LUBBOCK'S BURRELL IN LINEUP

TEXAS DEMO 'PULLS' FOR TOWER

Austin--Charles W. Alcorn of Houston, who says the supported Govs. John Connally and Alan Shivers "and other conservative democrats," has been named Harris County Chairman for the re-election of Republican Sen. John Tower.

Alcorn said Tower had taken "a very strong Texas position" on

every issue involving the state in Washington.

"Sen. Tower has accomplished things for Texas that no other member of the Texas Congressional Delegation can do," Alcorn said. "He rounded up support for the depletion allowance that otherwise would not have been available for the best interest of Texans."

Highway Death Toll Up 11 Per Cent

Austin--The highway death toll in Texas stayed 11 per cent ahead of last year's pace with a total of 1,470 persons killed through noon last Friday, the Department of Public Safety said.

At this point in 1965, a total of 1,325 persons had been killed in wrecks on state highways.

Accidents in which one or more persons were killed so far this year totaled 1,225, up 12 per cent over the total of 1,095 fatal wrecks tallied at this point a year ago.

Los Angeles--(NPI)--An act of vengeance against Negroes sent Ronald Raymond Stephanson, 19, to prison for life in the shotgun slaying of a Negro sailor in Watts.

Trial testimony indicated that Stephanson had been persuaded by his brother to join him on a trip of vengeance to Watts after Stephanson's brother was run off the road by a Negro motorist.

Stephanson, was convicted on charges of first-degree murder in the killing of Mickey L. Garron, 22, who was stationed aboard the USS Chandler.

The victim was standing on the street when he was hit in the head and chest by shotgun pellets fired by Stephanson.

Credit Practices, Higher Prices Make Groceries More Expensive in Poor Areas

Chicago--(NPI)--The Bureau of Labor Statistics is right when it says the poor pay more for groceries because they buy in smaller quantities.

But, as a housewife, I can say from personal experience that groceries cost more in poor areas for two even more obvious reasons: Item for item, they cost more, and credit practices make them even costlier.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics had been quoted in "Women's Talk" of June 15 as saying, "The poor pay more for food than consumers in higher income areas. The reason is not that the poor are charged more but that they tend to buy in smaller quantities, which cost more per unit. They often cannot take advantage of the economy of buying in larger amounts."

I agree with this. Smaller stores, more typically found in poor areas, don't tend to carry large-size packages of merchandise. They simply don't have the room, and besides, smaller items move faster in areas where people are used to buying in small quantities.

But the Bureau overlooked two significant reasons why the poor pay more:

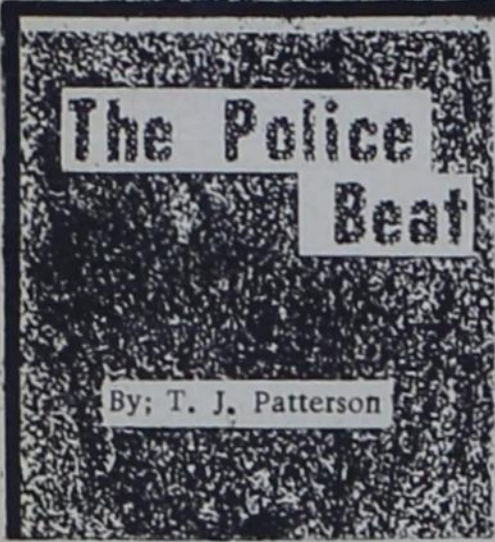
1. Smaller stores charge more per item. They can get by with this because large chain stores are frequently loath to set up shop in poor areas. But when large stores move into lower-income areas, they are little more expensive than chain stores serving more well-to-do areas, I found.

2. Stores in poor areas are given to credit practices, some honest, some not, which tend to add a "hidden" cost to groceries. A customer who tells the storeowner to put his grocery purchases on the bill to be paid at the end of the month may find that his bill comes out several dollars higher than he expected. Many dishonest grocers pay for the cost of credit by adding onto the bill.

Other grocers offset the cost of credit, and the risk involved, by simply keeping prices high.

Even in white areas, small stores are more expensive. But there, they tend to make up for this by offering specialty merchandise. The customer who wants to save money can always go down the street to a chain store, if he wants.

The poor often don't have this option. So on every item, they must pay a "poverty tax."
