They will be available at special booths at the base banks, officer's club and NCO club.

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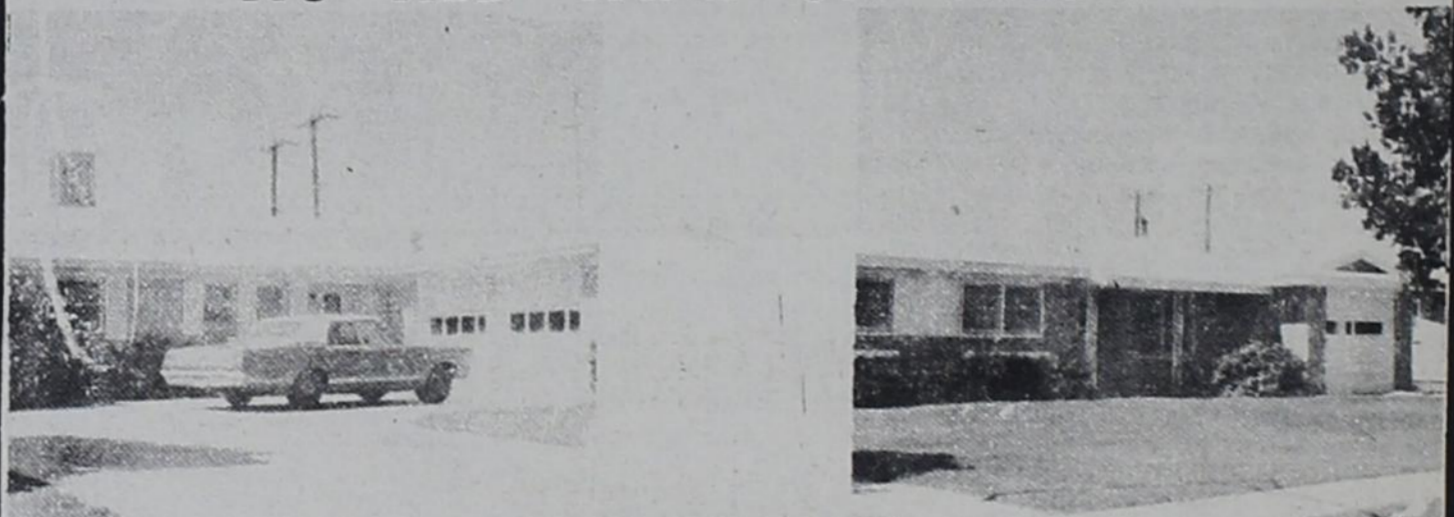

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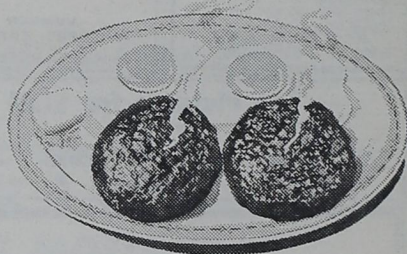
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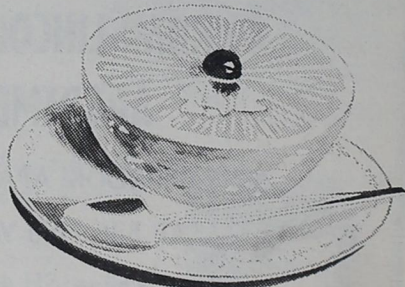
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
