FTC Hotline to Assist Small Businesses and Other Victims to Recover from Web

Cramming Scam SBA hdd warned consumers about deceptive practices

WASHINGTON - The Federal Trade Commission has launched a consumer hotline to assist alleged victims of a Web cramming scam operated by Miami-based Epixtar

Corporation and several of its subsidiaries, including one formerly known as SBA Online. mc- The hotline number is 202-326-299, and will advise consumers how to obtain a reftind.

The hotline was established as a result of a lawsuit filed by the FTC against Epixtur and its subsidiaries for allegedly violating federal law by deceptively marketing a free trial of Internet services, and then unfairly billing customers' telephone accounts without their expressed informed consent and without their knowledge; The FTC investigation was prompted in part by the LLS. Small Business Administration, objections to the unauthorized use of its trademark by the company and complaints to the SBA from small business owners.

Cramming refers to the practice of billing businesses for services that were never authorized and have little value. The bogus charges usually appear on businesses I telephone bills.

The SBA had warned small businesses across the country in March 2003 about a company calling itself "SBA Online" after receiving a number of complaints from members of the public advising that representatives of the company were contacting their businesses seeking to interest them in purchasing certain commercial services allegedly offered by their organization, or in paying lo become members of SBA," The SBA does not charge the public for its materials, nor for membership in its programs.

Looking back in history, in 1960, North and East Lubbock had approximately 34,000 of the city's 128,000 residents. However, in 2000, the same area w had only Mayor McDougal said the 18,000 of the city's 200,000

he was sworn as mayor in 2002, Mayor McDougal won council support to create the North and East Lubbock Development Commission. Nine members were appointed to the commission with Gary Lawrence as chairman. For months the commission worked untiringly to come back with a plan of action.

Some of the key recommendations were to hire an executive director, commit \$250,000 annually for four years from the City of Lubbock, hire a private consultant to make an inventory of property in the area and analyze potential land use, and investigate funding sources such as grants, charitable foundations and governmental relief programs.

Sales Tax Collection Confirm That Texas Had a Green Christmas

(Austin)—Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn today reported that the state collected \$1.32 billion in sales tax revenue in January, up 5.9 percent compared to January 2003.

Also, Strayhorn sent Texas cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts February sales tax allocations totaling \$477.8 million, up 7 percent compared to a year ago.

January state sales tax revenue and local sales tax allocations for February primarily represent sales made in December, but also include some earlier sales by besinesses that report sales tax to the Comptroller on a quarterly or annuai basis.

"When I sent local governments their sales tax allocations last November. I promised that 'this year the Grinch isn't going to steal Christmas,'

and that was exactly right." Strayhorr said. "With the economic turnaround, sales tax collections have risen for five consecutive months. Like Dr. Seuss said in How the Grinch Stole Christmas, 'It started in low. Then it started to grow.'

The Comptroller sent \$326.4 million in sales tax to Texas cities, up 8 percent compared to February 2003 payments. Texas counties received February sales tax

payments of \$26.8 million, up tax payments to individual 7.9 percent.

Eighty-two special purpose taxing districts around the state received \$13.2 million in sales tax, up 5.7 percent compared to February 2003.

Texas' six metropolitan transit authorities and two city transit systems received \$111.2 million in February sales tax payments, up 4.3 percent compared to a year ago.



The Constitution of the United States declare in Article II, Section 2, paragraph 2 & 3: He (the President) shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Coart, and all other officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be

established by Law: but the Congress

may by Law vest the Appointment of

such inferior Officers, as they think

proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

"The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commission which shall expire at the end of their next ses-

The administration of paragraph 3 of this part of the U.S. Constitution today is known as "recess appoint-

This writer objected in previous articles to the appointment of Judge Charles Pickering to the Fifth Circuit based on his stance against black Americans and his anti-voting rights views. 






Artwork must be submitted in two formats: (1) 11x14 color. mounted for blackboard display, and (2) on disc in Adobe Illustrator; version 10 or below or Adobe Photoshop, version 7 or below.

Designs may be turned in at any branch of American State Bank by 3 p.m. on March 31. Entries will then be displayed in the lobby of ASB's main bank, 1401 Avenue Q, from April 5 through April 16. During that period, with lobby hours from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. ballots

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

February is the shortest month in the year and is afforded an extra day every four years which we call "leap year" when an extra day is tacked on. Unfortunately, the people who are born on that extra day, can only celebrate the actual date on which they were born, every four years, though most celebrate the 28th of February or March 1st on the other three years.

One would think that surely there would be a standard way to celebrate one's birthday which occurred on February 29th since this short month is crammed with every cause under the sun It is Black History Month, expanded from a week to a month of emphasis placed on the accomplishments of ^ fro-Americans.

In conjunctions with Black History month; it was on February 12, 1909 that the Lincoln Day Call

went out to concerned Americans of all races and denominations to form an organization which would work to establish justice and equality for the colored people of America. The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, commonly referred to as the N . A. A. C. P., was founded. Lincoln's birthday was selected because it was President Lincoln who issued the Emancipation Proclamation, calling for the freedom of slaves on January 1, 1K63, which he had signed on September 22, 18-2, in order to save the Union which was divided about slavery "The Peculiar Institution, according to Kenneth M. Stampp in his book of that title" written in 1955.

Through the efforts of W. E. B. Du Bois,, the first Black man to secure a PhD. Degree from Harvard University, as the editor of the organization's house organ. The Crisis, the organization has grown and is still viable and functioning to secure equality for Black Americans. It has had and still have some dynamic leaders who have worked to bring about positive change in the United States for minorities. Whenever

progress has been made for Black people in this country, all minority groups have benefited. Whether it is Kweisi Mfume or Alvin Chambliss, gains made for Black people benefit minorities and some members of the majority group.

The provisions (money) of the Ayers case, filed to bring about equality in higher education in Mississippi for Black students cannot be realized until the historically Black colleges in Mississippi achieve and maintain 10% White enrollment for three years. There are those of us who feel that this is harsh and somewhat unfair, but it is difficult to do much better in conservative courts. It took more than a couple of decades to get a verdict in this case, and some of the plaintiffs are not happy, but an appeal has been turned down. How do you bring a sub-standard house up to regulations when the main ingredient, money, is not available? It is time that we get 'in cinque' and take a closer look at satisfying the legal requirements of this landmark case in order to enhance education in the historically Black colleges set to benefit from the monetary awards.



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

It Happened ...

* Sunday, March 1, 1692: The Salem Witch Trials began, as two women were charged with practicing witchcraft. One of them was Tituba, a slave woman. Twenty people were executed.

* Thursday, February 26, 1732; The Catholic mass was celebrated for the first time in the US, at St. Joseph's Church in Philadelphia, PA

By the early 19th century. Howard University had established itself as a black intellectual mecca. boasting a group of increasingly distinguished professors and graduates. A hystander, George Holliday, videotaped a number of white officers as they delivered baton blows, kicks and stun-gun shocks to King's fallen body. The 90 seconds of beating captured on videotape was broadcast on national television. Four officers were tried on charges of brutality, before an all-white jury in a white Los Angeles suburb. On Wednesday, April 29, 1992, all four men were acquitted. They were subsequently tried in federal court in Los Angeles for violating King's civil rights, Two officers were acquitted and two were sentenced to 30 months in federal prison camps

Gibson Discusses 'Passion' with Dobson

Focus on the Family founder says movie "created in me an even greater love for Jesus,"

Colorado Springs — Mel Gibson, in his only radio interview about "The Passion of the Christ," tells Focus on the Family Chairman Dr. James Dobson on Monday that the controversy surrounding the film has been difficult on him and his family — but hardly unexpected.

"I felt the sting of these things: I think they're unfair, Gibson explains in reference to charges that the movie is anti-Semitic, "But if you're going to deal with the Passion, you're going to take some hits."

Dobson, whose "Focus on the Family" broadcast is heard by 2

million U.S. listeners each day, has seen two advance screenings of the film, which opens nationwide Wednesday. He tells Gibson he finds it "deeply disturbing and shocking and at the same time a powerful witness to the price said by Jesus Christ for you and me."

"It left me with a sense of guilt and responsibility," Dobson adds. "I did this to Him. I'm part of the curse of sin that was laid upon Him."

Dobson also discusses the violence in the R-rated film, which covers in excruciating detail the last 12 hours of Jesus' life — including

his scourging and Crucifixion,
Gibson admits the movie, which he
produced and directed, is graphic —
but for a purpose.

"It's hard to watch, but somehow

it's inspiring," Gibson says.
"There's something about the experience of it, the
violence of it, the humiliations and
the torture of it (that) relays the

enormity of the sacrifice."

As for the anti-Semitism charges, Gibson says he doesn't harbor - nor does the film contain - a hateful attitude toward Jews over the circumstances of Jesus' death.

"It's really obvious from the place.com/Ministries/Focus_on_the

first flames of the film that (Jesus' death is) a pre-ordained and divine plan," he explains. "That means the Almighty had this all figured out to put into effect at this time with His Son."

Watching that plan unfold so evocatively on screen, Dobson says, is something he will never forget.

"It created in me an even greater love for Jesus Christ." he saves, "I don't know how that is possible, but that's what it did."

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
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
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
