

Feb. 12, 1926 Negro History Week initiated by Dr. Carter G. Woodson.

Feb. 13, 1760 Richard Allen, founder of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, was born in Maryland.

Feb. 13, 1817 Frederick Douglass, statesmanauthor-abolitionist, was born a slave in Mary-

Feb. 13, 1873 Emmett J. Scott, secretary to Booker T. Washington and one-time secretarytreasurer of Howard University, was born.

Feb. 13, 1874 James T. Carter, lawyer, president and general counsel of Southern Aid Life Insurance Company, and vice president, Consolidated Bank and Trust Company of Richmond, Va., was born in Richmond, Va.

Feb. 14, 1879 Blanche K. Bruce, Negro Senator from Mississippi, presided over U.S. Senate.

Feb. 15, 1851 Shadrach, a fugitive slave, was rescued from a Boston courtroomby abolitionists after a decision to return him to his master had been handed down.

Feb. 15, 1895 George Schuyler, writer-columnist for the Pittsburgh Courier weekly newspaper, was born in Rhode Island.

Feb. 15, 1959 Dr. George W. White, physicianinsurance executive, president, Federal Insurance Company of Washington, D.C., and vice president, Richmond Beneficial Life Insurance Company died in Richmond, Va.

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
