



Redskins safety Sean Taylor dies a day after being shot at this home

MIAMI (AP) - Pro Bowl safety Sean Taylor died Tuesday after he was shot in his home by an apparent intruder, leaving the Washington Redskins in mourning for a teammate who seemed to have reordered his life since becoming a father.

The 24-year-old player died at Jackson Memorial Hospital, where he had been airlifted after the shooting early Monday.

"It is with deep regret that a young man had to come to his end so soon," father Pedro Taylor sald in a statement on behalf of the family. "Many of his fans loved him because the way he played football. Many of his opponents feared him the way he approached the game. Others misunderstood him, many appreciated him and his family loved him."

A string of mourneys, including Taylor's father, visited the player's home and embraced outside. Authorities entered the home, but it was unclear what they were doing.

NFL commissioner Roger Goodell said the league will honor Taylor's memory at Impantes this weekend.

Start smart Begin lunch and dinner with a veggie-rich salad or broth-based soup, says Pennsylvania State University satiety expert Barbara Rolls, author of "The Volumetries Eating Plan." "That lets you fill up first on a big voiume of low-calorie food and ends up displacing some of the foods you'll eat next -- the choices that are usually higher in calories."

Here's a good salad recipe. Mix 11/2 cups of salad greens with % cup of raw veggies like onlons, bell peppers, carrots, broccoll, or cucumbers; drizzle with 2 tablespoons of low-cal bottled dressing

"Ten minutes before each meal, eat some healthy fat (around 70 calories or fewer); a handful of nuts, a few slices of avocado, or a spoonful of peanut butter, for example. That helps activate ghrelin, a hormone that lets you know you're full," says Michael Roizin, MD, co-author with Mehmet Oz. MD, of "You on a Diet: The Owner's Manual for Waist Management."

Try the 3-hour rule

"The secret to losing weight comes down to keeping your metabolism alive and active," according to fitness guru Jorge Cruise, author of "The 3-Hour Diet." How do you do that? By eating every 3 hours, give or take 10 to 20 minutes, he says, which translates to three moderate meals with three snacks (100 calories each) between meals.

Though other experts say there's nothing magic about 3hour intervals, eating small, frequent, portion-controlled meals and snacks can keep your blood sugar level steady, your energy up, and keep you from overindulging.

Detroit Named America's Most Dangerous City

blow to the Motor City's tarnished image, Detroit pushed past St. Louis to become the nation's most dangerous city, according to a privale research group's controversial aralysis, released Sunday, of annual FBI crime statistics.

The study drew harsh criticism even before it came out. The American Society of Criminology humched a pre-emptive strike Friday, issuing a statement attacking it as "an irresponsible misuse" of crime data.

The 14th annual "City Crime Rankings: Crime in Metropolitan Americal was published by CQ Press, a unit of Congressional Quarterly Inc. It is based on the FBI's Sept. 24 crime statistics report.

The report looked at 378 cities with at least 75,000 people based on per-capita rates for homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary and auto theft. Each crime category was considered separately and weighted based on its seriousness, CQ Press said.

Last year's crime leader. St. nutrition researcher Richard Louis, fell to No. 2. Another-Michigan city, Flint, ranked third, followed by Oakland Calif.; Camden, N.J.; Birmingham, Ala.; North Charleston, S.C.; Memphis, Tenn.; Richmond, Calif.; and after drinking the same amount of Cleveland.

The study ranked Mission Viejo, Calif., as the safest U.S.



Vigilance Against Bigotry and Intolerance Demands a National Rosa Parks Day By Earl Ofari Hutchinson

Two things will happen within forty eight hours of each other-One is infuriating. The other one should be unuse for celebration and uplift. But both tell much about the state of race matters in America, The first is the return of nappy hard ho' shock jock, Don' Imus to the airwaves. He'll kick off his return to ABC's flagship station, WABC, in New York City with a big townhall of the airwaves style shebang. Two days before Imus's triumphal return, murks the date fifty two years ago, December 1, 1955, that Rosal Parks refused to give up her seat to a white man on a Montgomery, Alabama bus.

Her courageous stand against segregation was a monumental turning point in the civil rights movement. It should have sont the lasting message that the fight against the horror of bigotry, intolerance, and racial hate must never cease. But that message has been lost, strayed, misplaced, or deliberately squashed. Imus's blaze of glory return is a huge sign that intolerance is not only alive and well in the media business, among Imus's legions of fevered fans, but also among many more who cheered him on and ducked, dodged, deflected attention from, or flat out defended his bigoted remarks.


The spate of hanging nooses, the rise in hate crimes nationally, black and Latino gang hate violence in Los Angeles and other cities, and the resurgence of the use of racial epithets and vilification by public and private figures is more glaring evidence that intolerance and bigotry are still alive and kicking.

Re-enter Rosa Parks. What better way to kick back at these twin evils than to declare December 1, Rosa Parks Human Rights Day, Business leaders, school administrators, and elected officials should and could encourage students, workers, and residents to reaffirm in word and deed their commitment to toler ance and diversity. They in turn would urse others to honor and pay tribute to the spirit and memory of Rosa Parks.

Parks' coursecous and longoverdue beat down of Jim Crow segregation staked out the moral high ground for the modern-day civil rights insvement. It was classic good versus evil. In the years immediately following her act, gory news scenes of batonbattering rackst Southern sheriffs, fire hoses, police dogs and Klan violence unleashed against peaceful black protesters sickened Americans. All except the most rabid racists considered racial segregation immoral and indefensible. Parks and civil rights lenders were hailed as American heroes in the fight for justice. Martin Luther King Jr., who tops the list of those heroes and martyrs, owed a profound debt of gratizade to Parks. The Montgomery bus boycott launched him from obscure preacher to American icon.

Still, as America unraveled in the 1960s in the anarchy of urban riots, campus takeovers and antiwar street battles, the civil rights movement and its leaders fell apart too. Many of them fell victim to their own success. When they broke down the racially restricted doors of corporations, government agencies and universities, middle class blacks, not the poor, were the ones who rushed headlong through those doors. Civil rights organizations and black politicians defined the black agenda in increasingly narrow terms: affirmative action, economic parity, professional advancement and busing replaced battling poverty, reducing unemployment, securing quality education, promoting self-help and gaining greater political empowerment as the goals for all African-Americans.



When is death humane? This is a question for which I would love to hear the answer. It was not long ago that an autistic young girl was given recognition for engineering what has been called a humane way to slaughter cartle for human consumption. We are talking about steak. Some people like it so rare until you wonder if they stabbed it in the kitchen. How many people wonder, to themselves, before they cat the steak if the animal died in a humane way? Will the way in which an animal dies decide if it is going to heaven or hell? The Bible states in one commandment that "Thou shalt not kill." There is no mention of dogs or other animals except man. As a matter of fact, the killing of animals for human consumption is throughout



Sean Taylor Dies From Shooting

Continued on Page I

Two bouquets were left by a palm tree outside a front gate of the home. Beside the mailbox, an untouched newspaper lay with news of Taylor's shooting.

Taylor's death comes nearly a year after Broncos comerback Derrent Williams was killed in a drive-by shooting following an argument at a Denver nightclub on Jan. 1. University of Minmi defensive lineman Bryan Patal was shot to death in November 2006 several miles from Taylor's home in an unsolved killing.

Doctors had been encouraged late Monday when Taylor squeezed a nurse's hand. according to Vinny Cerrato, the Redskins' vice president of football operations. But family friend Richard Sharpstein said he was told Taylor never regained consciousness after being taken to the hospital, and he wasn't sure how he had squeezed the nurse's hand. He said Taylor's father told him the death occurred about 5:30 a.m.

Maybe he was trying to say goodbye or something. Sharpstein said.

Taylor, the fifth overall pick in the 2004 NFL draft following an All-American season at Miami, was shot early Monday in the upper leg, damaging the key femoral artery and causing significant blood loss.

Trauma experts said a serious wound to this large artery. leading from the abdomen through the upper thigh, is among the most difficult to fix and can quickly drain the body of blood. Too long a blood loss prevents oxygen from reaching the brain and vital organs.

"According to a preliminary investigation, it appears that the victim was shot inside the home by an intruder," Miami-Dade County police said in a statement. "We do not have a subject description at this time."

The attack came just eight days after an intruder was reported at Taylor's home. Officers were sent to the home about 1:45 a.m. Monday after Taylor's girlfriend called 911.

Sharpstein said Taylor's girlfriend told him the couple was awakened by loud noises, and Taylor grabbed a machete he keeps in the bedroom for protection. Someone then broke through the bedroom door and fired two shots, one missing and one hitting Taylor, Sharpstein said. Taylor's 1-year-old daughter, Jackie, was also in the house, but neither she nor Taylor's girlfriend was injured.

Police found signs of forced entry, but have not determined if they were caused Monday or during the previous burglary.

The shooting happened in the pale yellow house Taylor bought two years ago. In last week's break-in, police said someone pried open a cront window, rifled through drawers and left a kitchen knife on a

Taylor starred as a running back and defensive back at Golliver Prep in Minml. His finher is police chief of Florida

A private man with a small inner circle, Taylor rarely granted interviews. But, behind the scenes. Taylor was described as personable and smart.

After Taylor was drafted. problems soon began. Taylor, fired his agent, then skipped part of the NFL's mandatory rookie symposium, drawing a \$25,000 fine. Driving home late from a party during the season, he was pulled over and charged with drunken driving. The case was dismissed in court, but by then it had become a monthslong distraction for the Redskins.

Taylor also was fined at least seven times for late hits, uniform violations and other infractions over his first three seasons, including a \$17,000 penalty for spitting in the face of an opponent during a 2006 playoff game.

Taylor endured a yearlong legal battle after he was accused in 2005 of brandishing a gun at a man during a fight over allegedly stolen all-terrain vehicles near Taylor's home. He eventually pleaded no contest to two misdemeanors and was sentenced to 18 months' probation.

Taylor said the end of the assault case was like "a gray cloud" being lifted. It was also around the time that his daughter was born, and teammates noticed change.

On the field, Taylor's play was often erratic. Assistant coach Gregg Williams frequently called Taylor the best athlete he'd ever coached, but nearly every big play was mitigated by a blown assignment. Taylor led the NFL in missed tackles in 2006 yet made the Pro Bowl because of his reputation as one of the hardest hitters in the league.

This year, however, Taylor was allowed to play a true free safety position, using his speed and power to chase down passes and crush would-be receivers. His five interceptions tie for the league lead in the NFC, even though he missed the last two games because of a sprained

"I just take this job very seriously," Taylor said in a rare group interview during training camp. 'It's almost like, you play a kid's game for a king's ransom. And if you don't take it serious enough, eventually one day you're going to say, 'Oh, I could have done this, I could have done that."

"So I just say, I'm healthy right now. I'm going into my fourth year, and why not do the hest that I can?' And that's whatever it is, whether it's eating right or training myself right, whether it's studying harder, whatever I an do to better myself."

Poll: Residents believe city's crime rate increasing Police chief says city's crime actually decreasing



A 19-year-old is shot to death at a Central Lubbock convenience store.

A week later, a 73-year-old man is stabbed to death in the garage of his Southwest Lubbock home after offering a bottle of water to a stranger.

A few weeks later, a drive-by shooting claims the life of a 15year-old in East Lubbook. July 2007 was a month many in Lubbock would like to forget.

But the random violence of July is still in the minds of people, many of whom believe Lubbock is experiencing a crime wave.

Crime has increased tremendously," said Mike Turner, 33, who has lived in and around Lubbook his entire life. "Lubbook used to feel like a safe Southern town. Not anymore. I just don't feel safe in this town."

Turner was one of 578 people who participated in an unscientific online poll conducted last month by The Avalanche-Journal.

Eighty-eight percent of respondents, including Turner, said they believe crime has increased in Lubbock. At first glance, statistics show that the peoples' fear is rooted in truth.

In the past five years, Lubbock has averaged 13.4 murders a year. As of today, there have been 13 murders in Lubbock this year.

About the poll · After several high-profile murders in Lubbook in July, editors at The Avalanche-Journal decided to conduct an online poll

And federal Bureau of Justice Statistics numbers show Lubbock has the third highest violent-crime rate among all Texas cities with a population of more than 100,000 just behind Dullas and Houston.

But that doesn't mean Lubbock is experiencing a crime spree, Lubbook Police Chief Claude Jones said.

"Lubbock is safe," said Jones, who dismisses the Bureau of Justice Statistics numbers as unreliable and blames local media for spreading paranola and fear among the public.

By the numbers

Crime is actually decreasing in decreasing over time. Lubbock, said Jones.

Part I crimes, which include murder, aggravated assault, rape, robbery, burglary, theft and arson, were down 2.5 percent during the first six months of 2007, Jones said.

And arrests in Lubbock were up 27 percent during the first half of 2007.

"The fact that we're adding officers and making arrests is helping to reduce orime in Lubbock," Jones said.

As violent as July may seem, there have been months recently with either an equal number or more murders.

In February, for example, three people also were killed in Lubbock.

In March 2003, four people" were murdered in Lubbock. Four murders also were reported in October 2004, with four murders again in December 2006.

Concerning the Bureau of Justice Statistics numbers that place Lubbock's violent crime rate up with Dallas and Houston. Jones and other police officials say those numbers can't be relied

"There is a large tendency for

cities to underreport," said Dale Holton, assistant police chief. "That's why their crime rate is.

Residents in some cities also may be reluctant to report crime, a problem Jones said doesn't exist in Lubbock

A more accurate indication of how dengerous a city is would be to look at the morder rate, which' is reported more consistently than the violent orline rate.

Lubbook had 5.2 murders per 100,000 residents in 2005, according to the Bureau of Justice.

Public perception

So if crime is lower in Lubbock than it has been in the past, why does the public feel the city is experiencing a crime wave?

Dick McGlynn, professor of psychology at Texas Tech University, said public opinion can easily be swayed by just a couple of vivid instances, such as the series of murders in Lubbock

"Those instances that are most vivid are the ones that influence our judgments," McGlynn said.

McGlynn said it's a mormal tendency for people to be "overly influenced" by vivid events, even If those assumptions go against logic, such as when statistics

Others, including the police chief, blame the media for making. the public feel crime is out of control in Lubbeck.

"Public perception is led by what the media tells people," said Jones, who added local cardia overemphasizes the negative and typically downplays any positive.

Jones also agrees the nature of July's random murders were unusual and likely frightened the

Those were not common Dallas' murder rate in 2005 types of murders in Lubbock,"

For whatever reason, residents

Amarillo - Lubbock's closest are scared. "I think crime has increased dramatically over the past few years," said Camille Powe, who lives near Ransom Canyon and has worked in Lubbock for the past decade. "It seems like the crimes reported recently are more

> horrific than in the past." Powe said she believes much of the crime in Lubbock can be attributed to drugs.

She said she also believes the city needs to hire more police.

Others living in and around

Lubbock have a different opinion. Henry Martinez, 47, has lived in Lubbook almost his entire life
