

#### Student sketches could preserve fading history

There is a story behind every architectural styles. building. And while the stories of former slave "80" John the College of Architecture, said community is to document the with honor in the U.S. Army may not be told in traditional fextbooks, their contributions helped shape the bigger story of

the Wild West. Texas Tech University's College of Architecture and members of the university's Upward Bound Program are now working to document part of their stories. High School students with the Upward Bound Program - which seeks to develop the skills and motivation needed to achieve success in college - recently trekked across West Texas documenting the places black Seminoies and "80" John, or Daniel Webster Wallace, called home.

Wallace was bom a slave but eventually became a wellrespected rancher who owned more than 10,000 acres of West Texas land. The Seminole-Negro Indians were escaped slaves who took refuge with the Seminole Indians in Florida. They served as scouts in the Indian Wars of the late 1800s and four of them received the Congressional Medal of Honor. They are buried at Fort Clark near Brackettville, Texas.

The Upward Bound students, along with faculty members College the Architecture, spent two days doing initial documentation of structures at both the Wallace Ranch and Fort dark. They sketched, photographed, measured and otherwise documented the buildings.

#### Early Learning Centers provides summer child care

Lubbock, a United Way agency, Care activities this summer in North and East Lubbock. Daily activities are planned for the children, such as field trips, games, art and reading. Breakfast, lunch and snack are provided to each child at no additional cost to the parent. The centers are open from 6:30 am to 6:00 pm Monday through Friday. The cost of fulltime care ranges from \$60.00 to \$85.00 per week and may be less if the parent receives services from South Plains Child Care Services.

The Early Learning Centers operates five child care centers in North and East Lubbock. Fees are based on income for eligible tamilies, with the help of United Way, the CH Foundation, Texas Tech University and South Plains Child Care Services. Approximately 450 children, ages infants to school age, attend the Early Learning Centers.

Children also benefit from ELC's partnerships with community volunteers. The Foster Grandparent program provides several "grandparent volunteers" for twenty hours each week to work with the children. Texas Tech University's Jumpstart Program provides more than 40 student volunteers each year. The volunteers spend 6-10 hours per
