



Father's Day will bring joy to all the family. Happy Father's Day, Dad...



The graudate is the wife of Mr. Leroy Cleaver, Jr., a Civil Engineer Instructor of SAFB, the mother of four teenage children, and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Bagley of 518 Roosevelt.

WEEK IN NEGRO HISTORY

--- An NPI Feature

Frances Williams, one of the first Negro college June 5, 1758 graduates, startles academic world in the United States by publishing a poem in Latin.

First annual national convention of "The People of June 6, 1831 Color" opened in Philadelphia.

June 7, 1799 Alexander Puskin, grandson of a noted Africaa warrior who became Russia's foremost poet and writer, was born in Moscow.

Bishop A. P. Shaw established precedeit by being June 8, 1950 the first Negro prelate to preside over California-Arizona conference of the Methodist Church.

The Carnegie Corporation, which became the basis June 9, 1911 for the philanthropic fund that built many Negro libraries, received its charter to do business in the state of New York.

June 10, 1945 Dr. Dorace Mann Bond was elected by the trustees as the first Negro president of Lincoln University in Pennsylvania.

Hazel Scott, well-known jazz pianist and ex-wife June 11, 1920 of New York Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, was born in Portof-Spain, Trinidad.

June 12, 1948 The American Nurses Association breaks custon by electing a Negro nusre to its national board of directors.

June 13, 1942 Maceo, noted black Cuban revolutionist, was born in Santiago, Cuba.

Harriet Beecher Stowe, author of Uncle Tom's Ca-June 14, 1811 bin, a book that spurred the abolitionist movement, was born in Litchfield, Conn.

Booker T. Washington, following his graduation from Hampton Institute, Va., arirved in Tuskegee, Ala., to take charge of the small school which he later developed into the world famous Tuskegee Institute.

The Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, giving former slaves the right of citizenship, was proposed in Congress.

The Battle of Bunker Hill, in which many Negroes June 17, 1775 saw action and died, took place.

June 18, 1941 George Washington Carver was awarded the honorary doctor of sceince degree by the University of Rochester for his research at Tuskegee Institute.

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
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SOMEONE BREAKING IN. .

Sheppard Sergeant Receives B.S. Degree From Drury College



Sheppard AFB, Texas--One man's desire to better educate himself plus the educational opportunities offered by the United States Air Force have led to his receiving an academic degree from Drury College, Springfield, Missouri.

T/Sgt. Arthur Gurley, Jr. of the 3772nd Instructor Squadron, 3750th Technical School at Sheppard, recently completed requirements for a B.S. degree in history with a minor in education. He accomplished this through offduty study and with the aid of the A i r Force Operation Bootstrap Program.

Sergeant Gurley began his military career with the Army in 1945 and served until 1947. Upon his discharge he began attending classes at Alabama A&M College Normal, Ala. Having completed 85 credit hours there, the sergeant entered the Air Force in 1951.

The sergeant's tours of duty with the Air Force included assignments at Maxwell AFB, Mon-

tgomery, Ala. in 1951; the Eighth A i r Force, Suwon, Korea from 1952-1953, the 791st Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron from 1953 to1955, the 6049th Support Group, Hauna, Japan from 1955 to 1958, the 305th Bomber Wing, Bunker Hill AFB, India; and the Aleutian Islands from 1960 to 1961.

It was while stationed at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri from 1962 to 1965 as an Air Force Personnel Instructor a n d later liaison sergeant for the fourth Training Battalian there, that Sergeant Gurley began attending classes again, this time at Drury College during his off-duty time.

By January 1966, he had satisfied the Operation Bootstrap requirements for TDY assignment to Drury to obtain the last 15 credit hours necessary for his degree.

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

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
