

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

The Downfall of Black Males: Social Crisis or Victimization Attitude? Part 2

Continued from last week...

There are those who believe Black men in America have been made a permanent under class and no amount of education or accumulation of wealth, or otherwise will allow them to overcome in a racist society. There are others who believe the true success of Black men will be the allevia-

Black men must hitch their goals and aspiration to the economic and social stars of success. Black men must realize that succeeding is an individualist goal. One must not think the goal is beyond their reach in America. Black males must understand other blacks that are at the pinnacle of their personal success have experience and still experience limitations to their freedom because of their race. However, there are those of us who believe true success is achieved by rising above the attitude of being a vic-

While it is true, the Black community has not risen from the quagmires of a deep social crisis as other groups, Black males must not be victimized by a slave mentality. The institution of slavery dates back thousand of years. No other group have experience the pain of slavery as Blacks in America. History reveals the Roman slaves were protected citizens and could own their homes and possessions. Not so with

Blacks slaves in America, Black that demand respect. slaves were dehumanized in the worst possible way. They were burned, skinned, boiled, beheaded, raped, and sodomized. They were broken physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually, Moreover, it seems only a few days ago the laws were change.

However, Black males must tion of victimization thoughts and not allow themselves to be victimized by the events of the past. They must not hold on to victimization status. Black males must do away with the negative attitude that society owes them a living. This excuse for not wanting to work will not fly. Black males must practice self-discipline and hard work to achieve the Ameri-

> Achieving the American dream does not include incarceration in a correctional institution. Achieving the American dream does not mean selling drugs c: become addicted to drugs. Achieving the American dream does not mean impregnating a young woman and leaving your son or daughter to grow up

> Black males must realize that achieving the American dream is more than having put your family on Medicaid, Food Stamps, WIC and the like because you are to lazy or have not equipped yourself educationally to support them. Black males must rise above the victimization status and become true human beings

There is a term in cultural literacy known as "value judg-Value judgment is defined as follows: "An assessment of a person, situation, or event. The term is often restricted to assessments that ceveal the values of a person making the assessment rather than the objective realities of what is being assessed. For example, a teacher who describes a student as 'the best I've taught - very polite and obedient' is making a value judgment about the qualities (politeness and obedience) that make a student good."

Another term in cultural literacy is subculture. Subculture is defined in the following manner: "A group within a society that has it own shared set of customs, attitudes, and values, often accompanied by jargon or slang. A subculture can be organized around a common activity, occupation, age, status, ethnic background, race, religion, or any other unifying social condition, but the term is often used to describe deviant groups, such as thieves and drug

Black males must not condescend to the negatives of "value judgment" by creating a social crisis through the means of victimization. Black males must not yield to the negative behavior of deviant groups. Be a success story. Work hard to make something of yourself.





by Renetta Howard Just when we thought we told that the real deal will be to work we will have to apply for \$4.00 a gallon. What is a poor day as far as daily transportation person to do? In rural communities, the average worker travels anywhere from 30 to 50 miles one way to work. At \$4.00 per gallon, a vehicle attaining 30miles a gallon will cost the person traveling 60 miles roundtrip a total of \$8.00 per day; \$40 per week or about \$170 per month for gasoline. With the high cost of vehicles averaging monthly payments of \$300 per month for a used car, plus the cost of insurance at about \$100 per month, transportation alone would cost this short trip to work a whopping \$570 per month. Woe be to the worker who has to travel 100 miles per day roundtrip even if his vehicle does get 30miles to the gallon. He will still spend about \$14.00 per day for gasoline to the tune of \$70 per week or about \$300 per month for gasoline. If you add the cost of the same used car to this example, \$700 will be the cost of trans-
