 A Choice to Be Made

"Now therefore fear the Lord, and serve him in sincerity and in truth: and put away the gods which your fathers served on the other side of the flood, and in Egypt, and serve ye the Lord. And if it seem evil unto you to serve the Lord, choose you this day whom ye will serve, whether the gods which your fathers served that were on the other side of the flood, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land ye dwell: but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." —Joshua 24:15-16

A year or so ago or maybe even longer, my neighbor next door wanted me to come over and help look at World War II model airplanes. He was particularly interested in the model B-25 aircraft. He told me he and some of his friends wanted to give one of their old buddy's a model of the plane that he flew during the World War II period. He laughed

when I told him that I was not even born when Pearl Harbor was bombed by the Japanese and I knew very little about the aircraft of that period. He insisted that I look with him so he could purchase the right model plane for his friend.

To my surprise, on Friday, July 4, 2003, in the Vista of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal was a story written by Ray Westbrook about Fred Bradshaw who flew during World War II. This was my neighbor, Mr. Foster Cummings, (Senior Citizen Domino Champion of Texas in 2002) friend.

I read the story in its entirety and was moved to heart as if I was sitting across the table from an age citizen telling the story of how in the mist of an assignment he had a choice to make as to give or not to give his life and service to God.

Mr. Westbrook wrote the story as if he was in the co-piloted seat with Mr. Bradshaw during

those moments in time. He writes that Mr. Bradshaw was sent to Brazil, from where he flew 2,300 miles to Ascension; a figurative island lot serving as a refueling stop in the Atlantic Ocean and that Mr. Bradshaw's plane had taken on enough fuel for only 2400 miles. Trouble was apparent when the radio malfunction on the plane and there was no way to find the Island and they had past the point of no-return.

Mr. Westbrook wrote that Mr. Bradshaw assembled the men on his aircraft for an urgent prayer meeting at 10,000 feet above the Atlantic ocean. Mr. Bradshaw said "called all of them up to the cockpit and told them what predicament we were in, and I told them if they had never prayed, it was time to start....I led them in prayer there, and I told the Lord that if he would get us to Ascension Island safely, I would turn my life over to him." What a remarkable choice!

When we read the Old

Testament, we discover that God had chosen the descendants of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob to be His people. Some of them turned to pagan gods. Many of them worshiped the false gods of Egypt and Mesopotamia. Joshua exhorted the present generation to fear their God and serve only Him with all their hearts and according to the commands of the Lord.

Joshua told the Israelites to make a choice, to serve either the Lord or serve some other god that their ancestors had worshiped or that their new neighbors, the Amorites, worshiped. Whatever they decided, they were to decide that day.

Joshua left no doubt as to whom he was giving his allegiance; he declared that he and his family would serve the God of Israel. Like Joshua and Mr. Fred Bradshaw, you should not straddle the fence, but make a choice as to whom you will give your life.

The morning scripture lesson was taught by Sister Adelia Hardwick. Her subject was "God's Prophetic Purpose For Praise." Her scripture text was Joel 3:9-10 and Micah 4:3.

Joel 3:9-10 - Proclaim this among the nations. Prepare for work. Rouse the Warriors. Let all the fighting men draw near and attack. Beat your plowshares into swords and your pruning hooks into spears. Let the weak-

ling say, I'm strong. Micah 3: — He will judge between many peoples and will settle disputes for strong nations far and wide. They will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks. Nations will not take up swords against nations, nor will they train for war anymore.

Strength for Today hope for Tomorrow

Question: How do you choose a good mate to marry?

Answer: This question is being asked less frequently these days. More people are choosing to live together and not to get married. Living together seems to be a realistic option. The rationale for living together is that if a couple lives together it will determine if they have the possibility of staying married together. The problem with this reasoning is that you cannot live together

God demonstrates His own love toward us in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for the ungodly

long enough to experience all of the circumstances that a couple committed together for life will endure. Secondly, the research shows that couples who live together are usually divorced within the first two to five years of marriage if they get married at all.

Let's answer the question; how do you choose a good mate? I confess to you that I don't have a surefire answer to the question, but I can share some spiritual principles that will lead you to making a good decision. Even when you make the right decision, you must continually work at making it the right decision. A friend of mine taught me this principle years ago. When you make the right deci-

sion you must continue to do the right things to make your decision the right one. I guess the idea is to never stop working on your relationship. When you stop working on your relationship it will die.

Firstly, you must have a clear understanding of what love is. There is no such reality as falling in love. The correct definition of love means; that you will do whatever is in the best interest of another regardless of what it cost you. Falling in love would be the result of chance, you just happen to fall in love with someone. It takes the choice of loving someone from the relationship. It also justifies the idea of falling out of love. Accurately stated, when you stop loving someone it is not the result of falling out of love, it is the result of choosing to no longer love that person. Love is the choice to give yourself to someone for their best interest. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son" (John 3:16).

Secondly, consider the verse above. Love always gives. Love is never one-sided. I cannot recall the number of frustrated partners who have expressed to

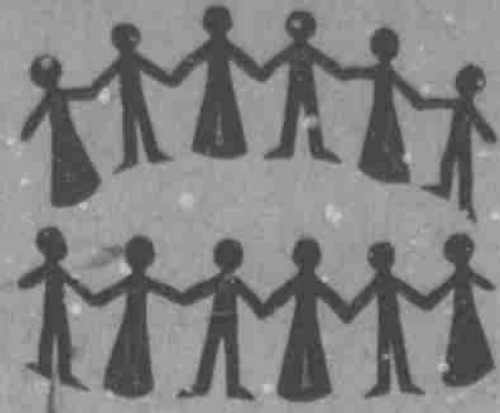

In Cinque

There are many reactions to the recent Supreme Court decision regarding affirmative action. Bill O'Reilly, host of "The O'Reilly Factor" on Fox News, feels that "Favoritism based on skin color or religion or family connections or any other personal characteristic was never part of the Constitutional mandate" (Vicksburg Post, June 29, 2003).

With all of his historical quotes and notes, Mr. O'Reilly overlooked the fact that when the United States Constitution was drafted, that the people of color, Africans, African Americans and Indians, were not considered people or citizens! Following the adoption of the Constitution, it was almost 100 years later that the Civil War to end secession was fought, which brought an end to slavery in the United States as it existed at the time. Freedom for many people of color did not come after abolition was on the books. It was highly improbable for people who could not read or write the English language to communicate adequately on any level. Schools were established for the freedmen at 'ground zero. Schools were established which offered studies through 8th grade. Few people were able to attend and those who succeeded in completing the course of study were able to teach other people of color.

With a limited amount of education available to people of color and a limited number of people

able to take advantage of the limited amount, it seems, limited the amount of education and anything else that people of color had the opportunity to accumulate. Therefore, these limitations existed until 1954, almost another 100 years after the Civil War and following Brown v. Board of Education which reversed the 'separate but equal' or Jim Crow decision, Plessy v. Ferguson in 1896. That ruling, put people of color in a state of servitude and degradation which lasted on paper and legally until 1954.

Things did not change overnight in 1954, because there are those here today, able to testify that people of color still do not have equal rights, except on paper. Thank God for that, because from the basis of the paper, people of color can go into a federal court to attempt to secure their rights. That is basically the way it has to be done, too, because there are some people like Mr. O'Reilly who are still fighting the Civil War.

Mr. O'Reilly spoke about the equal opportunity to be in a fox hole on the front line of battle. What he may not know is that the men and women of color who fought in World War II, realized that they had an equal right to a fox hole, but not a household, while being shot at by the enemies of the United States. From this viewpoint, those who were fortunate enough to return from a war tour of duty, were not at all happy with second class citizenship in the military or at home and they began to push for equal rights, in both places. It appears that Mr. O'Reilly was not aware that the U. S. Military had all-colored units until a few years ago, including an all-colored air

force pilot unit which trained at Tuskegee, Alabama.

Mr. O'Reilly feels that economic-based affirmative action is the way to help disadvantaged people of color improve their lives. I can agree on this, but only in conjunction with the opportunity to secure a college education. People of color with no more than a high school education are not going to command a paycheck large enough to take advantage of any economic-based affirmative action, unless it involves a gift of capital for a venture. Without a solid base in mathematics and/or economics, the gift of capital would be at risk in a business venture.

If racial polarization is big business in America today, as stated by Mr. O'Reilly, it is because the skin judgments went against the people of color in America for over 200 years and continue to do so and people like Mr. O'Reilly continue to make it so. When the Mr. O'Reillies of this country start to actually supporting the laws of this country in their hearts, not just in their mouths and really treat people of color as first class citizens and understand that the struggle is still ongoing for equal rights, they will understand that affirmative action in every way is needed for people of color and for those who would have racial harmony. We need to get 'in cinque' and realize as Professor Benjamin Mayes once said, ".....When you are behind, you cannot walk, but you must run to catch up." People of color are over 200 years behind other people on everything and points on college entry applications help people of color to run to catch up, but putting some economic help with it would help them to run faster.

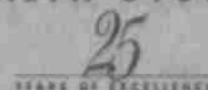

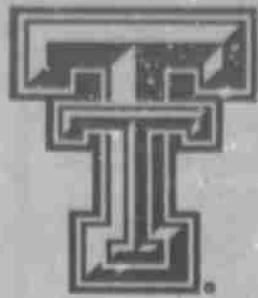
