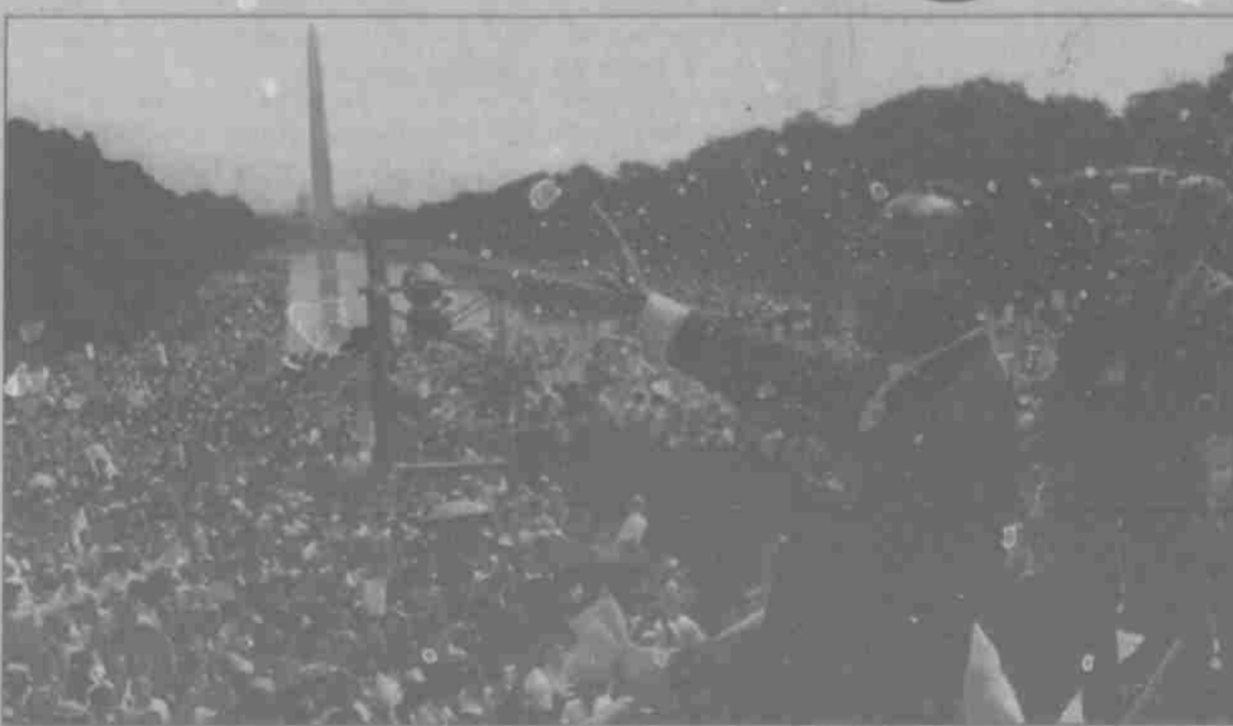

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MLK's message remembered at memorial groundbreaking

WASHINGTON (CNN) - Presidents, civil rights icons, celebrities and ordinary citizens gathered Monday on the National Mall, where construction is getting under way for a monument honoring the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

The monument will be built on a four-acre site near the Lincoln Memorial, where King delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" speech during the March on Washington for civil rights in August 1963.

President Bush said that he was proud to dedicate the memorial to "the lasting memory of a great man."

"Dr. King showed us that a life of conscience and purpose can lift up many souls, and on this ground

a monument will rise that preserves his legacy for the ages," Bush said.

"Honoring Dr. King's legacy requires more than building a monument. It requires the ongoing commitment of every American. So we will continue to work for the day when the dignity and humanity of every person is respected and the American promise is denied to no one."

Bush said it was fitting to place the King Memorial between the monuments for Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln.

"By its presence in this place, it will unite the men who declared the promise of America and defended the promise of America with the man who redeemed the

promise of America," Bush said. President Clinton signed legislation that kicked off the project in 1996.

"The monument, however beautiful it turns out to be, will be but a physical manifestation of the monument constructed in the minds and hearts of millions of Americans, who are more just, more decent, more successful, more perfect because he lived," Clinton said.

Clinton also stressed the importance of King's nonviolent message in today's society.

"When the real battlefield is the human heart, civil disobedience works better than suicide

bombings. Fighting your opponent with respect and reason works better than aspersion and attack."

Members of the King family attended the ceremony along with current and former members of Congress, writer Maya Angelou, talk show host Oprah Winfrey and civil rights leaders such as the Rev. Jesse Jackson and the Rev. Al Sharpton.

Construction of the \$100 million monument is scheduled to be completed in 2008, 40 years after King was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee.

Backers have raised more than \$65 million, according to The Associated Press. Most of the funding has come from corporate donors including Tommy Hilfifer and General Motors.

The monument's design was inspired by King's stirring sermons and will feature flowing water that will match the cadence

of his speech.

According to the memorial's official Web site, visitors entering the memorial will pass through two stones described as the mountain of despair to reach a third, the stone of hope - echoing King's 1963 speech.

The line "with this faith, we will be able to hew out of the mountain of despair a stone of hope" will be carved into one side of the entry.

The other side will be inscribed with the words: "Let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like a mighty stream."

Former U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young, one of King's lieutenants, said King's words were not important because he said them but because he lived them.

The King Memorial will be the first monument to a black American on the National Mall.

Jay-Z teams with U.N., MTV to bring attention to the world's water crisis

NEW YORK - When Jay-Z talks, his words reverberate all around the world.

On Wednesday morning (August 9), he held a press conference at the United Nations building with U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan, MTV President Christina Norman and others to announce a partnership aimed at bringing attention and relief to the many parts of the world where lack of safe drinking water is destroying communities and lives.

On his international tour, which begins next month, Jay will travel to several areas affected by the water crisis. His experiences will be documented by MTV for a special, "Diary of Jay-Z: Water, for Life," airing November 24.

The special will follow Jay's learning process as he meets people who are among the 1 billion worldwide without access to safe drinking water. It will also follow Jay as he visits places where sustainable, environmentally friendly solutions are under way to bring fresh water to devastated communities.

"It's a huge responsibility, and humbling at the same time," Jay said, after the conference, about the role he's taking on. "I wanted to go to these [countries I've never visited before] to just tour and play music. Of course, I can't go to any place without touching the culture and seeing what's going on. When you start getting down to Africa and places like that, you see that billions of people don't have access to water."

The special will also encourage young people to take any of the 12 steps associated with "Break the Addiction," MTV's yearlong campaign to engage young people to help reduce global warming, which has exacerbated the world's water crisis. Beginning in September, Think.mtv.com began featuring a special section dedicated to the project.

"It's a basic thing to us," Jay

said. "If you bring awareness to other young people, they're gonna see [that] and want to be involved. I'm not a politician - I'm just a regular person with a heart. If you see a problem like that and do nothing about it, there's something wrong with you."

Jay said that when he heard the statistics, he wanted to get involved right away.

"I'm very excited to go and not only be a rock star in these countries, but to help," he said while seated next to Annan. "I'm excited. Thanks to the U.N. and MTV."

Annan began the conference by citing statistics showing that more than 4,500 children die each day from preventable diseases caused by unsafe water and poor sanitation. Jay said he has donated money to help build "play pumps," a merry-go-round-like structure that pumps clean, safe drinking water from a deep borehole every time children spin it. He added that he's mailed letters to his friends in the entertainment industry encour-

aging them to get involved as well. He said he hopes 1,000 pumps can be built.

Jay's tour began on September 9 in Poland, and MTV's cameras caught up to him shortly after in Turkey. Initially, Hov said he wanted to go to places he never touched before but where he has a fanbase.

"I wanted to get out and play places I haven't seen. See people who have a connection, people who have been listening to my music for 10 years and never got to see me," he explained after the conference.

Although he acknowledged that it might be difficult to shake off the sadness of seeing so much human tragedy during the day and become a fun-loving showman at night, he said the shows will not be melancholy.

"Music is escapism," he said. "Also, I'll take joy in the fact for that two hours or however long I'm playing, everyone can enjoy themselves and forget about the issue we're talking about."



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O.J. to discuss 'how he would have committed' killings

LOS ANGELES - Fox plans to broadcast an interview with O.J. Simpson in which the former football star discusses "how he would have committed" the slayings of his ex-wife and her friend, for which he was acquitted, the network said.

The two-part interview, titled "O.J. Simpson: If I Did It, Here's How It Happened," will air Nov. 27 and Nov. 29, the TV network said.

Simpson has agreed to an "unrestricted" interview with book publisher Judith Regan, Fox said.

"O.J. Simpson, in his own words, tells for the first time how he would have committed the murders if he were the one responsible for the crimes," the network said in a statement. "In the two-part event, Simpson describes how he would have carried out the murders he has vehemently denied committing for over a decade."

The interview will air days before Simpson's new book, "If I Did It," goes on sale Nov. 30. The book, published by Regan, "hypothetically describes how the murders would have been committed."

In a video clip on the network's Web site, an off-screen interviewer says to Simpson, "You wrote 'I have never seen so much blood in my life.'"

"I don't think any two people could be murdered without every-

body being covered in blood," Simpson responds.

Simpson, who now lives in Florida, was acquitted in a criminal trial of the 1994 killings of his ex-wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend Ronald Goldman. Simpson was later found liable in 1997 in a wrongful death lawsuit filed by the Goldman family.

Messages left with Simpson and his attorney Yale Galanter were not immediately returned.

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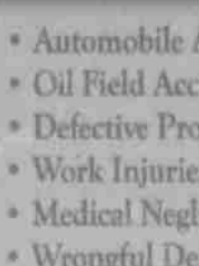

There ought to be a law preventing the issuance of credit cards to minors without parental consent.

Parents nowadays are currently concerned and worried about what and who their children are communicating with on the internet and on My Space which warrants watching, but they need to be watching the mail.

Credit card companies which will not give credit to adults who are gainfully employed but are sending forms in the mail to teenagers wherein all the child has to do is check a box and 'voila', a credit card comes in the mail and unsuspecting parents find out months later that their child owes thousands of dollars to some credit company.

The average teenager spends about two thousand dollars and

does not have any idea as to how or if they will pay their debt. If an inventory is requested for what was purchased with the credit, there is no way you can get an accounting unless you see the bill. The bill may reflect such entries as Nail Heaven for \$65.00, Cash advance, \$50.00, McDonald's \$8.98, Sonic, \$10.99, Rings and Things, \$200.00, The Tattoo Shop, \$75.00, J. C. Penney, \$250.00, and so on until the end of the month. At this rate, it does not take long to charge \$2000.00. That may be the total of one card. They may have two or three cards with similar balances!

An adult could use \$2000.00 to purchase a fairly old car in a good condition but would probably be turned down if he did not have some down payment or collateral for his loan, plus a job. The teenager will only have the debt whenever he gets a job. He will need to work soon and make some money quick. If he goes to college, chances are he will need a loan to

pay for college. Any way it goes, our young people are starting out in life with debt; debt which they cannot pay.

Upset parents will try to find a way to pay their children's debt, especially the credit card debts. Then some of the parents will file bankruptcy for their children. The laws about bankruptcy have changed, but it is worth a shot. Then we wonder, what is in it for these companies to send these credit cards to students with no income? There must be some profit for them in it when they are aware before they send the cards that the child has no income with which to pay his bills. This is the question. Who is making money when students cannot or will not pay the large balances which they owe? It is time to get 'in cinque' and find out the motivation behind this practice of sending credit cards to high school and college students who are unemployed and not of legal age to make such acceptance decisions.

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Planned Parenthood advances civil rights agenda: Health access for all

Ensuring health access for women and families as a national policy priority, Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA) recently joined the nearly 200-member Leadership Conference on Civil Rights (LCCR), the nation's largest civil rights coalition.

"We're delighted to welcome Planned Parenthood into the LCCR family," said LCCR President and CEO Wade Henderson. "Health care reform is the next frontier for the civil rights movement. We are confident that as one of the nation's leading health advocates, Planned Parenthood will be a strong ally in the push for health care reform."

Henderson's focus on health care reform is underscored by the recent data indicating that nearly 47 million Americans lack health insurance and access to health services. PPFA President Cecile Richards insists that health care access for all - regardless of race,

gender or economic status - is a civil right.

"Planned Parenthood works to create stronger communities and families, providing prevention services, health screening and treatment for women regardless of their financial means. Our affiliates across the country ensure that the doors are always open," Richards said.

With affiliates serving low-income and minority women at more than 860 health centers across the country, Richards maintained that Planned Parenthood is combating the overwhelming statistics that put African-American women at the top of high-risk categories for infections like HIV/AIDS and cervical cancer.

Representing 13 percent of the population, African Americans account for half of new HIV/AIDS diagnoses. Black women, many without health insurance, are hit hardest, constituting approximately

64 percent of all women with HIV.

African-American women experience a disproportionately high death rate from cervical cancer, a condition easily treated with early detection and a regular Pap test. In 2001, the cervical cancer death rate for black women was more than twice that of white women.

Richards noted that PPFA affiliates complement reproductive health screening and treatment services with programs that empower young people to lead healthier lives. Planned Parenthood affiliates across the country offer a safe place for at-risk teens with programs that promote responsible decision making and that address the difficult issues they confront. Of the nearly 19 million people who contract sexually transmitted infections (STIs) annually, 9.1 million are among young people between the ages of 15 and 24 years. Many of these young men

and women suffer long-term health problems as a consequence of infection.

Young and minority women are also disproportionately affected by other STIs, such as gonorrhea, syphilis, and chlamydia. These STIs make women three to five times more vulnerable to HIV infection. Awareness programs have proven invaluable to reducing transmission of these infections, explained Richards, who also pointed to prevention programs for young women focused on education about contraceptive options and access to family planning services as vital parts of clinic operations.

"Every child deserves to be loved, wanted and given a fair start in life," said Richards.
