Comptroller Strayhorn Sends \$303.7 Million in June Sales Tax Rebates to Local Governments

(AUSTIN)-Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn today delivered \$303.7 million in-monthly sales tax payments to Texas cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, a 0.9 percent decrease compared to June 2002. So far this year, local sales tax rebates are down 1.4 percent compared to the first six months of 2002. June's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in April and reported to the

Comptroller Strayhorn sent June sales tax rebates of \$205.5 million to Texas cities, up 1.1 percent compared to June 2002. Year-to-date, city sales tax rebates are running 0.3 percent lower than last year. Texas counties received sales tax rebates of \$17.6 million, down 4.4 percent compared to one year ago. Year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are I percent lower than last

Comptroller in May.

Another \$8.3 million went to 78 special purpose taxing districts around the state, a decrease of 0.3 percent compared to a year ago. Texas' six meiropolitan transit

nuthorities and two city transit systems received \$72.2 million in sales tax rebates, down 5.4 percent compared to June 2002.

The state's share of sales tax revenue increased, after falling for ten consecutive months. The state's share of sales tax reported in May was \$1.3 billion, up 2.9 percent compared to a year ago. However, other state tax revenues continue to decline. Franchise tax paid by Texas businesses in May, the most critical month, was down 11.7 percent corapared to last year. Motor vehicle sales and rental tax collections were also down by 8.3 percent compared to May 2002.



"And we know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose." (Romans 8:28). "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." (Ephesians 2:10). In Cinque by Renetta W. Howard

My mother was an avid gardener and gardening has held my interest from the time that I was about 10 years old, when my mother gave me a 6' X 6' comer of her garden to make mine. With her help, my harvest was just enough to make one pot of gumbo. I was proud of it. During this time of my life,, I also harvested plums and berries from which I made wine. These were my years of youthful adventure. I was always happy with the outcome of whatever fruit or vegetable I tried to grow.

As my youthful years faded into adult years, I tried making a garden around my garage, as city life in the northern part of the United States did not provide the land space for the kind of gardens you can make in rural and rural urban areas such as my current residence. I saved many trips to the grocery store, however, when I harvested, collard greens, Swiss chard, tomatoes, cucumbers, okra,

carrots, cabbage sprouts, garlic and onions. The soil was bountiful and my harvests were great. I was able to preserve some of these items to eat through the winter months.

Changing cities made a big difference in my harvests.

Living on the South Plains of the United States is definitely a different kind of gardening. There is a lot of cliche dirt and one needs to water it for at least a week in order to be able to break up the soil. Once done, and kept watered regularly, a pretty good harvest of many vegetables and fruits are possible. After a few years, the cliche and the 100 degree temperatures diminished my zeal for gardening. I even turned to putting artificial flowers in my yard.

Later, as I returned to my child-hood gardening area to live, I was still putting artificial flowers in my yard. A couple of years ago, I planted some flowers and a couple of seeds of collard greens, a couple of peppers and a tomato or two. With a little luck, I had a small harvest, a couple of meals; a little more than with my first garden.

Finally, my longing for a really good harvest led me to a tiller and the largest garden that I have ever had. Unfortunately, some of my seeds just did not raise themselves up through the soil.

A day after I planted, we had the worst rain storm of the Spring and have continued to have rainy weather and some of my seeds washed away. The seeds that have come up have been surrounded by the tallest prettiest grass that I have ever seen. When asked about my garden, I say, Oh, the grass is doing very well." To preserve what seeds that have come up, I have put a new twist into gardening; a we'd whacker. I used a weed whacker to get most of the grass out of my garden as a hoe and I never were good friends. Now, my plants can breathe and grow without the grass, though I must admit that I did chop off a few tomato and okra leaves in the process. I have already harvested some tomatoes, a few collard greens and some peppers. I saved some money while getting exercise in the garden. It is time that we all get 'in cinque' and do ourselves a favor with some organically grown food and healthy exercise.
