

The editor of the Jackson Advocate in the city of Jackson, Miss., Percy Greene, a Negro with leadership qualities, has written a thoughtful piece to all members of the Negro race that we feel deserves reprinting herewith;

'From up in Chicago where the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is holding its annual convention this week comes word that Roy Wilkins, the NAACP Executive Secretary who seldom impresses us with political finesse or diplomatic polish in his statements, has threatened Senators Goldwater, Dirksen and Russell, three of the most powerful members of the United states Senate and



THREE CHANGES SET FOR CONSTITUTION IN TEXAS

Not only will Texans be voting for national, state, and county officials, but they will find themselves voting on 3 changes in the state constitution. The ballot will read "For" or "Against' the propositions, which could be the 156, 157, and 158th amendments to the consittution, originally drawn up in 1876.

The voting of the 3 changes has not yet caused any type of discussion vor has anyone apparently become disturbed.

The order of the amendments would be on the ballot so:

1. Remove the Legislatures' authority to transfer up to one per cent of the permanent school fund annually to the available school fund.

2. Require notice to the public and to the



Pulpit GOODBYE, MR. NIGGER"

'THE MILITANT NEGRO AMERICAN HAS PROJECTED BEFORE HIM THE GREAT DREAM OF AN AMERICAN SO-CIETY IN WHICH THE 'NIGGER' IS NO MORE," so states Gene W. Marshall, faculty member of Chicago's Ecumenical institute, in a prophetic and terse article in an institute Newsletter of recent issue.

AMEN! And may the Lord be praised for such a direct hit upon this outdated, outmoded, disgustingly vile word. We were not content to be called "nigger" by white supremacists, plantation owners "nigger." Apologetically, we've often added a title and said, Mr. Nigger." This made

Just as the white man is guilty of "demonic" prefudice, so is the Negro guilty of "Negro sickness," to the end that all too many of us have smiled Uncle-Tomishly when either we are called "nigger" or when we stand by and hear the vile word flagrantly used, or we draw our fists or knives to start the Civil war all over again.

As Marshall further explains in his article, "the most militant Negro leader carries within himself the scars of 'nigger' brain-washing." Our use of the word is further evidence of the effect of the Negro sickness. Tragically, we hold a "nigger" image of ourselves in mind and set out to be the justification for the title. We clown; we act the fool; we use vile language wherever and whenever we

feel like it; verily, we act the role. We? Maybe not you, dear reader, but when even a few of us act so, we - all of us are branded as "Niggers."

This problem, like the problem of integration is more than a social, economic, or moral problem. You may say it is a religious problem. It is deeper than religion, for it is a problem of LIFE it-

Sooner or later the white man is going to have to accept the fact that the black man was also "created in the image of God." Sooner--and not too much later, let us hope--the Negro is going to have to believe that he too was "created in the image of God," and act like it. The Negroes' true image is of God and it is this image that has been superimposed with the white man's "nigger" image concept.

Herein is the altar to which we call the people of the church, both clergy and laity - to the Altar of HUMAN DIGNITY. With all our churches and with all our preaching, we have not been able to break the veneer of the imposed image of the white man to the end that the Negro would his true image, straighten his shoulders, raise his head and walk and act with dignity.

What kind of "gospel" have we been preaching? The preacher too has been guilty of the "nigger" sickness and has not seen himself as "God's servant in God's image.'
