Final Rites For Mrs. Adanandus






WOMAN BEATEN UP







New Postal Rates

Increased international surface and airmail postage rates have been put into effect, according to Lubbock Postmaster Ernest J. Ohnemus.

The increases, which went into effect last Monday, average 13 per cent. They affect postage rates to all countries, except Canada and Mexico, where rates set by Congress, are the same as domestic rates. Postage on mail to megers of the Armed Forces overseas sent through APO's and FPO's also remain at the domestic rates.

Since international mail must be completely prepaid at the point of orgin, any international mail which does not carry post-returned to senders to have the needed additional postage added, said Ohnemus. He urged patrons to consult clerks at post office service windows before mailing any items overseas until they become familiar with the new rate.


