LINCOLN HIGH Albert Lewis, science teacher at Lincoln High School, has been advised of his selection by the National Science Foundation to attend a summer institute for high school biology teachers this summer at Texas Tech.

The selection for attendance at the institute includes a stipend of \$675, plus subsistence allowance of \$270 dependencies.

The summer institute for biology teachers at Texas Tech is made possible by a grant from the National Science Foundation. It will continue for a nine weeks term from June 5 to Aug. 6.

The team consists of ten boys (14 to 20 years of age) and this is called the AA Division. The Southwest Region is composed of six states.

The team members who topped all other performances in the region were as follows: Howard Johns, 15; Charles oCleman and James Skief, 14, and James Davis and Jimmy, 16. Edward Lester, Ollie Hill, and Oscar D. Jones, 18, and James R. McCormick, 19. The total team score was 163 pull-ups. James McCormick has led all club divisions for three years.

NEGROES DISAGREE Complacency and Indifference Shattered

For so long people in Lubbock have done one of two things: Said nothing or mumbled to themselves about statements made by their leaders which they disagreed with, but that disagreement met its climax when it was shattered on television last Sunday afternoon. An overwhelming majority of the Negro population was not in accord with the special television program, "Inquiry." This program, designed to weigh the Negro in general as to whether or not he was ready for integration. . . .

Dr. Chatman, a prominent doctor, didn't feel as though the Negro was ready for integration, and on the other hand, some of the whites were in the same classification. He didn't think that a Negro doctor was as qualified as a white doctor or that a Negro school teacher was as qualified as a white teacher.

A great percentage of the Negroes, especially those who witnessed the program, feel as though he, Dr. Chatman, was merely trying to discriminate the Negro. They have the conception that this specific program will open the eyes to the people, exactly what type of leadership the Negro in Lubbock has, or on the other hand will we continue to say what the man downtown wants us to say. . . . Is this not a desirable trait in a Negro leader?

For so long the community has been in accord with "traditional leadership." This type of leadership has become too tedious to the community, and with the irritation of this sore for many years it has come to a head. Why is it that the people under 50, especially those in the twenties and thirties, are so complacent and indifferent, and not assuming the responsibility and planning for the future? Why do they let individuals a half a century or more plan exactly how they will live in the years to come? This type of planning is not in keeping with the modern trend. . . . Young people must not be a Rip Van Winkle—he slept for twenty long years.

In the change being made nowadays there is a need for the young people. One Negro states, "Our community is like the old quotation,

'everybody talks about the weather, but no one does anything about', this type of action must cease."

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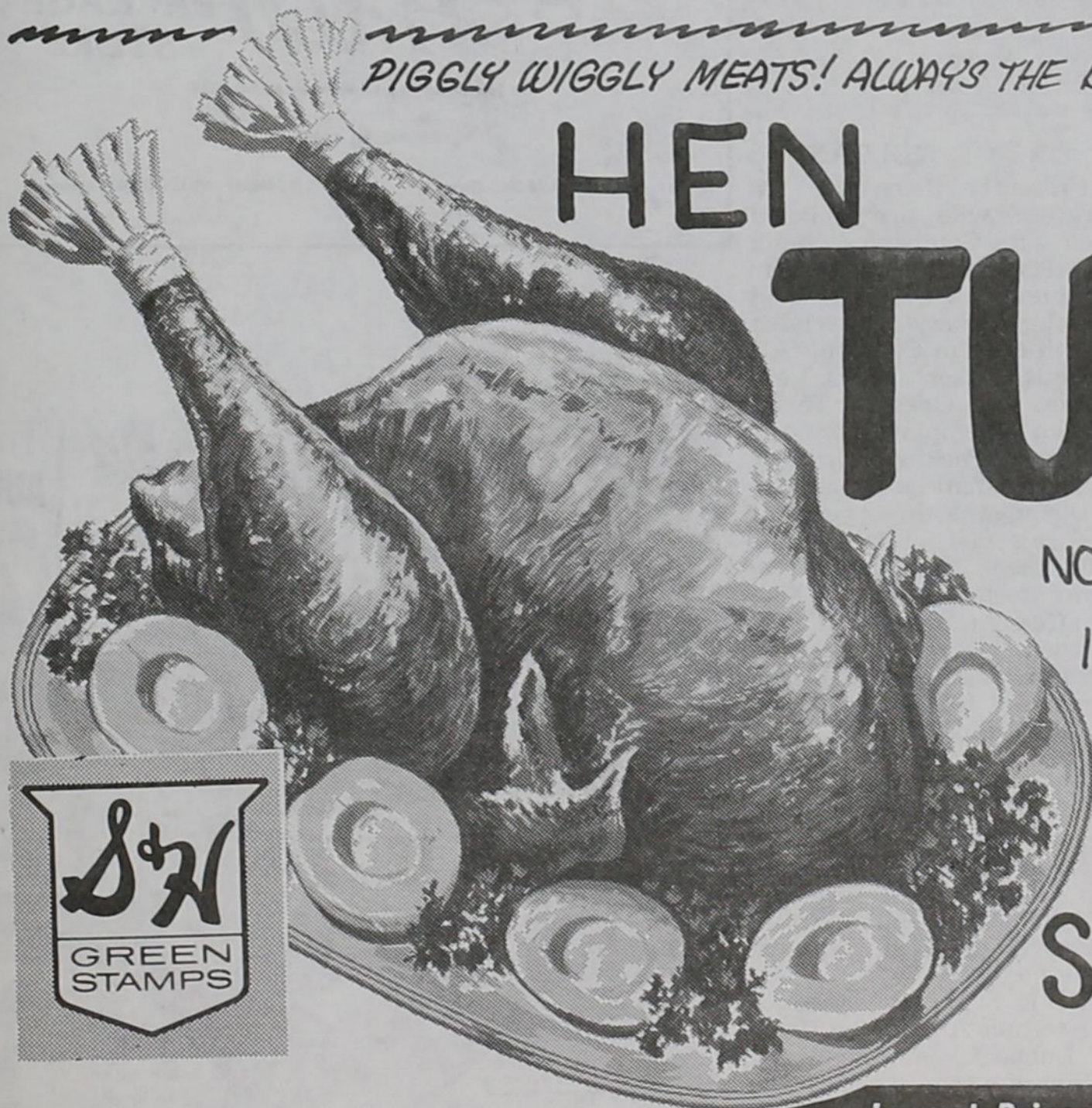

Within the past several months, rumors within the community have persisted that homes were being broken in to.

Some women were molested, and attempts to molest were made on others. During the past week, I talked with several of the victims who were more fortunate than others.

It appears that the same person is probably responsible for all of the incidents, because the method of entry was repeated. The person responsible was also undoubtable living within the area in which the incidents have occurred and

knew that only women & children were home at the time of his act.

The questions that now arise are;

1. How many of these incidents were reported to the police?

2. If they have been reported, what corrective measures have been taken?

3. If they haven't been reported, how can we expect closer police surveillance?

4. How many incidents of this nature have been going on without the awareness of the citizens within the community or the police?

It is obvious that a crackdown is necessary.

It is also necessary that all citizens be informed so that adequate protection and precautions can be put into operation. Check all win-

dows and doors. Never go to bed for the night with the doors open, no matter how hot the weather, because we are living in an urban society and all sorts of personalities are around and among us. By all means, report all incidents of any nature to the police, they will not reveal your name if you so desire.
