

'Around the Hub City'

One of our notables, Dr. Joseph Alvin Chatman, succumbed on last week and this column, "Around The Hub City", had an audience with this personality several weeks before his death.

The discussion was based around the publication of one of his books, "History of Negroes in Medicine from 1886 to 1955."

Dr. Chatman in talking about his literature told of how he came about writing such facts about the Negro in the medical profession. He revealed to this reporter that he was sending a copy of this book to many of his friends throughout the nation, hoping that each would capture in their minds of the tremendous contribution the Negro has made in the field of medicine.

And, too, this book brings out some interesting facts about the Negro physician. One fact which caught me by surprise was the population of Negro physicians in West Texas. Believe me, there is a great demand for the Negro in this field of study.

The death of this physician and civic leader brought echoes of shock throughout the city as well as the state.

As Dr. Chatman strongly believed: "Even the longest journey starts with but one step. There is but a step between me and death."

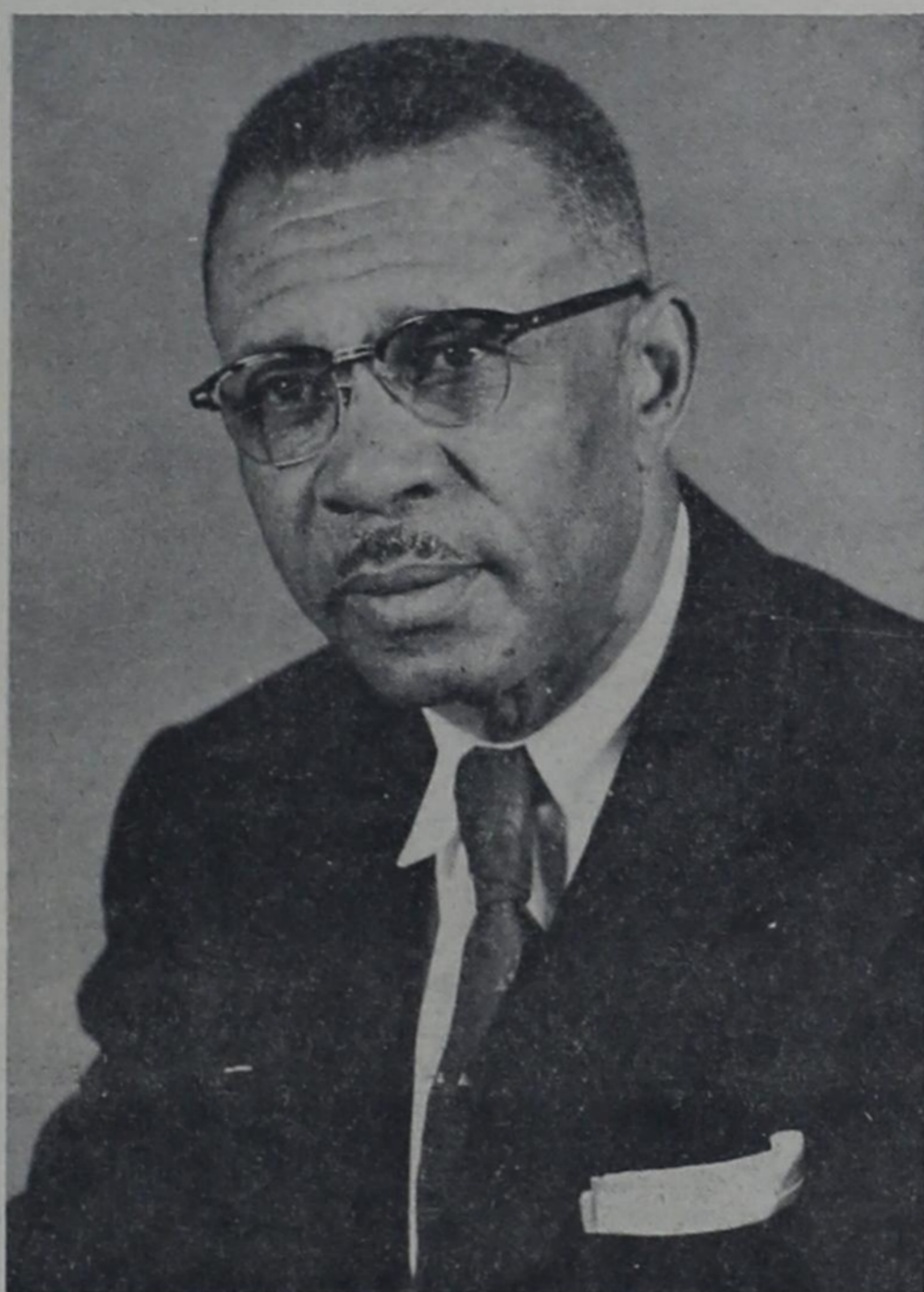
There will be plenty to eat and a good program featuring John Daring and his students of Judo and Karate.

Final Services Read For Long Time Area Resident, Dr. J. A. Chatman



Final rites were read for Dr. Joseph Alvin Chatman, 63, Lubbock physician and civic leader for over 28 years, who occupied positions of importance at both state and national levels, at the First Methodist Church on Monday afternoon, January 16, at 3:00 p.m.

Dr. Chatman expired on last Thursday night in the Highland Hospital, where he was taken by a son about three hours earlier after he was stricken with chest pains at his home at 2308 D-ite Avenue. He became ill after walking the half-block from the 30-bed medical facility, Chatman Hospital-Clinic, which he founded and owned.

The Reverend M. I. Reed, pastor of Mount Vernon Methodist Church, officiated at the rites. Burial was held in the City of Lubbock Cemetery, under the

Austin--Every Texan must register by the 31st of January to be able to vote in any elections during the next year.

There are no exemptions for exceptions.

The new free annual voter registration replaced Texas' old poll tax law for the first time this year. In counties across the state it has brought a tremendous new upsurge in voter strength.

Summer Institutes At Huston-Tillotson

Dr. John T. King, president of Huston-Tillotson College, has announced that the college is one of 16 Texas colleges and universities participating in the National Science Foundation Summer Institutes during 1967. Approximately 40 secondary school teachers of science and mathematics will be selected to participate in the six week program which will be held from July 3 to August 11.

The program is designed for secondary school teachers with limited academic backgrounds in basic and modern subject matter due to inadequate formal training or to the number of years that they have been out of college. The courses are designed to increase the classroom competence of teachers by improving and updating their knowledge of the subjects they teach by placing emphasis upon the underlying principles and their interrelationships. Special attention will be given to current developments in science and mathematics.

Candidates shall be selected, without regard race, creed, or color, solely on the basis of their ability to benefit from the program of the Institute and their capacity to develop as teachers of science and mathematics.

In the larger populated counties of the state, for example, more than 10 times as many voters had registered last week than had paid poll taxes on the same date in 1966. On the other hand, here in Lubbock County, reports had the free registration running behind the figures for paid poll taxes last year.

To be eligible to register as a voter one must be a citizen, 21 or over, a resident of Texas a year and of the county in which they reside six months.

Applications for voter certificates may be made in person with the county assessor-collector or voter registrar at the county court house or at designated substations (this provision is excluded in Lubbock County by the assessor-collector's office) or by mail.

If made in person, a voter certificate is issued at that time. Certificates for those applying by mail will be mailed to the voter.

County officials stress that the mailed applications must be in their hands no later than Jan. 31.

All applications must be signed by the applicant or an authorized person of immediate kin. The husband-wife, mother-father, son-daughter kinships are recognized for this authorized signature but not brother-sister. And the authorized person signing for his wife, mother or son must be an eligible voter, though not necessarily a registered voter.

Former Poll Tax exemptions freed the elderly and the disabled from payment of the tax in order to vote. With free registration, there are no exemptions.

Even those not 21 and those who have not lived here long enough to be eligible for voting now must register before Jan. 31 if they want to vote later in the year.

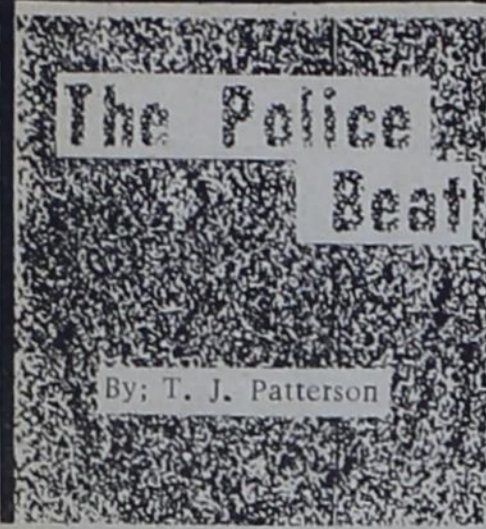
When they register, they will receive a "restricted" certificate that will permit them to vote in any election after they reach 21 or after they have fulfilled the residence requirement.

A suit challenging the annual registration will not be decided for many months. District Judge Herman Jones of Austin ruled against it last week. The case will be appealed.

Dr. Chatman was elected as "Man of the Year", Lubbock, for six consecutive years.

He was Presiding Judge of Pre-

cinct No. 20; author of "History of Negroes of Limestone County" and "History of Negroes in Medicine from 1886 to 1955."

Another significant honor bestowed upon Dr. Chatman was the time he was elected "Mr. Homecoming" for Dunbar High School in Mexia, Texas, October, 1963.

He was also appointed by Gov. John Connally and confirmed by the Senate to the Board of Directors of Texas Southern University, Houston, Texas.

Survivors include his wife, four sons, a granddaughter and a number of nieces and nephews.

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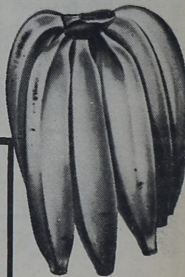
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
