

First Black Lawyer in Selma, J.L. Chestnut, Dies



SEI WA, Ala. (AP) - J.L. Chestnut Jr., the first black lawyer in Selma and a prominent attorney in civil rights important lawyers in that whole cases across a half century, has died at age 77.

Chestaut's law partner, state Sen. Haak Senders of Selma, said Chestnut died Tuesday morning at # Birmingham hospital. He said Chestnut's kidneys had begun to fail from as infection after an operation.

A Selma native who got his law degree at Howard University, Chestaut returned to his hometown in 1958 and became a key legal figure in the civil rights battles in Selma. Later he defended blacks in major voter fraud prosecutions and helped black firmers make financial claims against the U.S. Agriculture Department

"Fie was really a giant as far as fighting for black voting and legal rights for bulf a century," said Julia Cass, a former journalist who co-authored Chestral's autobiography, "Black In Selma: The Uncommon Life of J.L. Chestnut Jr."

"He was just an indomitable advocate for black people, whother it was getting them to vote, getting them on juries, desingregating the achools, hoving a black Sents in the mell, getting thick people to run for office. So over the course of his lifetime mere's certainly no one more important in terms of black empowerment in Selmathan J.L. Chestrut," she said.

Friends and co-workers also remembered him as a character. whose clowning could always make for an entertaining butch or get-together. He had a knock for injecting humor into touse discussions and wan't afraid of pointing out elephants in the room when others were tooaffinid to, they said.



O. J. Simpson Found Gulity

Las Vegas, NV - O.J. Simpson, who went from American sports idol to celebrity-in-exile after he was acquitted of murdeting his ex-wife and a friend, was found guilty Friday of robbing two sportsmemorabilia dealers at grupoint in a Las Vegas hotel room.

The 61-year-old former football star could spend the rest of his life in prison after he is sontenord Doc. 5.

A weary and somber Simpson released a heavy sigh as the charges were road in raped fire by the clerk in Clark County District Court. He was immediately taken into custody:

The Hall of Fame football star was found guilty of kidnapping, armed robbery and 10 other charges for gathering up five men a year ago and storming into a room at hotel-casino, where the group seized several game balls, plaques and photos. Prosecutors said two of the men with him were armed; one of them said he brought a gun at Simpoon's request.

Simpson's co-defendant, Clarence "C.J." Stewart, 54, also was found guilty on all charges and taken into custody.



"WATCH THOSE DOG'S"

Upon my arrival the town dogs! that did not look like me sent its police force to deal and frighten this young educated black male. That was when I begin to truly understand the nature of domesticated and wild dogs and its malign effects as related to humankind. It is reported that nearly 80% of all hunts end in a kills. Members of a pack vocalize to help coordinate their move-



The report also says this large-animal hunting tactic appears to be a learned behavior, passed on from generation to generation with specific hunting packs, (sound familiar) rather than an instinctive behavior found commonly within the species.







O. J. Simpson Found! Guilty Continued from Page 1

after Simpson was cleared of murder in Los Angeles in one of the most sensational trials of the 2C.h century.

From the beginning Simpson and lawyers argued the incident in Las Vegas was not a robbery; instead, they said, he was trying to reclaim mementos that had been stolen from him. He said he did not ask anyone to bring a gun and did not see any guns.

The defense portrayed Simpson as a victim of shady characters who wanted to make a buck off his famous name, and police officers who saw his arrest as an opportunity to "gct" him and avenge his acquittal.

Prosecutors said Simpson's ownership of the memorabilia was irrelevant, it was still a crime to try to take things by force.

"When they went into that goom and forced the victims to the far side of the room, puiling out guns and yelling. 'Don't let anybody out of here! - six very large people detaining these two victims in the room with the intent to take property through force or violence from them that's kidnapping," prosecutor David Roger aid.

Kidnapping is punishable by five years to life in prison. Armed robbery carries a mandatory sentence of at least two years behind burs, and could bring as much as 30 years.

Simpson, who now lives in Minni, did not testify, but was heard on a recording of the confrontation, screaming that the dealers had stolen his property.

"Don't let nebody out of this room," he declared and told the other men to accop up his items, which included a photo of Simpson with former FISL
