This article, with the primary purpose of informing the citizens of Lubbock about an 'unincoporated villiage', should have instilled in the minds of people what type of communities exist and brew here.

The Urban Renewal operation was successful, but it appears as though the infant has expired. It's quite obvious that this infant will never survive for more reasons than one...

Before the surgeons of realtors brought this operation, Urban Renewal, to the poople of EAST LUBBOCK many hours were spent in order to make the complications unseen. In the planning state some of you were enlightened to the "Operation Clean-Up", but you failed as able bodied citizens to look into the matter. Perhaps the reason was because of the complete trust placed in the people representing you or maybe you were disinterested in the whole matter.

The final plans included your confirmation in the polls when you gave the "OK" for this big operation. It's the "Darn Truth" a baby was born to each of us---which was good---but being able to care for it is another factor and it's the "Darn Truth" we can't afford it.

Urban Renewal as an idea was good (and it has cleaned-up the slums existing in our city, namely; Queen City, Steen City, and their little sisters), but by the same token it has made life difficult for the majority.

Because of this majority, an 'unincoporated villiage' is existing only a few minutes beyond our city limits and unless it's stopped it can and I'm sure, will brow into another "Queen City"

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

It's not fair for the street to be blocked by a private business concern. Perhaps this is putting it rather bluntly, yet this is the situation existing on East 28th Street, between Elm and Date. The blockade resulted from the hull fire which occurred several weeks ago when heavy damage occurred to the hull house of the Coop Oil Mill. It appears as though the mill is using the area north of its half demolished house as a depot for lodging the remains of the hulls.

This area which is used by the mill is of an advantage to the company but it is serving as a disadvantage for the community. There is always the possibility fo the need to use this street in an emergency, but it would be just as impossible because of the barrers placed on both ends of the block perhaps through the authority of the mill.

It isn't fair for tax payers to suffer because a company finds it an advantage for them to use the PUBLIC STREETS for lodging their goods thus creating an unhealthy traffic situation for the public. It's just not fair.

It's like a dream come true to see the E. C. Struggs Junior High School as you pass the Mae Simmons Park. It makes one sleep better and work harder to know that no longer are all the high school children in east Lubbock housed in one building.
