



their lives. This male does not have the woman's or the children's best interest at heart. He is interested in satisfying his own physical or financial needs. Once he has satisfied his needs he no longer feels obligated to be there.

If a child is conceived as the result of the male's sexual gratification the male does not become a father. He becomes, "baby's daddy". He shows up usually every "Mother's Day", the 1st and the 15th of the month, to see what funds he can squeeze out of the mother's assistance check and then he is gone until his next need arises.

"baby's momma" just to keep her on his side. We call this tactic, "Tending the line". He does just enough to make sure the woman and her resources are available for his use. 


