## Negro Newspaper Readers Said To Be Making More Money Than Others

A study of Negro newspaper readers has shown that they have higher incomes than other Negroes and that they spend more time reading Negro newspapers than metropolitan papers.

The study was released by Amalgamated Publishers, Inc., national advertising representatives for Negro-oriented newspapers. The survey, measuring media audiences and product users and their interrelationships, was conducted for API by Data Division, Standard Rates and Data Service, Inc..

It is expected to assist advertisers to appreciate the value a Negro newspaper can have in promoting their products.

Highlights of the study revealed:  
—Twenty-eight percent of the entire Negro market are regular readers of Negro-oriented newspapers.

—Thirty percent of the Negro population—age 18-49—read Negro newspapers.

—Sixty-one per cent of the readers are women.

—Thirty-two percent of all Negroes with incomes over \$5,000 and 40 percent earning more than \$8,000, read Negro newspapers.

—Households reading Negro newspapers have an \$8.5 billion income annually.

## Post Office Notes Parcel Weight Hike

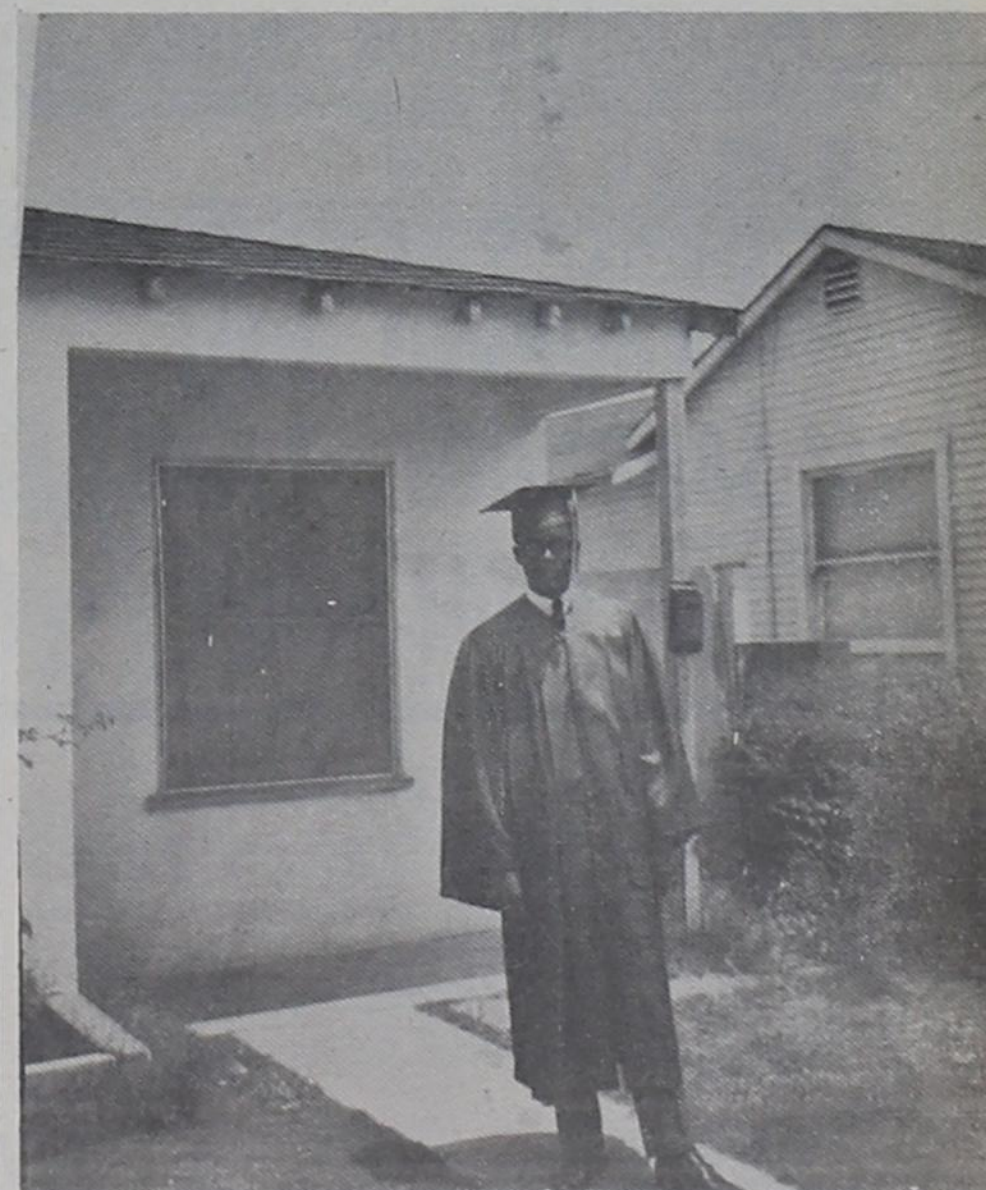
The post office Saturday began accepting parcels weighing 25 pounds for mailing between first class post offices 150 miles or more apart, according to Postmaster Ernest J. Ohnemus. The previous weight limit had been 20 pounds.

The increase is the first of five scheduled to take effect annually until 1971, when a 40-pound, 84 inch maximum size will be authorized between all first class post offices.

Parcels weighing up to 40 pounds can be mailed between first class post offices less than 150 miles apart. Packages addressed to and from second, third and fourth class post offices, Alaska and Hawaii are not affected by the increase in size and weight provisions of the new law which went into effect January 15.

Parcel post mailing limits to and from these offices remain to 70 pounds and 100 inches.

## Graduates At Los Angeles, California



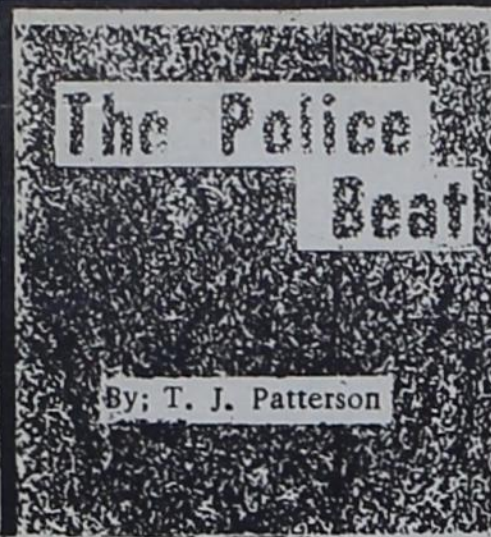
William H. Stewart, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. V. Stewart who are former residents of Lubbock, was a member of the graduating class there in May, 1967.

The new schedule will call for the term to end immediately prior to the Christmas holidays, and the new term to begin immediately after the holidays. Thus, the '67-'68 calendar for Bishop places final examinations for the term to start on December 16th through December 21st, with students permitted to leave for the holidays upon completion of their last examination. The new term will start on January 15, 1968.

Previously, as has been the case with practically all colleges, the fall term has been considered in progress through the Christmas vacation, with students having just one or two more weeks after their return in which to finish the

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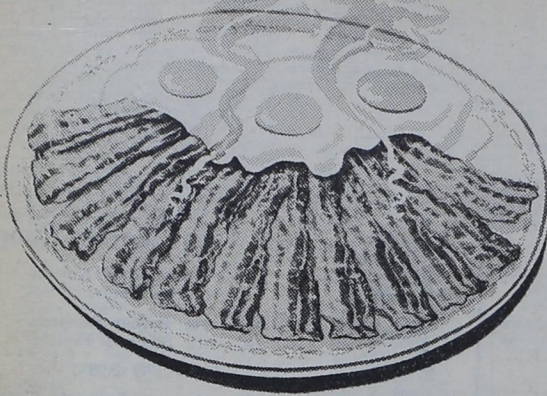
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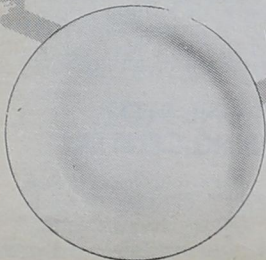
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
