Church Enjoined In Demolition

On last Friday, August 26, Judge James A. Ellis, 137th District Court, conducting a hearing before a capacity crowd, granted a temporary injunction against a contractor and officials of Mt. Vernon Methodist Church. This ruling will restrain them from demolishing the structure which is located at 2306 Cedar Avenue.

Judge Ellis held in abeyance any other action, referring the matter back to the administrative authority of the Methodist Church. He also said that he would withhold a ruling pending a decision by the district church organization.

The injunction was sought against Albert Anderson, Lorenzo contractor, and the pastor, Rev. M. T. Reed, by George Woods and others, enjoining them from tearing down the church or disposing of any church property.

According to Woods and other trustees, an agreement had been made by the Rev. Reed with Anderson for the demolition of the building.

The Manhattan Heights and West Texas Times inquired with both parties involved with the matter, but apparently there were no comments from either side.

Texas Capitol Insurance Is Expanding

Fort Worth--(NPI)--With a catchy slogan "We Pay Your Claims Promptly", the Texas Capitol Life Insurance company is spreading throughout the state, via the process of merging smaller companies. It has already taken over the Knights of Liberty of Dallas.

Texas Capitol is the first Negro owned company in Texas to go on the market for insurance company take-over on so wide and broad a

scale. Organized several years ago, it just recently got approval from the state department as a stipulated premium company.

The firm is the brainchild of Joe A. Terrell, prominent local businessman and popular bail bondsman. He also owns a hotel, motel, and ranch in this area.

BUSING PLANNED

Norwood, Mass.--(NPI)--This wealthy Boston suburb plans to bus 225 Negro children from Boston to its formerly lily-white schools. The number is expected to increase to 2,000 in 1968. Meanwhile, in Boston, the city was losing \$30 million in state aid as it failed to remove racial imbalance to the satisfaction of the state.

Summervacation will come to an end next Tuesday, September 6th, when the school doors will be open once again for the students of the Lubbock Public and Private schools.

Although the teachers, including the new ones, have been working since last Wednesday, will celebrate their first holiday of the year, Labor Day, they will greet an approximately 36,000 pupils the next day for the first day of classes. All elementary pupils will go to the school of their attendance zone to register from 8 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1 to 3 p.m. today, Thursday.

Innovations for the 1966-67 school year include the opening of two new elementary schools, Hunt Elementary and Tubbs Elementary, and the first hike in cafeteria prices in 15 years. Prices jumps are 10 cents more per plate lunch for secondary schools, and five cents increase per plate lunch for elementary schools. A la carte menu hikes a rate proportionately increased, also. Price of visitors' lunches at all schools is 75 cents per plate lunch.

This year's school employment in the 53-schools will include 1,600 teachers.

Slatonite At Ft. Gordon

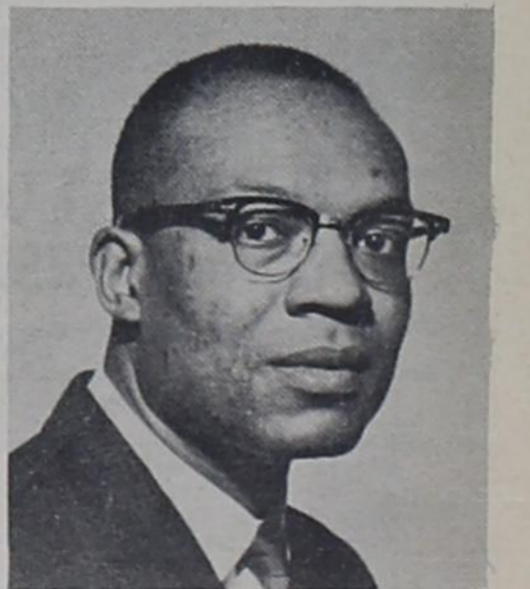
Pvt. Sylvester Robinson has completed his training of commercial art at Fort Gordon, Georgia.

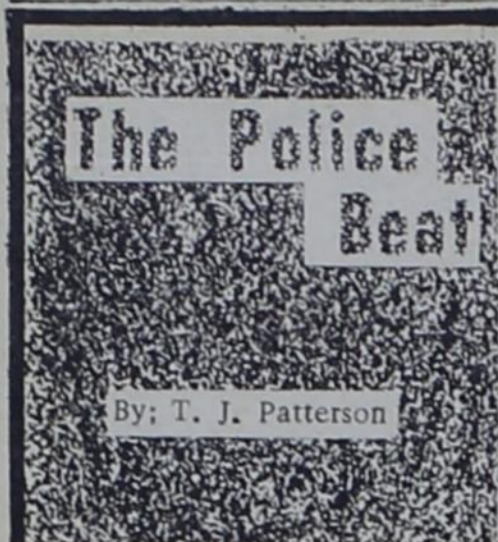
He is a graduate of Dunbar High School, Lubbock, and has attended Lubbock Christian College.

National Baptist Conv. At Dallas

The National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc., the largest and one of the most widely respected Negro organizations in America, will assemble some 15,000 delegates and visitors September 6 through 11 in Dallas, Texas.

Dr. J.H. Jackson, president, will preside over this, the 86th national convocation. He will be assisted by his cabinet of officers and the 90-member board of directors.

Theme of the convention will be "United We Stand." Delegates are expected to bolster their efforts for unity in view of the current civil rights controversy.

Dr. Jackson said reports and addresses "will reflect and emphasize the convention's basic philosophy in first-class citizenship and the philosophy of civil

rights." Delegates will pay tribute to a champion of civil rights, the late President John F. Kennedy, on Saturday, September 10, with a special memorial service for Kennedy at the site of his assassination. The service will be held from 1 to 2 p.m.

The convention will attempt to provide constructive answers to the following questions:

1. Have Negroes turned from religion en masse?
2. Do Negroes appreciate what they are and what they have produced?
3. Are the majority of Negroes anti-American, anti-white?
4. Are they dedicated to understanding and goodwill?

Governor John Connally, Texas, and Mayor Erik Jonsson of Dallas are scheduled to address the convention.

Dr. Jackson will deliver the keynote address on Thursday morning, September 8.

An international figure, Dr. Jackson has been a staunch advocate of civil rights, and of dedication to the principles of law and order. He has emphasized the use of the ballot as one of the most effective forces of all the elements in first-class citizenship.

His philosophy of fellowship between groups is set forth in his recent book, "Many But One," published by Sheed & Ward.

Dr. Jackson is pastor of the Olivet Baptist Church in Chicago.

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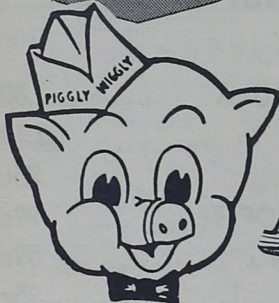
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
