I think this is an excellent idea, and I am sure that the past members of this wonderful organization under the helm of Roy Roberts was a complete surprise when they received their special invite last week.

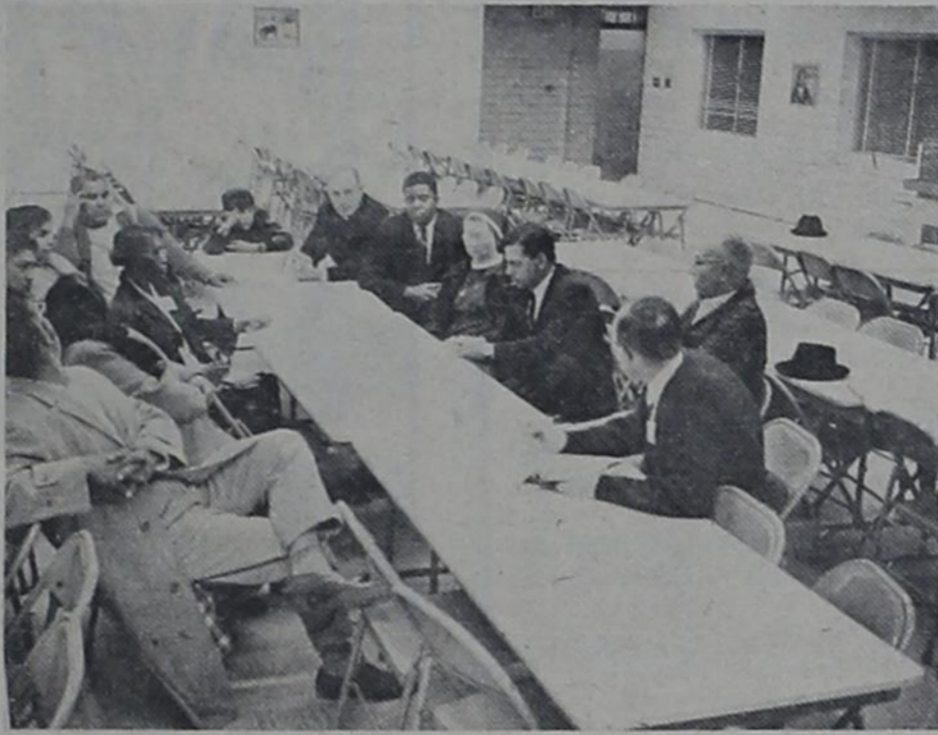

TEXAS TRAFFIC TOLL FORECAST AT 55 FOR HOLIDAY SEASON

Fifty-five persons will die in traffic accidents in Texas over the Christmas week-end, the Department of Public Safety estimated last Saturday.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., department director, said state and local police agencies and private traffic safety organization will work to keep the actual toll below the estimate.

Garrison said the department's Christmas "operation deathwatch" will be in effect from 6 p.m. December 22 to 11:59 p.m. December 25.

"During this period we will make every effort to inform each motorist of the need for attention to safe driving," he said. Every highway patrolman will be on duty as much as possible and about 250 men from other uniformed services of the department will supplement the patrol.

The department also estimated 45 persons will be killed in traffic accidents over the New Year's weekend, with the "death watch" in effect from 6 p.m. December 29 to 11:59 p.m. January 1.

Last year 50 persons were killed in traffic over the Christmas weekend and 39 died over the New Year's weekend.

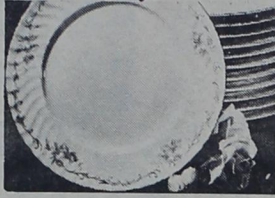

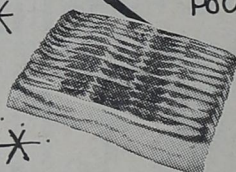
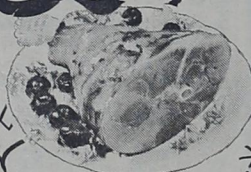
