STUDY OF URBAN ILLS HAS NOTED WITNESSES

A senate subcommittee announced last week it would question a number of nationally known leaders on ways to solve the problems of America's cities. The three-week hearings opened last month.

Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., subcommittee chairman, said the witnesses will be asked "How to involve all the great resources of our country—the brains, talents and money of private industry, labor, universities, foundations, civic leaders, and all levels of government—in building the future of urban America."

Hearings by his Senate Govern-

ment Operations subcommittee last summer, Ribicoff said, showed that "problems of rebuilding urban America are not going to be solved by government alone".

Among the 50 witnesses Senator Ribicoff said have agreed to testify are Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., executive director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference; Roy Wilkins, executive director for the National Associa-

tion for the Advancement of Colored People; David Rockefeller, president of the Chase Manhattan Bank.

Others included, Walter Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers Union; McGeorge Bundy, president of the Ford Foundation; A. Philip Randolph, president of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters; Anthony Dechant, president of the National Farmers Union; Floyd McKissick, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality; and author Budd Schulberg.

Dec. 1, 1869 First National Negro Labor convention, Washington, D.C.

Dec. 2, 1492 Columbus discovered the Caribbean Island of Haiti.

Dec. 2, 1859 Famed abolitionist John Brown and his Negro co-conspirators—Shields Green, Dangerfield Newby, Sherrad Lewis Leary and John A. Copeland—martyred. Osborn P. Anderson (A Voice from Harper's Ferry) escaped to later serve with distinction in the Civil War. Brown and his followers were hanged for the raid at Harper's Ferry.

Dec. 2, 1891 Dr. Charles H. Wesley, former president, Central State College, Wilberforce, Ohio and now director, Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, was born.

Dec. 3, 1948 The Rev. Silas A. Peeler, former president, Bennett College and Methodist minister, died.

Dec. 4, 1833 First convention of the National Anti-Slavery Society held in Philadelphia.

Dec. 5, 1955 The first mass meeting, out of which was born the Montgomery, Ala., boycott movement, was held.

Livingston, Zambia--NPI--The first two Zambian citizens to complete pilot flying training and to fully qualify as service pilots, were awarded their "wings" at ceremonies conducted at the Livingston Air Force base recently by Vice President Reuben Kamanga. The first flyers are Flying Officers D.C. Arenson, 23, and C.J. Kabwe, 25, who began their training on government scholarships in September, 1964.

Nairobi--NPI--Opposition parties to the ruling Kenya African National Union Party of President Jomo Kenyatta are finding it difficult to spread their appeals for support around Kenya. Under an edict issued by the government, public meetings of opposition groups are banned, and about the only place they can make a political speech is at a funeral.

ANOTHER WAY

Panama City--NPI--In a few months, an engineering survey to find a new link between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans is to begin the first step to replace the 50-year old Panama Canal. The survey, dictated by the need to provide better canal facilities, will attempt to discover which of four routes is the best: the present canal, a 60-mile route between Caledonia and San Miguel bays, Eastern Panama; a 102-mile route through the northern neck off Colombia; or a deferred Nicaragua-Costa Rica routing.

NEW LAND

San Diego--NPI--The dream of creating a new land 110 miles west of San Diego in the Pacific Ocean, seems to be becoming a reality after all. A group of developers, who have been working toward this end since 1959, have gone so far as to select a mane for their homebuilt island, Taluga—which will be built with rock and topsoil transported from Mexico, at a cost of \$8.8 million.

FARTHER AWAY

Johannesburg--NPI--The recent victory by an extreme right-wing group in winning control of the politically powerful white mine workers union has widened the gulf between white and black mine workers. The white mine workers' had been feuding for the past two years with former leaders over an experiment, since abandoned, to give African mineworkers more responsible jobs in coal mines.

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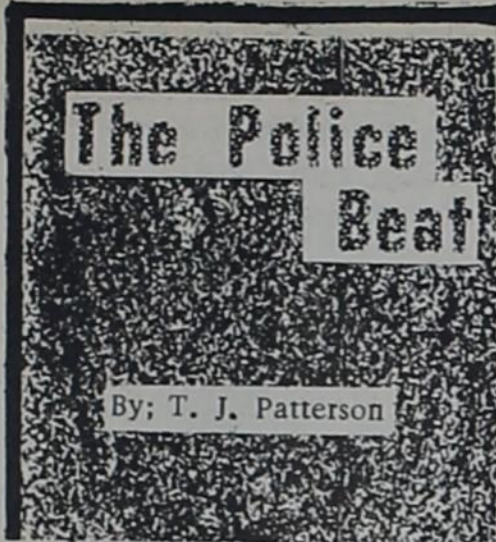
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AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

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Area Teacher Runnerup In "Teacher of Year" Contest

Despite all of the adverse civil rights news breaking throughout the nation, a refreshingly different story comes to us from Levelland. The inspiring story comes from Miss Clarice Everett, a Levelland school teacher, who recently won



runnerup honors in the Texas Teacher of the Year contest.

Miss Everett has taught in the city of Levelland for the past 14 years. She formerly taught the fourth and fifth grades and homemaking at the Carver school, but last spring when a special reading program was launched there, she was asked to work in it. In her own words, she "loves her new assignment."

She has conquered much adversity in getting an education herself. According to Miss Everett, she can recall going through the seventh grade three times.

On the contrary, the experiences she encountered while on this level of education was worth repeating, besides Miss Everett was not a poor student. Here is how it happened:

She was born five miles east of Sherman in Grayson County and attended a rural elementary school approximately two miles from her home.

She attempted to enter Fred Douglas high school at Sherman for the eighth grade but it was the school's policy to place students coming from rural schools in a grade below the current grade. She was relegated to the seventh grade. And too, because that grade was offered in the rural school she attended, and besides all of this, she had to pay tuition.

That was trouble. Her parents could not pay the tuition. So, she had to go back to the country school and go through the seventh grade again.

The next fall when she went back to the Sherman high school, she was placed back in the seventh grade again.

After the horrifying-to-her experience of getting past the seventh grade, her high school career was rather pleasant and good teachers there took interest, encouraged and helped her. She finished second in her high school graduating class, scholastically.

Her college education was done a little at a time until she reached her goal of a college degree. She received a bachelor of science degree from Prairie View A&M

College in 1950. During the summer of 1964, she completed graduate work at Eastern New Mexico University, Portales, and a master's degree was conferred on her there in 1964.

Miss Everett comes from a large family. She had seven brothers and six sisters. Hers was a happy family, though, and a close one. She is proud of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lake Everett of Sherman.

She is very active in civic projects and works there. Miss Everett has worked with cancer and heart fund drives and contributes her share to the United Fund each year. She has been a member of the Community Concert Association for the past two years. She has served on many work

committees for the Carver P.T.A. Aside from these organizations, she is a member of the Methodist Church and several teaching associations. She now has a new home there for which she planned the decor and did most of the interior decorations. She works faithfully getting a yard started.

Here, briefly, is how Miss Everett philosophizes about her teaching: "A TEACHER PAINTS" "My classroom is my studio. My students are my models. My students' minds are the canvas. My books are the paints. My enthusiastic aspiration for my pupils is the palette. My teaching materials, the brushes. And I, the artist who paints. A stroke here, a touch there, as I guide them along with love and understanding. Slowly I bring into form a thing of beauty, a human masterpiece. A work of art--My students!"

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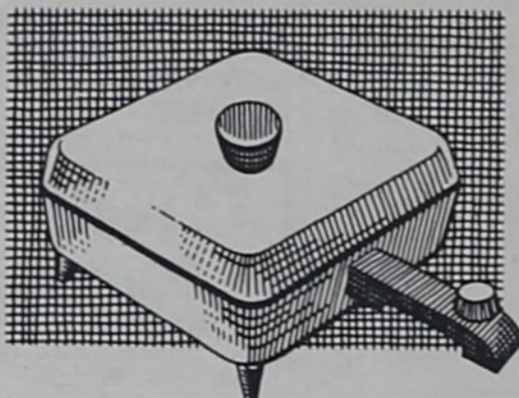
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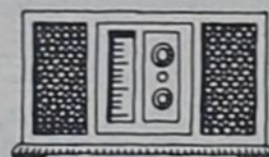

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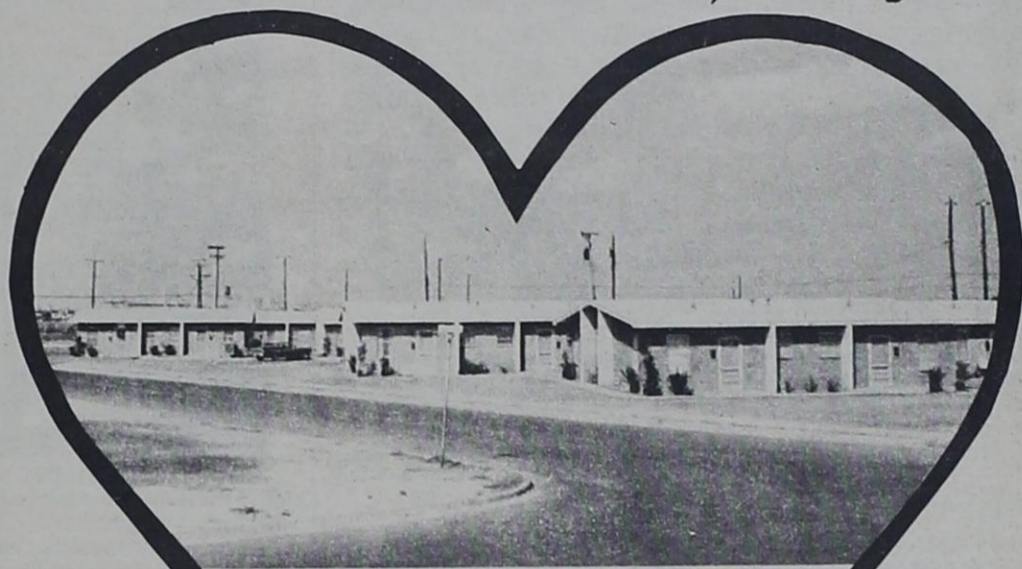
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SEPIA CONTEST WINNERS AWAIT TRIPS TO PARIS, FRANCE

"Safety Sunday" Set By Governor

Austin--Gov. John Connally issued a proclamation last Saturday designating Sunday, December 11th as "Safety Sunday" in Texas.

Connally noted that 3,028 persons were killed and 186,062 were injured in traffic accidents in Texas last year "despite an intensive and continuing campaign by both official state agencies and citizen-support groups."

"Safety Sunday" is sponsored by the Texas Safety Association. The idea is "to focus public attention on the moral obligations and responsibilities of vehicle drivers to protect their own lives and the lives of others."

Bishop College News

Bishop College is to receive a share of a general distribution of \$500,000 from the United Negro College Fund, it was announced last week by Dr. Stephen J. Wright, President of the UNCF. The half-million is to be allotted to the 33 southern colleges and universities which comprise the organization, with Bishop to receive approximately \$13,000.

The money will be used by the Fund's member institutions to bolster scholarship aid to more

than 16,000 needy students, improve faculties and build library holdings. Additional funds derived from the 1966 appeal, which has a goal of \$5,174,000, will be distributed in January. Thus far this year, the organization has disbursed a total of \$900,000 in contributed funds.

Contributions to the Fund's annual campaign are divided among the member institutions according to a formula agreed upon by the member colleges. One-half is divided equally, and the remainder is distributed on the basis of enrollment and financial status of each of the schools.

The predominantly Negro colleges and universities served by the United Negro College Fund enroll nearly 33,000 students

without regard to race, creed or color.

The \$900,000 distributed this year was derived from contributions to the 1966 drive, and \$3 million from payments of pledges to a one year development fund campaign launched by the late President Kennedy in 1963.

During the past two decades, the United Negro College Fund has received more than \$95 million.

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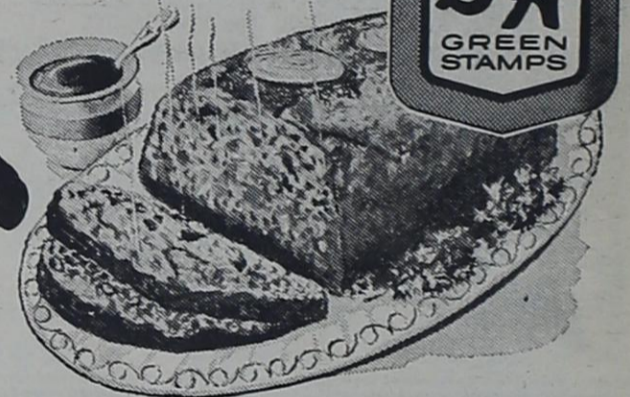
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
