## Wilmer-Hutchins school district used suspended attorney, James Belt

The Wilmer-Hutchins School District's chief attorney was suspended by the State Bar of Texas last year, and it was revealed at least once during the suspension he used the state bar identification number of a lawyer who had been dead for 20 years.

It was reported last week, attorney James Belt has had his law license suspended twice since Wilmer-Hutchins School District hired him in 1998. On a court filing from November 2003, he used the bar number of O.E. Threlkeld, a Seguin, Texas lawyer whose legal career began in 1929.

Mr. Belt is a central figure in the troubled school district, where the Texas Education Agency auditors have been investigating finances. Last month, school board President Luther Edwards admitted the Wilmer-Hutchins School District is run by a "team of nine" -Superintendent Charles Matthews, the seven school

board members and Mr. Belt. It was two years ago when

Mr. Belt has been publicly reprimanded by the state twice, according to bar records. In 1995, he broke a rule that required him to "take steps to .... protect a client's inter-

ests" after that client had stopped using Mr. Belt as her attorney. In 1999, Mr. Belt violated

rules requiring attorneys to keep their clients informed about the status of a case.

Those public reprimands did not affect his ability to practice law. But in 2001, he fell behind in paying his but dues and a spethe Texas Comptroller's Office cial state tax all attorneys must

Despite this, bar association's disciplinary records reveal Mr. Belt continued to do legal work for Wilmer-Hutchins School District. The district also renewed his contract for three additional years during his sus-

Because he continued practicing law, an evidentiary panel of the state bar suspended Mr. Belt's license to practice law for six months in June 2003.

That means he was allowed to continue practicing law during his suspension as long as he met a lengthy list of requirements. ## The Bush Agenda: "Making Home Ownership a Reality for Black America"

My neighbor and friend, Foster Cumming, a sage of the old school of political science and human rights and a savant of the new school of thought toward cultural diversity and a realistic in the thought of oneness and wholeness of generations five hundred years from the present is far ahead of the credenda that inhibit his peers.

The word that Le often speaks with authoritative force to me has its roots in the word "equality" which means "the state of being equa'; corresponrank, or ability. The word is Danish, French and English. "equalization."

The word "equalization" leads to defining two idroms: "Read between the lines" which means to pay attention to what is implied in writing or speech, and "play second fiddle" which mean to play a supporting or minor role in relation to someone else. acts from the Bush presidency toward minorities is his national priority for home ownership. Minorities and Black Americans in particular under the leadership of President Bush should take advantage of new opportunities to own their homes. The relative equanimity of Mr. Bush toward more than the eye.

Therefore, we applaud President Bush in his push for homeownership for people belonging to the same gene pool as the majority Americans. After all, why should the descendants of those who help build the land sphere including N, Central, & S, and who are the cousins of the true owners of the land (Native Americans) and the cousins that control the purse string (European whites) be left behind. This would be a form of ethnic cleansing. Are we not heirs by blood? And since the majority of our African Americans fore-parents have not received their 40 acres of land and their mule that were promised by the government upon emancipation, why should not the mixed offsprings be compensated with nothing less than the opportunity to purchase a home? ## WTOS candidate accountability session focuses on local health care, education issues

Lubbock, TX (September 2004)- The West Texas Organizing Strategy (WTOS) will sponsor a candidate accountability session on Sunday, Sept. 19, from 3-5 p.m. at the Christian Renewal Center, located at 4th Street and Toledo in Lubbock. Candidates for public office at the local, state and federal levels have been invited to participate in this forum, which is expected to draw more than 750 delegates from member churches in the area,

The meeting will give WTOS members an opportunity to raise critical issues affecting families with public officials and aspirants to elected office, before voters go to the polls on Nov. 2. Residents have been invited from WTOS congrega-Lubbock. tions throughout

Hereford, and Dimmitt. Growing out of hundreds of house meetings held by member churches, the idea for an accountability session with candidates came from local residents who were concerned about steep budget cuts last year by the Texas State Legislature in the areas of health care and education and funding for public schools. Over 150,000 children were cut from the Children-s Heaith. Insurance Program (CHIP) and move had their benefits reduced, said Virginia Alamanza, WTOS leader with St. Elizabeths Catholic Church.

"Many of these families told me they've just been devastated by these budget cuts in the CHIP program," added Lane Powell, WTOS co-chairperson. "Its really difficult for struggling, working parents to manage on a day-to-day basis when they have to dig deeper into their pockets before their kid? can sec a doctor."

Leon Williams, WTOS leader with Central Lubbock Church of

Christ, noted that expressed concern about the recent power struggle over redistricting in the last legislative session, "Our goal is to make sure that the voices of working families are beard in the upcoming elections," said Williams.

The accountability session will also address cutbacks in public school funding and recent proposals that require hospitals to ask the immigration status of patients as part of a federal program to reimburse medical institutions for providing services to undocumented workers.

WTOS builds constituencies of leaders and community members around a family agenda that addresses important quality of life issues that impacts area residents. It organizes and trains leaders from across the region to become active and effective citizens. It is a coalition of 60 churches, public school, and civic groups.

"That was probably the most incredible moment of my musical life." he said. "And working with Smokey Robinson on the song Ebony Eyes was a tremendous thrill."

During the early '80's, the outspoken entertainer ergaged in a lieuvily publicized battle to get his videos and those of other Black Artists aired on the then rock dominated MTV.

Michael Jackson and Prince videos were later played, but the five videos submitted by James were rejected because it was "firnk" music and MTV only played "rock and roll," an MTV spokesperson at that time said. By 1990, rapper MC Hammer had just released the song U Can't Touch This, which sampled James's song Super

U Can't Touch This became one of played were guitar, bass, keyboards and the biggest rap songs of all time and won Hammer and James, who shared the songwriting credit, Grammy awards. That was the only Grammy James ever earned.

James characterized himself as "The most sampled artist in history," with his music being use din songs by: Mary J. Blige, J-Lo, and Ja Rule, LL Cool J, Ashanti, Will Smith, Salt "n"

"This Buffalo project boy was like a phoenix rising from asl es to the pinnacle of America's musical world," said his cousin, former Ohio congressman Louis Stokes at the memorial service. "He took us all with him on a roller coaster ride. Rick James became our family's first superstar."

Later that day members of his Stone City Band, who served as pallbearers, and 70 gospel singers performed a lively tribute concert at Martin Luther King Jr. Park to the man who coined the phrase Super Freak, the title of his 1981 hit song.

James was cremated after the service according to funeral director Vincent Amigone.

Three days earlier, more than 1,200 fans atwaded a public viewing at the Forest Lawn Mortuary in Los Angeles.

The following day the Grammy Award-winning funk star was remerrbered during a private four-hour ceremony, filled with family, friends and music, at Forest Lawn.

Called A Celebration of the Life of Rick James, Bishop Noel Jones delivered the eulogy.

The Hon. Minister Louis Farakhan, whom James often went to for counceling, spoke for 45 minutes about the late funk icon.

Stevie Wonder and gospel singer Eric Dawkins both delivered heartwrenching musical tribute to James. Ali-Ollie Woodson, formerly of the Temptations who sang lead with James on the song Standing On The Top, also performed a musical tribute.

James "loved and idolized" the late Mar. in Gaye, who was among his closest musical buddies. Gaye's daughter, singer-actress Nona Gaye, attended the private ceremony as did t Motown founder Berry Gordy Jr and comedianactor Jamie Foxx.

James died in his sleep at his




