Fare Changes for Paratransit

The Lubbock Public Transit Advisory Board approved changes in the fares for CitiAccess out of service area clients, those clients that travel more than 3/4 mile outside the fixed route service. CitiAccess clients are disabled persons qualified by the ADA and Citibus. They are picked up by specially equipped Para transit vehicles and transported to and from work or to medical appointments. Citibus had been charging CitiAccess patrons just \$2.00 per ride and \$5 after regular hours. Previous policy required those clients to pay an \$8.00 fee, the cost of providing the service outside the service area.

The Federal Transit Administration does not cover any cost of outside service area trips therefore the cost must either be paid by the client or paid through local funds. After hearing testimony from citizens today the LPTAB approved a \$4 one way fee for the period of one year. After one year the Board will look at this matter again.

"There are very few patrons in this category so we think we can absorb the cost," said Citibus General Manager John Wilson. "We really believe that \$8 per ride would put many of them out of jobs. We want to do everything we can to help them."

The new CitiAccess fare goes into effect October 1st and will be reviewed in September of 2004.

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Neugebauer Votes to Extend Citibus Funding

Washington, D.C.-Congressman Randy Neugebauer voted Wednesday to increase highway safety and eliminate traffic congestion by voting in favor of H.R. 3087, the "Surface Transportation Extension Act of 2003." The House passed the bill by voice vote.

The legislation extends current highway, transit, and highway safety programs from October 1, 2003 through either February 29 or March 31 of 2004. This will keep

federal transportation programs operating until Congress acts on a multi-year surface transportation reauthorization bill next spring.

This program appropriates \$3.6 billion (FY2003) to urbanized areas according to a formula that takes into account population size, population density, and transit service data. Cities with populations over 1 million receive two-thirds of the funding while those with populations between 50,000 and 1 million receive the remaining one-third.

Neugebauer, former Chairman of Ports-to-Plains and no stranger to transportation issues, stated, "We had to act to keep our federal highway program from coming to a halt in a couple of weeks. It was imperative to extend funding under the current levels for the next five months. This is money that should be given back to communities and back to states. Lubbock is a growing community and a growing community should provide better mass transit."

This funding also provides the City of Lubbock, and other communities around the country that surpassed the 200,000 population threshold in 2000, continued flexibility with the use of their transit formula assistance. This legislation is very important to Citibus and its continuing efforts to provide transit services in Lubbock.

Lubbock Mayor Mark McDougal stated late Wednesday, "By passing HR 3087, the House has assured that Citibus will contin-

ue to provide Lubbock with high quality transit service. I am pleased that the House has addressed the operating assistance issue and am grateful to Representative Neugebauer for his efforts on this very difficult issue. Passage of this legislation shows that in his short time in Congress, Representative Neugebauer has learned how to build bipartisan coalitions and work with the leadership to provide results for his district."

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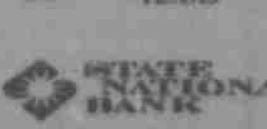
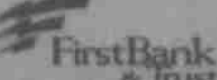
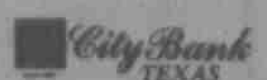

Question: How can I know that I am saved?

Answer: This is one of the easiest questions for me to answer according to the Scriptures. It is surprising to find out the number of people who are not sure that they are saved.

In the first letter John writes, he informs that we can be certain of our salvation. "Beloved I write these things to you in order that you may know that you have eternal life." (1 John 5:13). It has never been God's desire to have His children worrying about their salvation. He wants us to know that we are His and that we are saved.

Firstly, we must come to him in faith. "And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him." (Hebrews 11:6). You cannot believe in God unless you have accurate testimony about God. Jesus prays for believers to be united on the basis of credible witnesses. "I do not ask on behalf of these alone, but for those also who believe in Me through their word;" (John 17:20). So in order to come to God you must do so based on the testimony of

credible witnesses (i.e., the apostle that walked with Jesus). You can't rightly say you have come to believe in God based on someone's opinion. It must be founded squarely upon the foundational teaching of the word of God.

You have been saved by grace through faith and not of works that any man should boast.

Secondly, you must change the way you live and come to God in obedience. Jesus told the multitude that was following Him that unless they repented of their sins they would perish (see Luke 13:3). To repent means to change your thoughts and feelings about serving God. If you have not been obedient to God in the past, you must now dedicate yourself to doing His will. Whatever he commands you to do, you must do. You must surrender your way of doing things and choose His way of doing things. This is what repentance does in the life of a follower of Jesus.

Thirdly, you must confess Him as Lord and as Christ. Having Jesus as your Lord simply means that you must agree publicly and privately that you want Jesus to be the one who tells you how to live your life. You are no longer going to be the one in control, from now on Jesus will be the King on the

throne of your life. Also, you will accept Him as your Christ. This means that He is the only one who can pay the price for your sins. "You have been saved by grace through faith and not of works that any man should boast." (Ephesians 2:8,9). We cannot earn salvation, we receive it because of the death of Jesus on the cross. Some people want to have Jesus as their Christ but not their lord. He will not have it any other way. He will not be your Savior if you will not allow Him to tell you how to live.

THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

September 28-October 4

It Happened ...

* Wednesday, September 30, 1452: The first major book in the western world was printed. It was the Gutenberg Bible. On Sunday, October 4, 1535 the first full English translation of the Bible was printed.

* Wednesday, September 30, 1630: John Billington, a Plymouth colony resident and one of the original pilgrims who sailed on the Mayflower to the New World, became the first criminal in the American colonies to be executed for murder. He was hanged for having shot John Newcomin following a quarrel.

* Wednesday, September 30, 1641: A law was passed in New Amsterdam (now New York) that called for annual animal fairs in the Dutch colony, one on October 15 for cattle and one on November 1 for hogs. These were the first regularly-scheduled fairs in American history. On this date in 1810 Agricultural Fair Day was established.

* Monday, September 28, 1785: Napoleon Bonaparte, brilliant French general and emperor, was graduated from the military institute in Paris, at age 16. He was young, but not at the top of his class (42/51).

* Saturday, October 3, 1789: George Washington proclaimed the first national Thanksgiving Day, commemorating the harvest reaped by the Plymouth Colony immigrants in the early 1600's. On this date in 1863 President Abraham Lincoln, designated Thanksgiving Day a national holiday, to be celebrated on the last Thursday of November.

Subsequent US presidents followed with the same annual declaration. In one exception, President Franklin D. Roosevelt proclaimed Thanksgiving Day 1939 one week earlier — on the fourth rather than last Thursday of November — in an effort to encourage more holiday shopping. In 1941 Congress adopted a joint resolution which permanently set the date of Thanksgiving on the fourth Thursday of November each year.

* Monday, October 4, 1824: Mexico became a republic. Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla issued his "grito" on September 16, 1810, launching the revolutionary movement for Mexican independence from Spain. Some 11 years later, the victorious Mexicans defeated the Spanish Army and occupied Mexico City. After a brief time as an empire, a new constitutional government somewhat similar to the United States, was established in 1824.

* Tuesday, September 29, 1829: London's Metropolitan Police force was reorganized and went on duty as Scotland Yard. The London police came to be known as "Bobbies," in honor of Sir Robert Peel, the British Home Secretary whose committee and bill organized the police service. Initially, police headquarters were located at 4 Whitehall Place, the rear of which opened onto a courtyard of a residence of the Kings of Scotland. Hence, "Scotland Yard."

* Tuesday, October 4, 1864: The New Orleans Tribune, the first black daily newspaper in the US, was established.

* Wednesday, September 30, 1846: Dentist William Morton used ether as an anesthetic for the first time, for a tooth extraction on a patient in Boston, MA.

* Tuesday, October 1, 1872: Historically-black Morgan State College was founded in Baltimore, MD. Founded in 1867 as the Centenary Biblical Institute, it was renamed Morgan College in 1890. Supported in its growth by Andrew Carnegie, Morgan remained a private institution until it was purchased by the state of Maryland in 1939. In 1975 Morgan was designated a university and regained control of its own governing board. Morgan State University today offers a comprehensive undergraduate curriculum and specialized graduate programs to 6200 students. For the past several years, Morgan State University has ranked first nationally in the number of bachelor's degrees awarded to African Americans in electrical engineering, and historically it has ranked among the top public universities nationally in the number of black graduates subsequently receiving doctorates from US universities.

* Another historically-black institution, Bethune-Cookman College, opened in Daytona Beach, FL on Monday, October 3, 1904.

Originally called the Daytona Educational and Training School for Negro Girls, it resulted from the efforts of a very determined young black woman named Mary McLeod Bethune ("I had no furniture. I begged dry goods boxes and made benches and stools; begged a basin at other things I needed and in 1904 five little girls here started school"). It merged with Cookman Institute of Jacksonville, FL, in 1923, and was approved for 4-year baccalaureate programs in liberal arts and teacher education in 1941. Today, 2700 coeducational students participate in six academic divisions of the college.

* Sunday, October 3, 1875: The first college for rabbinical training, Union College, opened in Cincinnati, OH. As the nation's oldest institution of higher Jewish learning, today's Hebrew Union College offers scholarly leadership in Reform Judaism. On the same date in 1863 A. B. Simpson founded the first school in America to train Christian missionaries, in New York City. Called the Missionary Training Institute in 1894, it is known today as Nyack College.

* Thursday, October 1, 1885: Special delivery mail service began in the US. On the same day in 1896, rural free-mail delivery began.

* Saturday, September 28, 1895: Three Baptist groups merged to form the National Baptist Convention, at a convention in Atlanta, GA. It is today the largest African-American denomination in America and the world.

* Saturday, October 1, 1892: The first sociology professor began teaching, Dr. Albion W. Small at the University of Chicago. Bryn Mawr College offered sociology courses the same year, but they were taught by a political science teacher.

* Tuesday, September 30, 1902: The synthetic fiber rayon was patented.

* Wednesday, September 28, 1904: A woman was arrested for smoking a cigarette in a car on 5th Avenue, under a law in New York City.

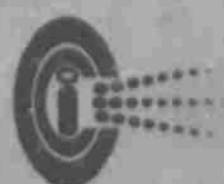
