

### **HOUSE PASSES GI BILL 381-0**

The House of Representatives passed this last week the GI Bill, by a vote of 384-0, leaving only a vote in the Senate some time in the near future which is expected to also pass the bill unamiously.

Permanent education and loan benefits for men and women who serve in the Armed Forces of the United States would be provided under this bill.

This particular bill would affect nearly 3.5 million veterans, covering servicemen who were in uniform since early in 1955, when the previous Korean War GI benefits program ended.

even more costly version, estiamted at \$400 million in its first year.

The House Bill's major provi-

- 1. All servicemen who were on duty for at least 180 days after January 31, 1955 would be entitled to one month of education or training for each month spent in uniform, with a maximum of 36 months. Payments for full-ttime students would be \$100 monthly for men without dependents, \$125 per month for those with one dependent, and \$150 per month for those with more than one. The scale in the Senate Bill is \$10 a month in each category. Unlike the program in effect in the WW II GI Bill, tutition would not be paid.
- 2. The education benefits would become effective on June 1 and would have to be completed within eight years of the date of discharge. In case of men already discharged, the time limit would be eight years from June 1.
- 3. The Veterans Administration would guarantee private home and farm purchase loans up to a maximum guarnatee of \$7,500 and could make direct loans up to \$17,500 if private financing is not
- 4. The loan benefits would become effective upon enactment of the bill. The House committee revised the bill's language to make it claer that persons volunteering to serve on active duty ofr only six months and then go into the reserves will not be eligible for

Other colleges and institutions Gay has attended include Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist Univerity; Garrett Bible School at North-Western University; Midwestern Univeristy; University of Texas and Mortimer Schiff Scout Trainging Institute, Mendham, N.J..

He holds a life professional teachers's certificate, a counselor's certificate, and an administrator's certificate.

A leader in his community, Gay has served on many civic and cultural boards including the USO, chamber of commerce, health committee, East Branch YMCA, Wichita County Tuberculosis Association, North Texas Mental Health Center, Salvation Army campaign, Eastside Community Development Association, Wichita Falls Area Council of Churches and neighborhood commissioner of BoysScouts of America.

He received two "service to Youth Awards" from YMCA.

Prior to coming to Wichita Falls, Gay taught in Broken Bow, Oklahoma, Gilmer, Mount Pleasant, and Gladewater, Texas.

He is a veteran of World War II and also served as a field scout executive, Boy Scouts of America in Tyler.

He belongs to many professional organizations and he is an ordained Baptist minister. He is a member of Antioch Baptist Church and has served as the Brotherhood presidnet, teacher of Young Fisherman's Club and has been an interim minister on two occassions.

Gay's wife, Mary, a Midwestern University graduate is a teacher at Washington Elementary School and also is an officer and active worker in the Antioch Baptist Church, a Sunday school teacher and choir member.

The Wichitian earned his Doctorate by attedning evening and Saturday classes, plus summer sessions at NTSU. He began the Doctoral program in June of 1959. He now is the only teacher in the local school system with an earned Doctorate.










