It was learned this week that Mrs. R.H. Harris is doing nicely after a short illness.

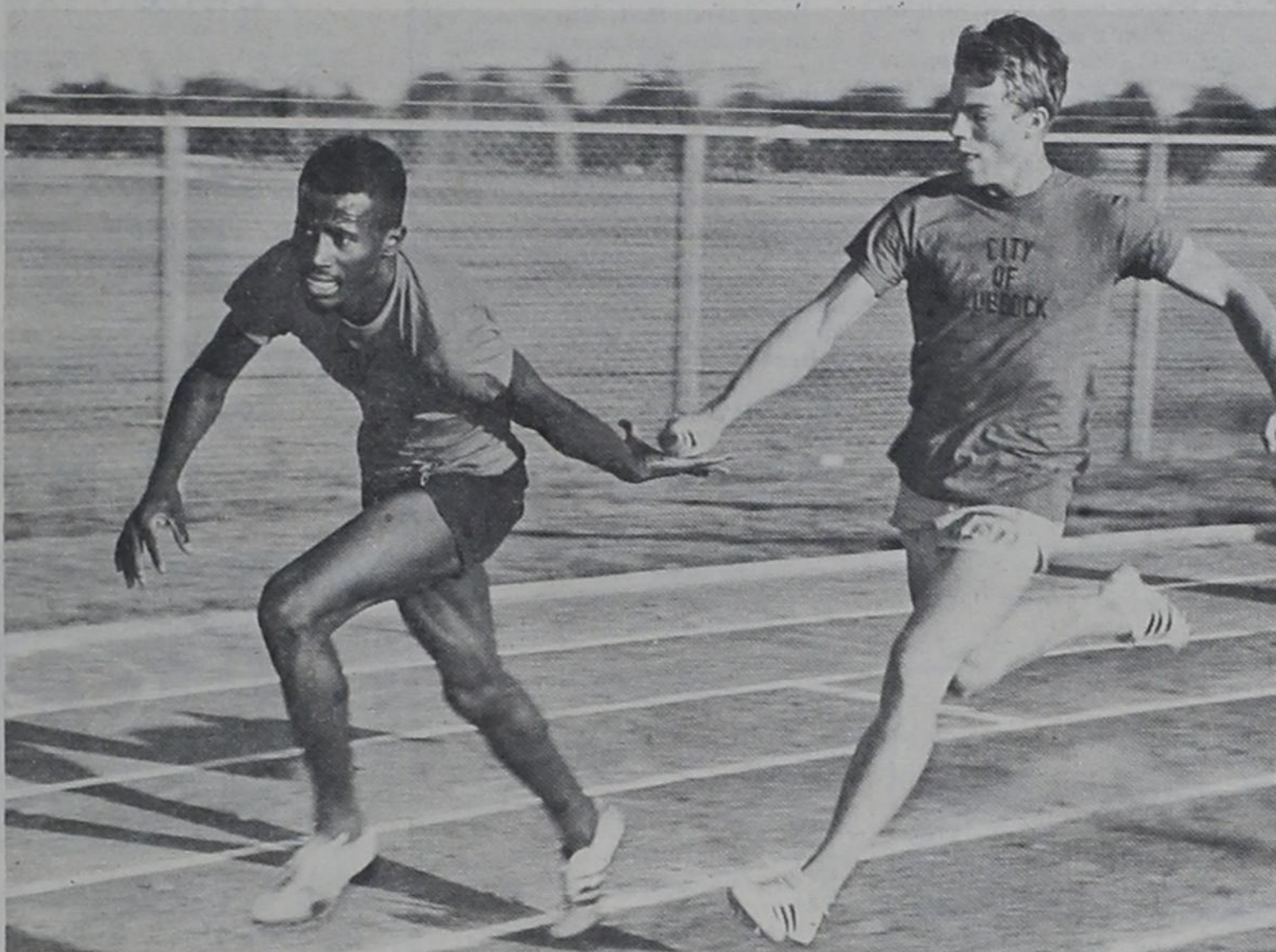
She wishes to thank everyone for their sincere cooperation while she was ill.

News From Bishop College

The first six-week summer session at Bishop College in Dallas, Texas which started on June 5, brought an influx of 533 summer students to the college; the largest summer class in Bishop's history. It exceeds last year's summer class by 99 students.

This refers to the regular summer session. Many more students are expected for various workshops, clinics, and other special classes, including Bishop's "pre-college" course, which will begin on July 26, and at which 300 more students are expected. Other special summer classes at Bishop will include a workshop for in-service and prospective teachers, a clinic for cheerleaders and baton twirlers, and other special summer classes.

The second regular summer session will begin on Monday, July 17, while the regular spring semester is slated for August 31.

Director of Admissions at Bishop, Mr. Tom Brown, said that all indications point to the largest number of applications for matriculation into Bishop for the spring, 1967 semester in the 86 year history of the College.

TEXAS TOURNEY SET HERE NEXT MONTH

Texas Commissioner, Dick Walker, announced last week that Laredo, Arlington, Boerne, Longview and Lubbock Holt's Raiders will lead a list of imposing teams into the 1967 State NBC Texas Championships. Tournament will commence play July 28th and continue until a Texas Champion has been declared.

Texas 1966 State Champions, the Griffin Truck Center Hubbers, will defend their crown and in all 32 teams will vie for the 1967 State crown. District tournaments have been sponsored to qualify teams into the State Tournament. The above named teams have

qualified into tournament play as a result of finishing no lower than fifth place in the 1966 tournament.

Texas Champion will receive \$2,500.00 expenses to attend the National Tournament in Wichita, Kansas starting August 14, 1967.

Charges of murder with malice were filed last Saturday against a 21-year-old Lubbock man in connection with a shooting incident at 16th and Avenue C about 2:45 a.m. Saturday.

According to detectives, the suspect was identified as Billy Ray Johnson, 21, 2409 East 7th

Street, who was arrested shortly after the shooting.

The victim, Henry Neal (Frog) Carter, 23, 606 17th Street, was dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital.

Police revealed that a woman halted a patrol car shortly before 3 a.m. and told an officer that a man had been shot. The victim was found in a vacant lot at 16th and Avenue C. Officers said that he had been shot once in the heart, apparently from close range.

Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy conducted the inquest.

Charges were lodged against Johnson by Asst. Dist. Atty. Blair Cherry, Jr.

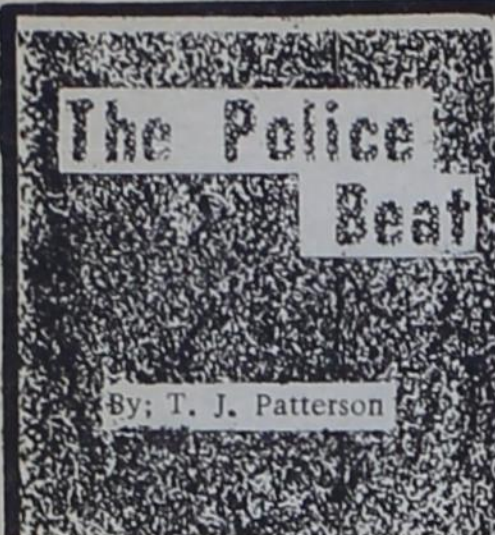

First Offense--The punishment upon conviction for this offense shall be less than a \$50 fine and three (3) days in jail and not more than \$500 fine and two (2) years in jail.
