Reese AFB, Lubbock--Reese A i r Force Base is in immediate need of skilled aircraft maintenance men because of the Vietnam situation, Col. Ernest T. Cragg, wing commander, announced last week.

He pointed out that skilled military men were leaving for other assignments because of the conflict and the civilians "will replace military technicians who have been called to support operations in the war."

The civilians will help maintain T-38 and T-37 aircraft used at Reese in the pilot training pro-

"The aircraft must be kept

available to train pilots, many of whom go to Vietnam soon after graduation from Reese," Colonel Cragg said.

Needed are aircraft instrument and control systems mechanics, radio installers and repairmen, turbine powered systems repairers, j e t engine mechanics, aircraft

The ZIP CODE information phone number is

PO5-8541, ext 304. Local ZIP CODES are listed in t h e business pages of the phone book (Yellow Pages). "Probably the easiest method of getting the ZIP CODES you need is to check the return address on the mail you receive from your correspondents. In most cases the proper ZIP CODE h a s been included. Then you should transcribe the codes into your address book." Postmaster Ohnemus said. "Remember, mail m o v e s the country--ZIP CODE MOVES THE MAIL.'



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

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


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
