# TTU Graduate University, Retired Marine, Named Nations Top Law Student

Operation Desert Storm veteran, Ginery Sergeant Mark DesNoyer credits the United States Marine Corps with instilling the discipline and confidence necessary to become successful in whatever endeavors he chooses.

DesNoyer, married with two children, recently became the first Texas Tech University law student to earn the title Outstanding Law Student of the Year in America by Who's Who: American Law Students.

"The Marine Corps teaches you to always plan for the next event," DesNoyer said. "Don't just worry about what's coming up, but plan. The Marine Corps is the reason I was successful in school. I learned confidence in my own abilities and I learned to deal with a lot of different people. I was able to retire, take off my stripes and continue to be a leader thanks to lessons I learned as a Marine."

Selection criteria for the honor includes service to the law school community, service to the larger community, outstanding contributions to the study of law, pursuit of a career despite prohibiting factors and student distinction.

"Mark fits these criteria exactly," said Texas Tech Law School Dean Walter Huffman. "He overcame significant adversity to get to law school and he has excelled in every respect as a law student and as a member of the community."

During the previous academic year, DesNoyer served as president of Phi Alpha Delta, the professional legal fraternity, was an executive board member of the Texas Tech University School of Law Board of Barristers and was a member of the school's undefeated moot court team.

In addition, DesNoyer was recognized at the school's recent Honors and

Awards Ceremony as the winner of the Linda Kamp Service Award for dedicated service to the law school, as well as the Judge Meade Griffin Award, which is given to the graduating student "who through industry, perseverance, integrity and character has best utilized the law school experience to improve and prepare for service to the profession and to mankind."

"We are very proud of Mark," Huffman said. "He is a wonderful fellow with an equally wonderful family. Obviously to be named 2004 Outstanding Law Student of the Year in America is a tribute that speaks for itself."

Besides duty in Operation Desert Storm, DesNoyer's two-decade military career included stints in California, North Carolina, Louisiana, Hawaii, Georgia and Okinawa.

DesNoyer, a second-generation American of French-Canadian extraction, grew up in Detroit. He left the Motor City when he signed up to

become a Marine.

"I enlisted when I was 17," DesNoyer said. "I turned 13 at boot camp in San Diego. Most of what I learned about character and leadership, I learned in the Marines."

The newest Who's Who honoree graduated May 15. He is the first in his family of four children to attend and graduate college.

"My father finished the sixth grade and my mother, who passed when I was in my second year of law school, just finished the eighth grade."

DesNoyer, who has already taken the bar exam and is waiting on those results admits the Marines, patriotism and service to country will not ever be far from his heart.

"I spent 20 years serving my country as a Marine," he said proudly. "And I have applied for the Presidents Management Internship in Washington, D.C. So I'm still looking at government service."

## from the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith Freaky Love: Man and Man - Woman and Woman

That evening the two angels arrived in Sodom, while Lot was sitting near the city gate. When Lot saw them, he got up, bowed down low, and said, "Gentlemen I am your servant. Please come to my home. You can wash your feet, spend the night, and be on your way in the morning." They told him, "No, we'll spend the night in the city square." But Lot kept insisting, until they finally agreed and went home with him. He baked some bread, cooked a meal, and they ate. Before Lot and his guests could go to bed, every man in Sodom, young and old, came and stood outside his house and stated shouting, "Where are your visitors? Send them out, so we can have sex with them!" Lot went outside and shut the door behind him. Then he said "Friends, please don't do such a terrible thing! I have two daughters who have never been married. I'll bring them out, and you can do what you want with them. But don't harm these men. They are guests in my home." "Don't get in our way," the crowd answered.

"You're an outsider." "What right do you have to order us around? We'll do worse things to you than we're going to do to them."—Genesis 19:1-9 (CEV)  
In the Book of Genesis, Sodom and Gomorrah are two evil cities that God destroyed with a rain of fire and sulfur because of their wicked behavior. Sodomy was practice in the city of Sodom. # Series HH Savings Bonds Will Be Discontinued in August

But Investors Have Many Options, Including Holding On To Them

The U.S. Treasury Department has announced it will stop issuing Series HH savings bonds this summer as part of its plan to eventually move to a paperless, electronic account system encompassing all of Treasury's retail securities.

After the close of business on August 31, owners of Series EE and E bonds will no longer be able to exchange them for HH bonds, and owners of matured HH bonds will no longer be able to reinvest their holdings in HH bonds. However, investors holding HH bonds on that date will continue to earn interest until their bonds reach final maturity 20 years after issue.

Issued since 1980, HH bonds — which are available in multiples of \$500 — are current income securities. They provide owners of EE/E bonds with a means to defer reporting the accrued interest on those bonds for Federal income tax purposes, while earning interest income semiannually on both the principal and interest of the E/EE bonds. Income taxes on the deferred income become due when HH bonds are redeemed or reach maturity.

HH bonds pay interest income to owners semiannually on their face value. This interest is taxable in the year received. They cannot be purchased with cash, but are acquired only in exchange for Series E and EE bonds or by reinvesting the proceeds of matured HH/H bonds.

Relatively few people have invested in HH bonds over the years. Today, there are only a little more than 607,000 owners, compared to the tens

of millions of individuals who own at least one savings bond. HH bonds make up \$13.3 billion worth of the more than \$200 billion invested in savings bonds, representing just 7 percent of the market.

"Even after the discontinuance of HH bonds, U.S. Savings Bonds will continue to be a flexible, low-risk and practical investment for long-term financial goals, such as retirement and college expenses, for people at all income levels," says Stephen Meyerhardt, public affairs officer for the Bureau of the Public Debt. "We're simply consolidating the bonds we offer as we move to make it easy for Americans to purchase, manage and redeem bonds online through our Treasury Direct account system."

With the end of new Series HH issues just a few months away, there are several things to consider. First, there is no effect on HH bonds issued before August 31, 2004. Investors can hold onto these bonds, which will continue to earn interest until the end of their 20-year life. The annual interest rate for new HH bonds is now 1.5 percent, but HH bonds issued (or having entered their second 10 years) between March 1994 and December 2002 earn 4 percent until they are 10 years old, at which time the rate will change for their next 10 years, or stop if the bonds have reached final maturity.

As for investors who had planned to defer taxes by purchasing HH bonds when their E/EE bonds matured, they have only a limited time to make an exchange. But they too must carefully weigh the tradeoffs

of exchanging higher, interest E/EE bonds, which may be earning as much as 6 percent, in order to gain the benefits of HH bonds while they're still available.

Owners of E/EE bonds who want to purchase HH bonds before the August deadline should fill out an exchange application and submit it with the bonds being exchanged to a qualified savings bond agent. Financial institutions that serve as agents are able to help customers fill out the application form and forward appropriate materials to a Federal Reserve processing site or the Bureau of the Public Debt.

After August 31, when the last HH bonds will be issued, investors can still opt for I and EE bonds. I bonds currently pay an interest rate of 2-19 percent, composed of a fixed rate of 1-1 percent for 30 years and an inflation rate that's adjusted semiannually. EE bonds, which are guaranteed to reach face value in 20 years and earn interest for a total of 30 years, earn interest tied to 90 percent of the average return on five-year Treasury marketable securities.

U.S. securities can be compared online at [www.treasurydirect.gov](http://www.treasurydirect.gov), where investors can open an account to buy savings bonds directly over the Internet. Investors can track and manage their holdings online - 24 hours a day, 7 days a week - from anywhere they have Internet access. There are no charges or fees, and you can buy paperless bonds in penny increments ranging from \$25 to \$30,000 each year.

## Roosevelt Educators Selected Aerospace Scholars

A team of four teachers from Roosevelt Junior High has been selected to participate in the Middle School Aerospace Scholars program conducted by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). The educators will attend a professional development workshop at Johnson Space Center in Houston the week of June 20-25.

Roosevelt's participants will be Robin Straley, Mike Tomlinson, Rachel Culp, and James Burton. The team applied online for the workshop. At the workshop, teams of educators will learn to integrate NASA instructional materials into their classroom curriculum. There will be tours of the Johnson Space Center, briefings with scientists, engineers, and astronauts, and instruction on using online NASA resources.

Middle School Aerospace Scholars (MAS) is funded by the State of Texas and administered by the NASA Johnson Space Center. The cost of transportation, lodging, meals, and related activities for the workshop will be paid by MAS.

Three distance learning events will be planned for Roosevelt Junior High during next year. The events will be hosted by the Johnson Space Center and will give students an opportunity to interact with experts in the space program.

## It Ain't All Good: Why Black Men Should Not Date White Women

"At present, there are approximately 1.7 million more Black women in the United States than Black men, yet for some reason Black men are 2.5 times more likely to marry interracially than Black women."

This is just one of the many facts John Johnson slaps readers in the face with, *It Ain't All Good: Why Black Men Should Not Date White Women*. While many authors opt to tiptoe around taboo subjects and sugarcoat their commentary so as not to disturb the supposedly fragile sensibilities of their reading audience, John courageously bucks that trend and tackles the sensitive and personal subject of interracial dating head on, unafraid of the tendency for people to "blame the messenger."

Few writers have tried and even fewer have had success in their attempts to address the problematic nature of interracial dating in the Black community. What makes John's effort unique is that rather than criticizing the interracial dater, his commentary focuses primarily on the contextual factors that are influencing the interracial choice in the first place. More social analysis than opinion, John provides the reader with a multitude of information from a wide range of sources that support the notion presented in the book's title. John pulls data from Census reports, popular magazines, and research from Sociology, Women's Studies, Psychology, and more. His book illuminates and contextualizes interracial relationships, yet the author never explicitly condemns existing interracial love relationships, but simply questions the motives leading to the formation of such relationships.

Simultaneously critiquing racism and sexism from a pro-Black cultural standpoint, John uses plain language to discuss complex social dynamics. This book is a must read for anyone that has ever debated the interracial dating issue and I am confident that the release of *It Ain't All Good* generate increased discussion if not lead to the end of the debate.

## In Cinque

Fifty years ago, in 1954, the United States Supreme Court handed down a landmark decision designed to end racial segregation in the public schools of America. The many cases from various states were made into a class action suit in the name of the plaintiff whose name began with a 'b', first on the list in alphabetical order. Linda Brown versus The Board of Education of Topeka, Kansas was the name of that case.

Today, some of us wonder if the case has been fruitful in bringing about the integration of public education, racially, as it was designed to do. During the days of mandatory bussing to achieve integration, there were some positive aspects for many students of all races. There were down-sides as well. Ironically, many of the negative aspects remain. Public school is offered to all, regardless of skin color, but the quality of education in the public schools is still NOT EQUAL. Many people interpreted the decision to apply to all areas of life in America though it pertained to education. An equal education opportunity could have eventually led to equality overall, but it still has not happened. The Ayers case is a point in fact.

Students in the schools, especially in the states where integration was not gleefully accepted, are basically populated by African Americans. The few students of other races who attend public school are basically those students whose parents cannot afford to send them to a private school.

Private schools also have the teachers who can afford to live on a salary smaller than that offered to teachers in the public schools. They often employ teachers who have not been certified by me required examinations as well. Many of these teachers, however, are able to function better in a situation where the number of students is much smaller and conditions are ideal and conducive for learning, again proving that small classes with a desirable teacher-student ratio is more important than the ability to pass a test. Faculty/Staff cliques have grown making it impossible to really understand and evaluate good teaching. Consequently, non-clique teachers lost in the job market.

There is improvement in education and race relations, but far from the ideal hoped for fifty years ago. Black Americans are still on the bottom rung of the ladder of success in society in every area except crime. Seldom is an African American involved in crime involving great sums of money. When they are, it is the "crime of the century."

Students in the public schools would have much more fruitful attendance years if adequate funds were made

available for their education. Classes are too large and students are too difficult to discipline. Too many parents are difficult because equality in public schools in essence, quickly spread to all aspects of life for people of color and they quickly began to assert themselves about what they wanted for their children without adequate knowledge of the mechanics of education.

White parents went to school in droves to be room mothers and formed strong PTA's to watch what happened to their children because they lost the trust which they previously had in all-white public schools. They did not feel that Black teachers were qualified to teach their children and in some instances they were right. In that same vein, there were White teachers who were not qualified to teach Black children and some still are not, though they make up the majority of public school teachers in many school with only Black students.

Therefore, we need to get 'in cinque' and put more trust and money and qualified teachers in our schools and help our children to grow academically regardless of their race or country of origin.

# THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

## It Happened ...

**"Acts of Congress"**  
 \* Monday, June 1, 1789: The First Congress of the newly-organized United States of America passed its first congressional act, one governing the manner in which oaths were to be administered.  
 \* Wednesday, June 4, 1919: Congress passed the 19th Amendment to the US Constitution, guaranteeing women the right to vote, and sent it to the states for ratification.  
 \* Monday, June 2, 1924: Congress, in perhaps the most ironic of decrees, passed an act granting citizenship to Native Americans not previously claiming it.  
 \* Monday, June 6, 1932: The first gasoline tax levied by Congress was enacted as part of the Revenue Code, placing a 1 cent per gallon tax on motor fuel. As of 2002, the federal tax on gasoline was 18.4 cents per gallon.  
 \* Saturday, May 30, 1868: The first Memorial Day was celebrated.  
 \* Tuesday, June 1, 1869: Famed inventor Thomas A. Edison received his first patent, no. 90646, for an "electrographic vote recorder." On Tuesday, May 3, 1884, prolific African American inventor Granville T. Woods received his first patent, no. 299,894, for a "steam boiler furnace."  
 \* Wednesday, June 2, 1875: James Augustine Healey, a former slave, became the first black Roman Catholic bishop in the US. He served in Portland, Maine for over 25 years.  
 \* Saturday, June 3, 1916: Louis Brandeis became the first person of Jewish descent to sit as a justice on the US Supreme Court.  
 \* Tuesday, June 6, 1944: Operation Overlord, code named D-Day, was launched. The Allied invasion of northern France in World War II was the largest amphibious

military operation in history.  
 \* Friday, June 3, 1949: Wesley A. Brown became the first African American to be graduated from Annapolis Naval Academy.  
 \* Tuesday, June 7, 1955: The quiz program, "The \$64,000 Question" started on television. It ran until the quiz-show scandals of 1958. The jackpot was considered a fortune at that time. At the height of the show's immense popularity, the eyes of people across the nation were glued to their television sets as spelling whiz Gloria Lockerman, a 12-year-old black girl from Baltimore, Maryland won the top prize by correctly spelling "antidisestablishmentarianism."  
 \* Tuesday, June 4, 1963: Patent no. 3,091,888 was granted to six-year-old Robert Patch for a "toy truck" which could be separated and reassembled.  
 \* Thursday, June 3, 1965: Major Edward H. White II became the first American astronaut to walk in space. His walk in space had been preceded by that of Soviet cosmonaut Aleksei Leonov in March 1965.  
 \* Friday, June 5, 1987: Dr. Mae Jemison became the first African American female astronaut.

## In Sports History:

\* Tuesday, May 30, 1911: The first Indianapolis 500 motor car race was run. It was the first organized long distance auto race on a closed track. The winning driver, Ray Harroun, received \$14,250. The 2003 winning driver received \$1,353,265.  
 \* Monday, May 29, 1922: The US Supreme Court ruled that organized baseball is a sport and not a business, and therefore not subject to antitrust laws.  
 \* Friday, June 3, 1932: Lou Gehrig set a major league baseball record by hitting four consecutive home runs, as his New York Yankees defeated the Philadelphia A's 26-13.  
 \* Saturday, June 9, 1973: The racehorse, Secretariat won the Triple Crown with a spectacular

victory at the Belmont Stakes, having won the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness. He was the first horse to do so since Citation won the coveted Triple Crown in 1948.  
 \* Tuesday, May 29, 1990: Ricky Henderson, fleet African American outfielder for baseball's Oakland Athletics, stole his 893rd base, breaking Ty Cobb's record. Henderson also hit .325 that year.

## Born

\* Friday, June 3, 1904: Charles Richard Drew, in Washington, DC, a pioneering African American physician, Dr. Drew led the field of blood plasma research and blood banking. He died in 1950.  
 \* Sunday, June 3, 1906: Josephine Baker, born Freda Josephine McDonald, in St. Louis, Missouri. The legendary African American dancer and singer was known for her flamboyant style, became the most highly paid performer in Europe in the 1930's. She became a French citizen in 1937, and worked with the French Resistance during World War II. Baker returned to the US to take part in civil rights demonstrations in the 1960's. She died in Paris in 1975, becoming the first African woman to receive French military honors.  
 \* Monday, May 28, 1934: The Dionne quintuplets were born to an impoverished rural family near Corbeil, Ontario, Canada. They were born two months premature, each weighing less than two pounds. They were the first quintuplets known to survive past infancy. The five identical sisters were taken away from their parents at 4 months of age and made wards of the Ontario government. Under state supervision, they were put on display for as many as 6000 people per day, became a huge commercial enterprise endorsing products, and inspired at least 3 Hollywood movies. After a nine-year legal struggle, the quintuplets were returned to the

parents in 1943. Three of the sisters died as adults, at ages 20, 36 and 67.

\* Thursday, June 7, 1917: Gwendolyn Brooks, in Topaka, Kansas. The poet was the first black person to be awarded a Pulitzer Prize.  
 \* Monday, June 7, 1943: Nikki Giovanni, born Yolanda Carnelia Giovanni, in Knoxville, Tennessee. The popular black poet is known for her impassioned connection of literature with politics.  
 \* Saturday, June 7, 1958: Prince, born Prince Rogers Nelson, in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The African American singer, producer and entertainer, known for a time by an unpronounceable symbol, has combined funk, rock-and-roll and soul music.

## Died:

\* Sunday, May 25, 1919: Madam C. J. Walker, in New York, New York, of complications of hypertension, at age 51. Born Sarah Breedlove to freed slaves, the African American entrepreneur became a successful business woman by developing and manufacturing cosmetic products oriented to the black market. By 1915, the Madam C.J. Walker Manufacturing Company employed over 3,000 people and was the largest black-owned business in the United States. Upon her death she was considered to be the first black millionaire, and perhaps the first self-made woman millionaire in the US.  
 \* Thursday, June 6, 1968: Robert F. Kennedy, in Los Angeles, California, of gunshot wounds, at age 42. Felt to be a friend of minorities, the US Senator from New York, brother of slain President John F. Kennedy, had been shot at close range by 22-year-old Sirhan Sirhan with a .22 revolver the night before at the Ambassador Hotel, where Kennedy had been celebrating his California Democratic presidential primary victory. Sirhan remains in prison today.

\* Tuesday, June 8, 1982: Leroy "Satchel" Paige, in Kansas City, Missouri, of a heart attack, at age 75. The colorful and ageless black pitcher was a star of the Negro Leagues and was elected to the major league Baseball Hall of Fame. Paige pitched 2500 games and won more than 2000.

## Sign of the Zodiac:

GEMINI, the third sign of the zodiac, is symbolized by twins. The planet Mercury, named after the ancient Roman messenger god, rules Gemini, which is an air sign. Geminis are known for their ability to express themselves, and are witty, clever, and often well-read. They usually have something to say about everything. The Gemini has a retentive memory for facts and languages. He or she may skim the surface of whatever is being studied but covers a wide territory. Easy talker, he or she sometimes stretches the truth to make a good story. ## It's A Fact!

The first national celebration of Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, was celebrated in 1868 after Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic John A. Logan issued General Order No. 11, designating May 30 as a memorial day to decorate the graves of slain soldiers. Southern women had decorated the graves of soldiers even before the end of the Civil War. After the war, a women's memorial association in Columbus, Mississippi, put flowers on the graves of both Confederate and

Union soldiers. The first national celebration of Memorial Day took place May 30, 1868, at Arlington National Cemetery. The national observance of Memorial Day still takes place there today, with the placing of a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the decoration of each grave with a small American flag. In 1971, federal law changed the observance of the holiday to the last Monday in May and extended it to honor all those who died in American wars. People pay tribute not only with flowers but also with speeches and parades. The first Memorial Day parade was held in Ironton, Ohio on May 31, 1868.

## It's A Fact!

One of the most important events of the 20th century occurred on June 6, 1944 — D-Day. In an effort to bring World War II to a close, Supreme Allied Commander General Dwight D. Eisenhower gave the go-ahead for "Operation Overlord," in which 400,000 allied land forces made successful landings along the coast of northern France. It was the largest amphibious military operation in history. The invasion was successful. By daybreak, 18,000 British and American paratroopers were on the ground. At 6:30 am, American troops came ashore at Utah and Omaha beaches, and British and Canadian divisions landed at Gold, Juno and Sword beaches. Allied air cover forced the Germans away from much of the action. Despite German resistance, Allied casualties were relatively light, although the loss of life was considerable. Within 11 months, Germany would fall and victory would be declared in Europe. email: twih@remmoz.com

# American Universities Must Help Unionize Dominican Sweatshops

With baseball season swinging into full gear, take a look at the "made in" label inside the baseball caps many of us wear. You may be surprised to learn that the cap you're wearing was made under inhumane working conditions in places like the Dominican Republic. Sweatshop workers stitch logos into caps for Major League Baseball, the NHL, the NBA and the NFL. Many college caps are made there, too. One company, BJ&B, for example, manufactures caps for the Universities of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Missouri, Connecticut, Arizona, Louisiana State, Cornell, Northwestern, Penn State, Tulane and Pur due. College logo apparel sales are estimated at \$2.5 billion annually, according to the Chicago Tribune. The industry is a classic profit pyramid, with workers constituting the exploited bottom rung. Here's how it works: A university licenses its name and logo to American apparel distributors — such as Nike,

Starter, Champion and Reebok — and earns about \$150 per cap. BJ&B pays the worker 8 cents per cap. At that pay rate, a worker takes home \$40 for a typical 56-hour work week, as calculated by UNITE, an anti-sweatshop lobbying group. The total cost of making the cap comes out to about \$6.08, but consumers pay about \$19.95 for the cap. The big winners are BJ&B's corporate parent, Yoopong Group in Korea, one of the largest cap producers in the world, and the American corporations that act as middlemen. Yoopong makes 14.4 million caps in the Dominican Republic alone. The Spanish name for the industrial areas is "zona franca." It translates into "industrial free-trade zone," which means companies located there are exempt from import fees and income taxes. But for tens of thousands of Dominican factory workers, what it really means is "unregulated worker-exploitation zone." Thanks to continued pressure from American universities and companies, BJ&B workers were

allowed to form a union in March and settled their first myths and exposes the adverse impact on victims of profiling and minority communities. The Sept 11 attacks constituted a national trauma. Targeting and arresting people who pose no threat to national security, and whose only crime is the tint of their skin or the turban covering their head, is an irrational reaction. As we work to keep our nation safe, we cannot become what we abhor by trampling upon the precious freedoms for which so many have spilled their
