Concerning the Relocation to Lubbock City Cemetery

To my readers, please allow me to complete my view of an intellectual, ultra conservative pseudo African American male (Thomas Sowell) whose columns appears in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal at a later date. The issue at hand is the "relocation of the entrance to the City of Lubbock Cemetery."

It is heartbreaking to many of us to see the infomercials on television depicting the children in various countries around the world who are undernourished or starving to death and playing upon our sympathy and empathy to send money to an agency to feed these children. Some of them ask us to adopt one of these children and in return receive a picture of the child and some form or correspondence from that child at some time or another. Some of the children are dying, but some success stories are shown us of a few children whom we have received food money and look happy and thankful.

I certainly do believe the children all over the world need to be fed. I further believe that it is a noble act to feed and clothe the children of the world, and no matter how tear-jerky those advertisements or

informercials are, I just wonder how many of the children that we see and hear about in other countries are really being fed as a result of those money pitches on television. Aside from that, I feel that our children at home need to be fed, too.

Our children at home have thrived thus far on United States Department of Agriculture rations along with food stamp benefits, especially those received in our schools. Schools have been providing free and reduced priced breakfasts and lunches to our school-aged children for many years. Those same children are eligible for and received food stamps benefits at home as well, which means that parents are responsible to feed their children an evening meal and on the weekends, totaling about eleven meals a week, and we are finding that many of that eleven is secured at the fast food restaurants.

Fast food restaurants are known for the high caloric value of the food which they serve. Growing children need a lot of calories to stay healthy

especially when they are very active. What we are not sure of is the nutritional value of what they eat. Most fast foods contain a lot of fat and sugar and very little protein and other nutrients that a child needs to be active and stay healthy. Parents should ask for the nutritional listings for what their children eat. Most will give you a copy if you ask. I and not knocking fast food restaurants because I frequent them myself sometimes, but it is not my steady diet, and it should not be the steady diet of our children. Let them keep those toys that they give out with a child's meal. Many of them have hazardous parts for small children anyway, and the larger child will not likely find a need for it for long if they do get it.

The child's meal is probably most healthy for adults, since it has smaller portions. If we eat healthy, we avoid many of the diseases that carry us away from here, later in life, rather than earlier. Let us get 'in cinque' and feed our children here at home.
