WARNING

Livingston, Zambia-NPI-Newly-seated Vice President Simon Kapwepwe issued a warning during a mass rally recently that "Africa is growing stronger and stronger,

and one day black Africa will march onto the Southern racialist countries and sweep away the white minority regimes." He was referring to the minority white-ruled countries of Rhodesia, South Africa, Angola and Mozambique. He added that nationalism "will not cease until black Africa has reached Cape Town."

Senate Passes Poverty Program

BY A VOTE OF 60-21, the largest majority in the history of anti-poverty legislation, the Senate on Thursday approved a two-year extension of the OEO programs.

The legislative action now moves to the House where the Education and Labor Committee has not yet reported its bill out to the floor. Approval of the measure by the Senate also marked the first time that either chamber had authorized a specific amount for more than one year of OEO programs.

The authorization for Federal Fiscal Year 1968 is \$2,258 billion, representing \$198 million more than the Administration had requested. For Fiscal 1969 the figure is \$2.4 billion. The authorization bill must still be followed by an appropriation, which may not exceed the authorization, but can reduce it.

 Rizal, Philippines--NPI--The first annual meeting of the Asian Development Bank, inaugurated in Tokyo in November, 1966, will be held in Manila next April. Initially conceived by the UN Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East (ECAFE), the bank lists 31 countries as members, and has an authorized capital of \$1.1 billion, of which \$965 million has already been subscribed.

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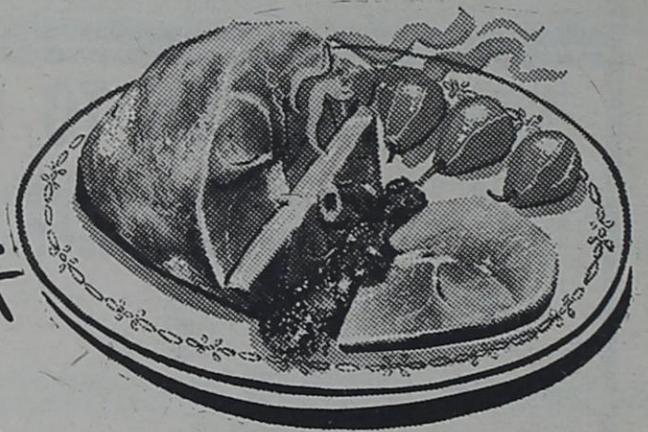
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
