Labor Councils Endorse Mathis

Lubbock and Odessa area Central Labor Councils have endorsed the candidacy of Lubbock accountant Mary Nell Mathis, Democrat, for the United States House of Representatives.

Ron Wolfe, vice president of the Lubbock Central Labor Council and spokesman for the Texas State Employees Union/Communications Workers of America, said, "We know Mathis to be a person of integrity, a champion of citizens' rights and a friend of working men and women."

Strip Search Decision

Monday, March 10, 1986, was a red letter day in law enforcement in Lubbock County and all the residents who are subject to law enforcement in Lubbock County.

On that day the United States Supreme Court in effect approved the judgment of the United States District Court here in Lubbock and the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans by refusing to review the decision which held that law enforcement people cannot routinely strip search persons who are arrested and taken to jail before they have an opportunity to make bond and before they are placed in the permanent jail population unless there is a good reason to do so.

Less intrusive searches such as pat down and metal detectors can be used to determine whether or not there is a good reason.

Although law enforcement personnel may have a contrary opinion which they hold in good faith, the staff at West Texas Legal Services believes that this

holding is in the best interest of humane treatment of individuals regardless of the circumstances in

which they may find themselves. Hopefully many will avoid

being strip searched who would be made to feel, as Barbara Wilkerson was, as an "animal" by being strip searched. Subject to the ultimate determination and approval of the court, the county

must pay in addition to costs and attorneys fees, Barbara Wilkerson, \$10,000.00 ordinary damages and \$5,000.00 punitive damages against the sheriff of Lubbock County.

Partnership Brings Brighter Future To Black Colleges

Washington, D. C., Feb. 24 — Perhaps at no time in American history has the nation focused so intently on the progress and achievements of blacks than a month ago, when it celebrated the first national holiday in honor of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. A few weeks later, Robert McHair, the second black astronaut in

space, stepped into the pages of history as a member of the crew of the Space Shuttle Challenger, which exploded in flight. Aside from being recorded in the annals of American history, these two men share a common educational experience: both graduated from black colleges.

The nation's predominantly

black institutions of higher education have produced more black graduates who have gone on to earn graduate degrees and enter the professions than 2,000 other colleges and universities combined. Well over 50 percent of the nation's black business, public officials, federal judges and doctors are graduates of these schools.

In spite of these accomplishments, many of the nation's 105 historically black colleges and universities still struggle with limited financial resources to provide quality education.

Endowment building, however, once considered beyond the capability of small minority colleges, is today becoming a key resource in guiding these institutions toward greater financial independence. Endowment efforts are largely the result of a partnership with the United Negro College Fund (UNCF), black colleges and the life and health insurance industry's College Endowment Funding Plan (CEFP).

Thirty-seven colleges are participating in the innovative CEFP investment program, which will produce \$170 million in endowments and operating income over the next 25 years for these schools. To date, 32 insurance companies have provided more than \$30 million in

below-market-rate loans for the program.

The CEFP was created ten years ago by Dr. Frederick D. Patterson, who was president of Tuskegee Institute from 1935-1955. It is a self-help program through which a participating college is eligible for a \$50,000 bonus from the UNCF and a loan of \$400,000 from an insurance company for each \$300,000 unit the school is able to raise on its own. The \$750,000 package is invested in long-term, high-quality, fixed-interest securities. Earnings from the package provide the college with funds to meet required loan repayment with enough remaining for endowment accumulation.

Dr. Patterson also founded the UNCF, which has provided more than \$400 million in grants to its member colleges since being established in 1944.

"We owe a great debt of gratitude to the nation's historically black colleges," said Rep. Augustus Hawkins (D-Calif.), chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee. "For decades, these institutions have shouldered the burden of educating thousands of

financially and academically disadvantaged youngsters." Says Dr. Benjamin F. Payton, current president of Tuskegee University, "Solid partnerships must continue to emerge if these institutions are to sustain their strength, continue to grow and adequately prepare students to participate in the mainstream of American life."

Parenting Classes Slated For Parents With Children 12-19

Parents with children 12 years old and up will have the opportunity to attend informal sessions geared to this particular parenting challenge. In past sessions, parents have reported learning from the presentations and media as well as from talking informally with other parents of teens.

The sessions will be held at the Catholic Family Service offices, 123 North Avenue N. The sessions are non-denominational in content to allow for the participation of parents of any religious persuasion.

The sessions will be held April 3rd, 10th, 17th and May 1st, 8th, and 15th. These six Thursday nights from 7-9 will present topics ranging from how to provide encouragement, how to improve communication, ways to discipline, and supporting parents as people too.

There are many reasons for calling 765-8475 to register.

Some parents want to start out teen parenting on the right foot, some want to help in getting back in step, while others want to improve an already satisfactory relationship with their teenagers.

Sessions are \$10 per person for the series of six sessions, but when both parents attend, \$15 is charged to encourage the participation of the couple. However, these sessions will not be denied to anyone because of a lack of money.

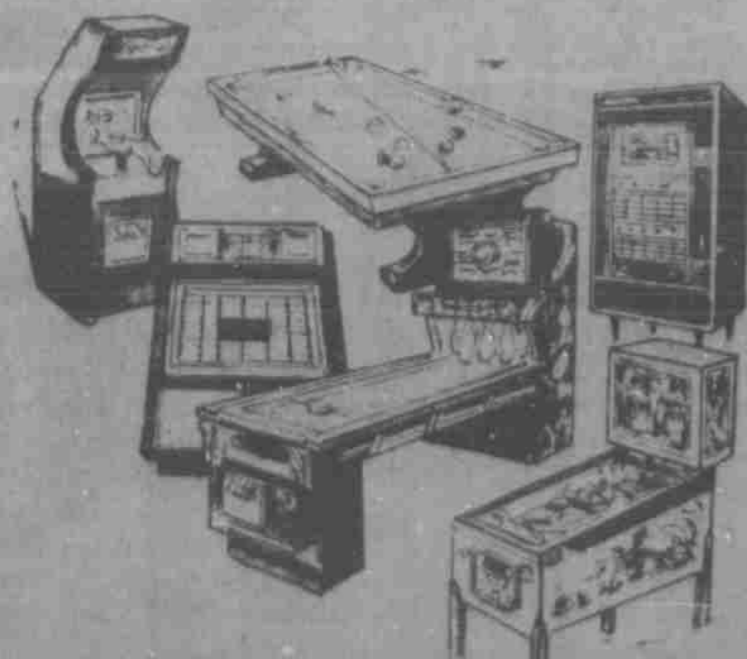
