NEW MAIL RATES TO START JANUARY 7th

Postmaster General Lawrence O'Brien reminded mail users Monday that new rates going into effect January 7 will increase the cost of sending letters to Canada and Mexico.

The United States has full reciprocity with both these countries so that internal postage in each nation carries mail across the bo-

But the domestic rates in the United States go up January 7 so after that it will cost 6 cents an ounce to send first-class letters to Canada or Mexico. Postcards will be five cents and airmail letters 10 cents.

Mrs. Bonner was a resident of the Hub City for ten years.



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
