GREED AND CYNICISM

Greedy and cynicism have helped URBAN RENEWAL to become a National Disgrace.

Not only is it a disgrace to the city that accepts it, but it is a NATIONAL DISGRACE. Many individuals support federally-financed urban renewal, knowing that it is unconstitutional and wrong, yet they are so weak-kneed that they support it in spite of this knowledge. How Americans can be persuaded to tolerate such a program, and pay for it with their tax money is hard to understand. We must admit that it took a lot of doing. This was a propaganda bombardment job which required the heaviest artillery. And this is what was used on the public, and with professional thoroughness, too. (A pity they can't use it to convince the Viet Cong).

This was done by a group of powerful, widely respected and, for the most part, very wealthy individuals who support, work through, and control a bewildering network of tax-exempt organizations. The primary sources of revenue for all the organizations are the big tax-exempt foundations, mainly Rockefeller, Carnegie, and Ford, though all are also financed, to some degree, by business firms which profit from the governmental policies which the network fosters.

The controlling center of this network is the Council on Foreign Relations, whose key members hold memberships in related and subsidiary organizations, and occupy influential positions in government, in foundations, in educational institutions, in the communications industry, and in finance.

These individuals form an elite group who set the policies of the federal government; and, through a vast, interlocking combine of educational and opinion-forming agencies, they influence or control the propaganda which persuades Congress and the public to accept these policies.

This is the team which undertook the job of bombarding the nation with enough propaganda to "SELL" Urban Renewal. These men are selfish, looking for personal gain, and our prayer is that "God will give us men, men whom the LUST OF OFFICE does not kill; men whom the SPOILS OF OFFICE cannot buy; men who possess opinions and a will; men who have honor, men who will not die; men who can stand before a demagogue and condemn his treacherous flatteries without winking; Tall men who live above the fog in public duty and in private thinking."

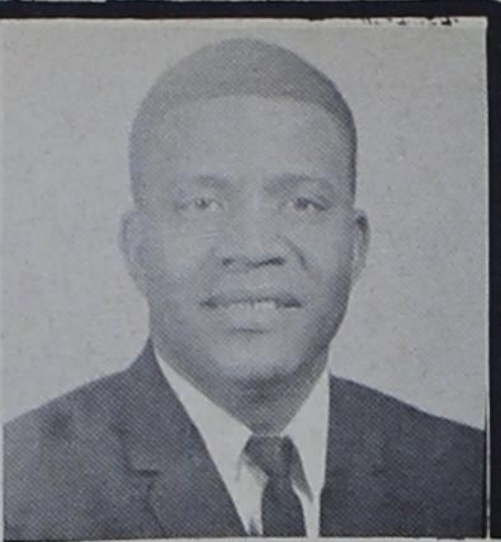
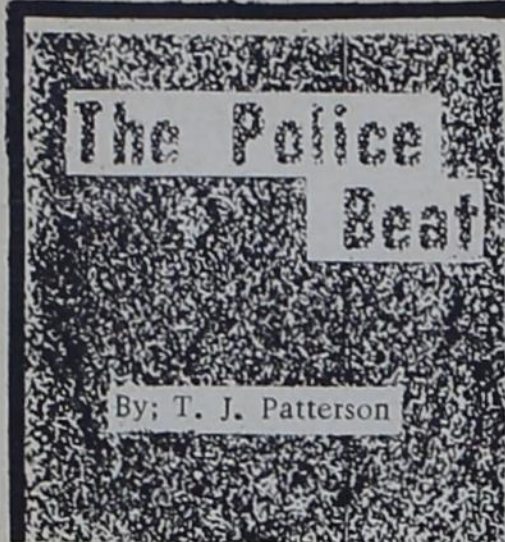
Many people support Urban Renewal because they think there is no way to stop it. Their philosophy seems to be "If you cannot whip them, join them! Oh! We cannot stop urban renewal, so why deny our city its share of federal money? Taxpayers in our city are helping pay for urban renewal in rival cities. Let's get some federal urban renewal money ourselves, so that taxpayers in those cities will have to help pay for something we are getting. This is one way to get some of our tax money back". This is a shame. People who think this way are to be pitied, rather than allowed to govern themselves or others.

Many Americans are resisting Urban Renewal; and, in some communities they have managed to stop it. Their basic technique is simple; they use whatever means they can find to educate others in the real meaning and implications of Urban Renewal. They run newspaper ads and sponsor meetings and broadcasts. And in communities where this kind of educational program is adequately done, the people can stop federally-financed Urban Renewal. It has been proven. In some communities, such educated public interest has forced city governments, before requesting federal Urban Renewal funds, to put the question to voters in a referendum vote. Among the cities where urban renewal has been defeated by referendum vote are El Dorado, Arkansas; Fontana, Fresno, San Bernadion, San Luis Obispo, Soledad, and Stockton, in California; Indianapolis, Indiana; Des Moines, Iowa; Kalamazoo, Michigan; Cape Girardeau, Missouri; even as close as Amarillo and San Antonio, Texas.

These people were smart, they were not so easily led. What about us? Are we as smart as they? Why in some communities, an aroused public interest causes city officials to stop plans for federal urban renewal projects without submitting the issue to voters. In Dallas, for example, public opposition to urban renewal caused the city government to abandon plans for a project, after a federal grant for the initial survey had been already authorized.

On October 5, 1962, United States Representative Bruce Alger (R-

Texas) inserted a thirty-eight page document in the Congressional Record, listing some of the cities where urban renewal has been defeated, and telling how the defeats were accomplished. Yes, dear reader, Federally-financed urban renewal can be defeated! It can be defeated at the local level, by hardworking citizens who care. Do you care for your city? It so, why not shot it? Look around you, what has the urban renewal done for you and your city? Oh yes! they they have built some apartments under the guise of slum clearance and they seem to think that you are dumb enough to believe it when they tell you that this will abolish crime and juvenile delinquency. This is an insult to your intelligence, for how can you eliminate crime by committing a crime? Continued On Page Two

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New Postal Rates

Increased international surface and airmail postage rates have been put into effect, according to Lubbock Postmaster Ernest J. Ohnemus.

The increases, which went into effect last Monday, average 13 per cent. They affect postage rates to all countries, except Canada and Mexico, where rates set by Congress, are the same as domestic rates. Postage on mail to megers of the Armed Forces overseas sent through APO's and FPO's also remain at the domestic rates.

Since international mail must be completely prepaid at the point of origin, any international mail which does not carry post-returned senders to have the needed additional postage added, said Ohnemus. He urged patrons to consult clerks at post office service windows before mailing any items overseas until they become familiar with the new rate.

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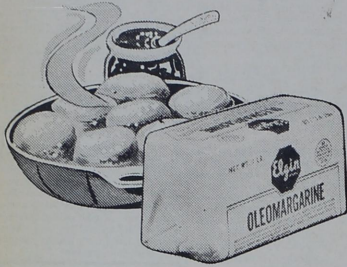
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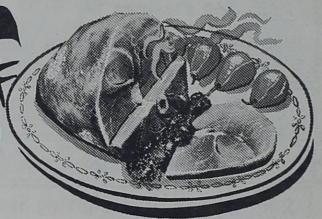
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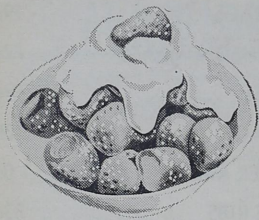
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
