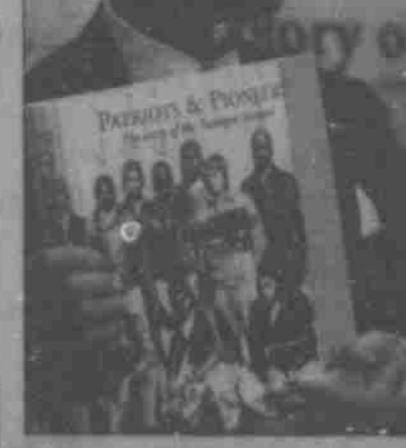
## Lessons in Leadership: McCrary, Alabama Power honored by Tuskegee Airmen

When America entered World War II in 1941, its military, like many institutions across the country, was racially segregated. Many people believed that black men lacked the intelligence, skill, courage and patriotism to make a valuable contribution to the American fight for freedom. But a number of young African Americans set out to prove them wrong in a quest that would forever change the military and American history. Those young men became known as THE TUSKEGEE AIRMEN.

The story of the Tuskegee Airmen's role in overcoming racism and eventually influencing the integration of the U.S. Armed Forces was rarely told and all but forgotten by history for almost 60 years. But two years ago, the Alabama Power Company, led by its CEO, Charles McCrary, decided to sponsor a documentary about the Tuskegee Airmen to preserve history and honor these Americans. *The Tuskegee Airmen*, a Rubicon Production for the Public Broadcasting System, featured 10 original Tuskegee Airmen and premiered in Birmingham, Ala., in 2002.

From Aug. 3-8, 2004, the Tuskegee Airmen gathered for their annual convention in Omaha, Neb. At each convention, awards are presented to individuals and corporations that have shown extraordinary leadership and courage and have made strides toward accomplishing the ideals of the Tuskegee Airmen. For his role in leading Alabama Power's historical and educational efforts about the Tuskegee Airmen, McCrary was inducted as an honorary Tuskegee Airmen. All true Tuskegee Airmen don red blazers with a distinguishing Tuskegee Airmen crest on the pocket. And

during a special ceremony, McCrary received his own red blazer, making him an official Tuskegee Airmen.

During this year's convention, Tuskegee Airmen Inc. presented its Pinnacle Award to Alabama Power Company for contributions made to solidify the Tuskegee Airmen's legacy.

**History Remembers**  
On July 9, 1941, as war raged in Europe, the Army Air Forces (AAF) began a program in Tuskegee, Ala., to train African Americans as military pilots. Because some people doubted that these men could become productive pilots, the program has often been referred to as the "Tuskegee Experiment." Dedicated young men from across the country came to Alabama to train in the new program. Many came from New York City, Washington, Los Angeles, Chicago, Philadelphia and Detroit, and each one had a strong personal desire to serve the United States to the best of his ability. Despite the doubts of skeptics, the "experiment" proved successful — by the end of the war in 1945, the Tuskegee-based flight-training program had graduated almost 1,000 pilots.

Following the widespread success of the documentary, Alabama Power Company teamed with the Alabama State Department of Education earlier this year to develop *Patriots and Pioneers*, an educational resource for public school students to learn the story of the Tuskegee Airmen. "It's a story that younger generations need to hear and older generations should never forget," McCrary said, upon unveiling the recently released educational resource.

*Patriots and Pioneers* includes a VHS copy of *The Tuskegee Airmen*, along with a viewing guide, five days of teacher lesson plans, quizzes and take-home activities for students. The packet has now been placed in more than 2,000 classrooms across Alabama, and *Patriots and Pioneers* is now an official component of the social studies curriculum for all Alabama public school students. Plans are underway to seek an endorsement from the U.S. Department of Education, which could place the legacy of the Tuskegee Airmen in social studies classrooms across the nation.

### Who Were the Tuskegee Airmen?

As Alabama schoolchildren are learning through *Patriots and Pioneers*, of the more than 900 pilots trained at Tuskegee during World War II, 450 were sent into combat overseas; 66 were killed in the war, and 32 became prisoners of war. The first Tuskegee Airmen to fight overseas were members of the 99th Fighter Squadron, which made a name for itself flying over North Africa, Sicily and Italy during 1943 and 1944. The squadron was especially known for its success in providing fighter escort to bombing missions over strategic targets in Europe. As the Tuskegee Airmen flew more than 200 escort missions without ever losing a bomber, white American bomber crews reverently referred to them as

"The Red Tail Angels" because of the identifying red paint on their planes' nose and tail assemblies.

Lieutenant Colonel Benjamin Davis, Jr., a member of the first graduating class from the Tuskegee flight training school, the 332nd also played an important role in the war. Some pilots who were members of the squadron sank a German destroyer with machine gun fire from their P-47s in June 1944, and the 332nd participated in the invasion of southern France in August 1944 by escorting bombers and on ground attack missions in Romania and Czechoslovakia.

### Significance to America

While World War II African-American pilots performed their duties well, they were continually faced with racism and bigotry both overseas and at home. Together, they fought two wars simultaneously — one against the foreign enemies and another against the segregation and racism in American society. In time, they were successful in achieving victories on both battlefronts.

One group of black pilots who did not go overseas, the 477th Medium Bombardment Group, faced tremendous racism. Although the group's members were highly trained officers, they were treated as trainees and denied access to the officers' club at their base in Selfridge Field, Mich., an act that was contradictory with Army regulations. Hostility continued and the 477th was eventually transferred to Freeman Field, Ind., where racial division came to a climax. When black officers tried to enter the Freeman Field Officers' Club, 103 officers were arrested, charged with insubordination and ordered to face court martial. The court martial proceedings were quickly dropped against 100 of the officers; two officers eventually had their charges dropped and one officer was convicted.

Fifty years later, at the 1995 Tuskegee Airmen National Convention, 15 of the original 103 officers that were arrested received official notification that their military records had been purged of any reference to the Freeman Field incident. The one court martial conviction had been reversed and the officer's military record cleared, and the remaining officers received instructions for clearing their records as well.

After World War II ended in 1945, many African-American pilots chose to stay in the military but because of segregation their assignments were limited to only a few all-black units. For this reason, opportunities for advancement and promotion were very limited, and this lack of opportunity sometimes affected morale. Many white units were understaffed and needed qualified officers, but were unable to get experienced black personnel because of the military's segregation policy. It became obvious that desegregation was necessary for the military. Based on the success of the Tuskegee Airmen during World War II, President Harry Truman in 1948 signed Executive Order 9981, which directed equality of treatment and opportunity in all of the U.S.

Armed Forces. This order eventually led to the end of racial segregation in the military forces, which was the first step toward racial integration in all of U.S. society.

The Tuskegee Airmen weren't just war heroes; they were true American heroes. With their outstanding record of accomplishment and their superb conduct throughout World War II and after, they helped lead a nation through historic social change to achieve racial equality in America.

### Tuskegee Airmen Today

In 1972, the veterans of the so-called "Tuskegee Experiment" formed the Tuskegee Airmen Inc. (TAI), a national organization to preserve the legacy of the Tuskegee Airmen and to find scholarships for promising young people. Now with more than 2,000 members across the country, TAI still seeks to inspire young people to outstanding achievement through studying, "sacrificing and attaining self-sustaining status with marketable skills in the fields of aviation and aerospace.

The highlight of the year for Airmen is the opportunity to gather for the national TAI annual convention, which offers them a chance to stay in touch with their heritage and each other. At this year's convention, TAI honored Charles McCrary and his company, Alabama Power Company, for their leadership and vision in preserving history and fostering education at the grassroots level.

TAI gives the Pinnacle Award to a corporation, individual or organization that has contributed money or services that value more than \$100,000. As a result of the company's sponsorship of the *Patriots and Pioneers* educational resource and *The Tuskegee Airmen* documentary, as well as other consideration to the Tuskegee Airmen family, Alabama Power has been chosen as TAI's Corporate Citizen of the Year and as the recipient of the prestigious Pinnacle Award.

And, McCrary was inducted as an hono-

rary Tuskegee Airmen. During the TAI's Heritage Luncheon on Aug. 4, McCrary received his own red blazer.

McCrary first joined Alabama Power in 1970, as an engineering student at Auburn University. Since then, he has held various positions within the company, culminating in his current position as resident and CEO. An involved and concerned corporate citizen, McCrary serves on a number of boards, and has headed several initiatives for education, economic development, the arts and community organizations. He was recently chosen as Executive of the Year.

In their efforts to share the legacy of the Tuskegee Airmen with new generations of Americans, McCrary and Alabama Power exhibited the same type of leadership and courage for which the Tuskegee Airmen first achieved greatness. More than a half-century ago, the young Americans known as Tuskegee Airmen embraced the opportunity to make a difference, and through their leadership and dignity, the world as they knew it was changed. With everyday heroes like McCrary and Alabama Power continuing to live by such virtues, the American legacy exemplified by the Tuskegee Airmen will live on.

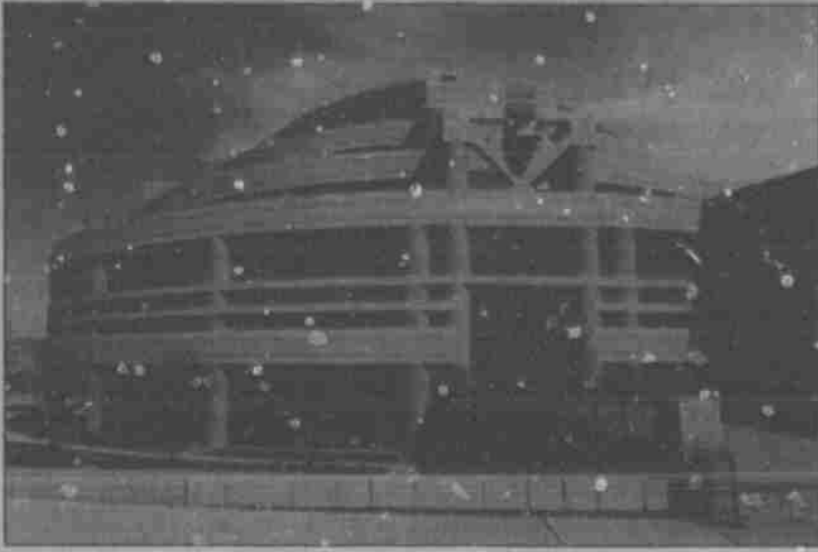

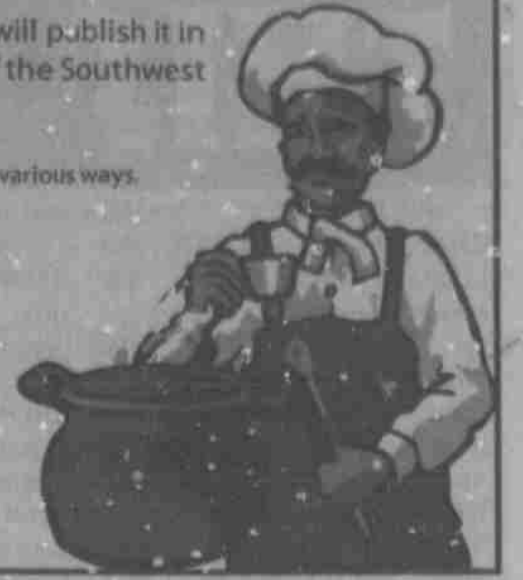

# Colonial Williamsburg's Brothers-In-Arms weekend October 8-10 delves into slavery, freedom and the American Revolution

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. - Join Colonial Williamsburg during Columbus Day Weekend, Oct. 8-10, as it presents the story of African-Americans in the American Revolution during the 8th annual Brothers-In-Arms Weekend. Guests explore the compelling stories of thousands of free and enslaved African-Americans who were active participants in the War for Independence as soldiers, sailors, camp followers, pioneers, spies and laborers.

Brothers-In-Arms underscores the importance of self-determination as free and enslaved men and women transformed their personal lives and the future of their nation. Their hunger for freedom became the foundation for future struggles for freedom and equality in the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries.

The weekend events begin at 3 p.m. Friday, Oct. 8 with "Revolutionary Promise: Our Struggle to Be Both Free and Equal" in the Hennage Auditorium of the DeWitt Wallace Decorative Arts Museum. Several "people from the past" - an African-American soldier, a Founding Father and military officers - share their conflicting perspectives on the troubling issue of slavery, freedom and the American Revolution.

The events continue Saturday, Oct. 9 when the experienced and battle-tested reenactment soldiers of the American Continental Army and the Rhode Island Regiment take to the field in an encampment on the grounds of Bassett Hall, the original Williamsburg home of Colonial Williamsburg benefactor John D. Rockefeller Jr. and his wife, Abby Aldrich Rockefeller.

The Rhode Island Regiment represented one of the many "speckled troops" (integrated) of the American Revolution. Through vignettes and interactions with the soldiers and officers, guests discover the experiences and stories of this diverse group of men of African, American Indian and European descent that fought side-by-side as they prepared for the siege of Yorktown in the fall of 1781.

The weekend concludes Sunday, Oct. 10 as the encampment represents a regiment of former slaves who joined the British Army, Lord Dunmore's Royal Ethiopian Regiment. In 1775 Virginia Gov. Dunmore's Proclamation offered freedom to slaves of rebel masters. Hundreds of enslaved men, women and children flocked to Norfolk to join the British. This is the story of slaves who became soldiers and women who carried their families to freedom in the British encampment. Through vignettes and interactions with soldiers, officers and camp followers, guests learn what happened to the thousands of African-Americans during and after the War of Independence.

Throughout Colonial Williamsburg's Brothers-In-Arms Weekend guests experience encampment activities such as cooking, military life, drills and firing demonstrations. They are invited to participate in mock military marching drills while learning about soldiers' camp life. A military miniature display will illustrate the battles in which each reg-

iment fought. Guests are encouraged to experience the encampment while interacting with the soldiers, officers and camp followers and learn about the difficult decisions, sacrifices and aspirations of the thousands of slaves and free blacks during the American

Revolutionary era. The Norfolk Southern Foundation has provided generous funding to support African-American military programming at Colonial Williamsburg.

Established in 1926, the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation

is the not-for-profit educational institution that operates the restored 18th-century capital of Virginia, the nation's largest living history museum. Williamsburg is located 150 miles south of

## Census Bureau to update numbers on employment

U.S. Census Bureau data show that the country's official unemployment rate was 5.5 percent in July 2004. So what's the source for this important economic indicator?

The information was gathered in the Census Bureau's monthly Current Population Survey (CPS) - which dates from 1942 - making it the longest-running household survey in the country.

"The CPS is the primary source of information for governments and businesses regarding the country's labor force," said Alfonso L. Mirabal, director of the Census Bureau's Dallas regional office. "Information collected by the CPS helps government policy-makers, businesses and academicians fully assess the nation's economic condition."

Every month, Census Bureau field representatives ask selected households questions relevant to characteristics of the U.S. labor force, including employment status, hours of work, earnings, age, sex, race, marital status, educational attainment, occupation and industry. From their answers come estimates of the unemployment rate, released monthly by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

By law, all information that could identify survey respondents or their households is confidential. Local households selected in the nationwide sample receive a letter from Census Bureau Director Louis Kincannon. Some are interviewed by telephone and others in person. The field representatives carry official identification cards.

Sponsored by the BLS and the Census Bureau, the CPS will be conducted during the week of August 15, 2004, when nearly 2,900 Census Bureau field representatives will interview about 78,000 households.
