Mrs. Mark is a relative of Mrs. Struggs.

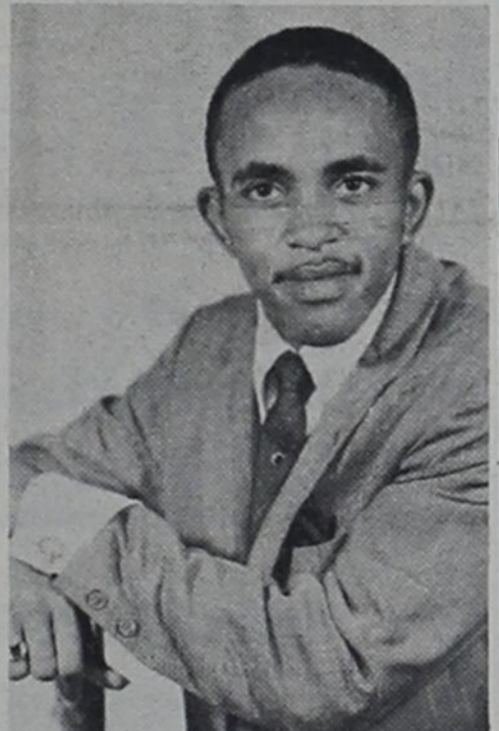
The services were largely attended.

"Hello, my name is Patrick Deon Johnson," seems to be the words for the young Lubbockite.

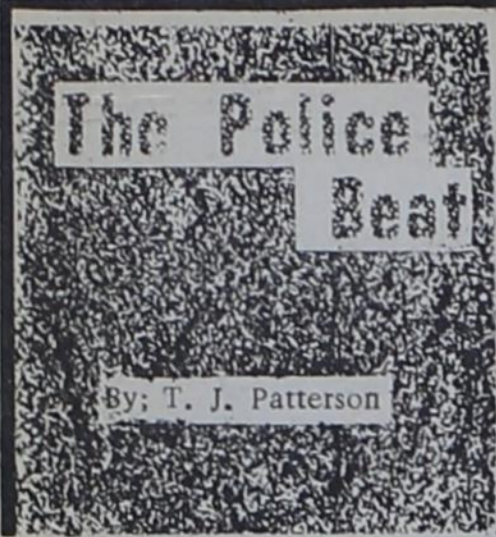

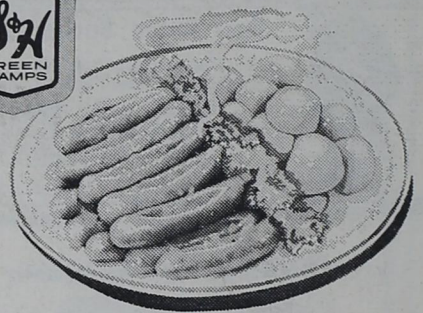
