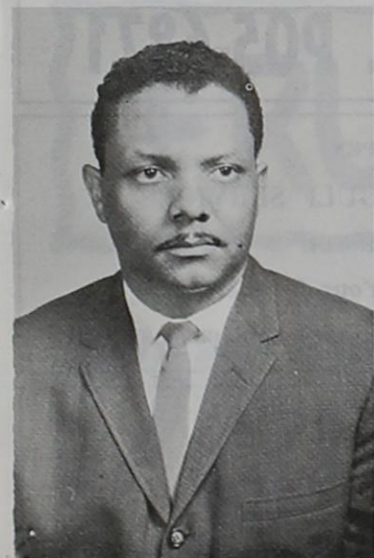

Dear Editor:

Last week, the Manhattan Heights Times carried an article entitled "Negroes Disagree". It seems that the disagreement was the outcome of a television program, "Inquiry".

One of our leaders, Dr. J. A. Chatman, was assailed, and in my opinion, was falsely accused. I listened with interest to Dr. Chatman that Sunday afternoon, and I heartily agreed with him. When the Israelites were freed from bondage in Egypt, they wandered in the wilderness forty years, when the journey from Egypt to the promise land was a very short distance why were they delayed? They were not ready for the entrance. They needed schooling. I feel that the statements made by Dr. Chatman were his honest opinion of the problems we face as a race, and I don't feel that he was trying to satisfy anyone, other than himself.

I believe Dr. J. A. Chatman has as much race pride as the average Negro citizen anywhere. Constructive criticism is helpful, and useful, but there is a vast difference between criticism and mud slinging. If criticism is necessary, let's be fair and honest, and don't do it at the expense of harm and false accusations. If the leadership in our community needs a blood transfusion, let's do it in the spirit of brotherly love. I feel that the discussion at hand is concrete proof that we "ARE NOT READY". If we as a race cannot agree, how can we expect any heterogeneous group to do it

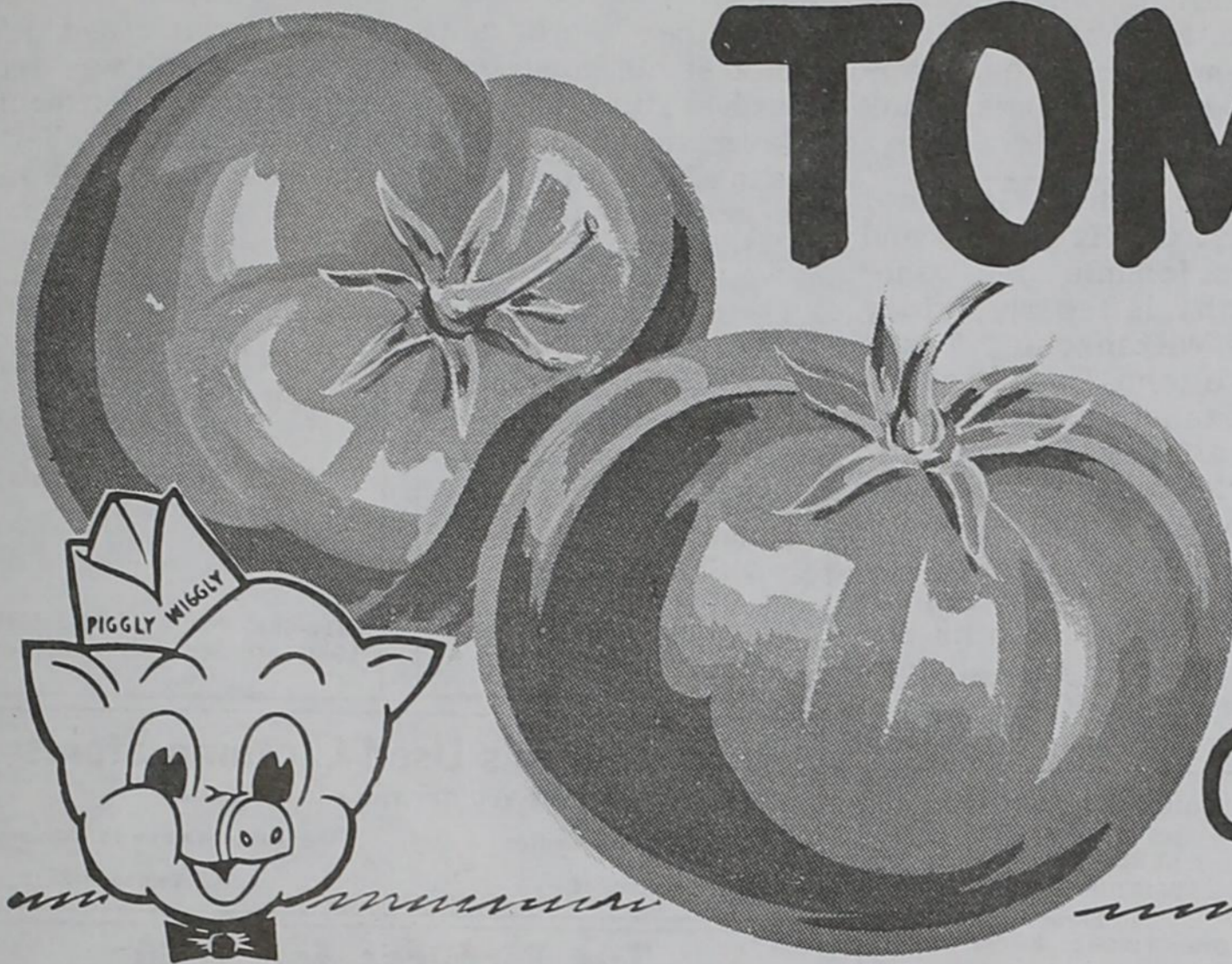
