased or stayed the same since then?

The Census Bureau's monthly Current Population Survey (CPS), which began in 1942 and is the largest and longest-running household survey in the country, will yield an answer to these and other questions about the nation's military veterans.

"The survey collects information on veterans status by a variety of characteristics, such as age, sex, race, Hispanic origin, period of service, labor force status and disability status," said Alfonso E. Mirabal, director of the Census Bureau's Dallas regional office. "The Census Bureau collects these data in

the CPS every other August. The statistics are used to analyze the characteristics of disabled veterans, measure the effectiveness of current veterans' benefits programs and help plan future programs and facilities for veterans."

Census Bureau field representatives also ask about the characteristics of the country's labor force. Data are collected on employment, unemployment, hours of work, earnings, age, sex, race, marital status, educational attainment, occupation and industry. From these data comes the monthly unemployment rate, which the Dureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is scheduled to release on Sept.

By law, the Census Bureau must keep confidential all information that would identify survey respondents or their addresses. Local households selected in the nationwide sample receive a letter from Census Bureau Director Louis Kincannon. Some will be interviewed by telephone and others, in person. The field representatives carry official identification cards.




