The purpose of this program is to teach adults reading, writing, arithmetic, and other basic sub-It will also include th teaching of the English language, enable disadvantage adults to more effectively meet their home, job, and civic responsibilities, and qualify under-educated adults for employment or for job promotion.

In order to register for these classes you must be 18 years of age or older.

The curriculum will include reading, writing, English, arithmetic and English speaking.

This school is free!! You may register at any of the following schools: Alderson Junior High, Guadalupe Elementary, Ella Iles Elementary, O. L. Slaton Junior, McWhorter Elementary, Wheatley Elementary and Wolffarth Elementary Schools.

99-Year-Old Man Stabbed To Death

Meridian, Miss. --- (NPI)---A man who had dodged disease, old age, hunger and other troubles for 99 years became the victim of a stabbing last week. Jim Bell, 100 years of age, was almost knifed to death.

A 64-year-old woman, Mary Louis Green, has been charged with the death. Another woman, Mary Dean, was also stabbed and Miss Green is charged with that also. The triangle has not been fully explained.

Washington-(NPI)--Two Army sergeants have been arrested on charges of conspiring to deliver national defense information to Russian officials.

They were identified as Sgt. Leonard J. Safford of Chillum, Md., and Sgt. 1-C Ulysses L. Harris, of Neptune, N. J. Both are Negroes.

They were accused of conspiring with Nikolai F. Popov, a first secretary at the Soviet Embassy in Washington, and Anatoloy T. Kireyev, a counselor of the Soviet Mission at the United Nations in New York, both of whom have since left the country.

The Defense Department said Safford had hired a photographer to take pictures of the Army Strategic Communications Command Facility at Rosslyn, Va.

Both sergeants face the possibility of being court-martialed.



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

OEO AND THE RIOTS -- A SUMMARY

IN 32 CITIES IN WHICH there were no riots or civil disorders this summer, most of the mayors and police officials felt that the summer programs of the Office of Economic Opportunity had helped to prevent violence in their communities, a nationwide survey conducted by OEO has revealed. The information was contained in a report, "OEO AND THE RIOTS -- A SUMMARY", made public last week. OEO inspectors talked to mayors, police chiefs, juvenile judges, heads of local Chambers of Commerce, and other leading citizens in the cities, which were selected to represent a broad distribution; geographical, political

Not one police chief or mayor said OEO heightened tensions. In 15 cities, local Community Action Agencies calmed down bad situations in special instances. In 13 cities, special groups were forme d to patrol troubled areas and serve as communication posts between the police and the slum areas. In 14 cities, municipal police departments a n d CAAs had joint programs to prevent riots. In eight cities, the juvenile arrestrate went down this summer and there is good evilonce this was caused by more summer jobs.

The 32 cities that DID have riots were also surveyed and it was learned that of the more than 30,000 CAA employees in these cities --only 16 have been arrested. There was almost \$300,000,000 worth of property damage done in the riot cities, but despite the fact that the poverty program has 244 buildings in the heart of the riot areas, none were burned or destroyed. Total damage to Community Action buildings was \$1,840 for seven sets of broken windows.

Specific examples in the report of how CAAs helped in times of tension included Elizabeth, N.J., under the leade

tension included Elizabeth, N.J., where the CAA, under the leader-Bailey was shot in the left hand ship of the mayor and chief of police set up a group called the "Peace Keepers", composed of anti-poverty workers and community leaders. The Elizabeth City Council in a resolution praising the group, said: "(They) contributed a great and necessary service to the health, welloading weapons can be danger- fare and safety of the entire population of the city."

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

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Bronze News Editor Shot

Fort Worth--(NPI)--Originally given less than a 50-50 chance of surviving after six . 38 slugs had been pumped into his body by an irate grandfather, Freedie Wilson, publisher-editor, Bronze Shopping News, is now recuperating at his home. His near recovery has been so miraculous that he even was permitted to spend a few hours in his office. He lost 60 pounds in

Meanwhile, his assailant, a 61 year-old grandfather of a former BSN employee, was released on a \$5,000 bond. The man is said to have escaped conviction on a murder charge some years ago, and currently has two other assault charges pending against him.

Recounting the incident, Wilson said he was seated at his desk his office late one evening when he heard someone enter the front office. Yelling to the unseen person, "I'm back here," he said, "When I looked up I saw the barrel of a . 38 revolver. '

His assailant told him, "You think you're smart. I'm gonna lay you with this," and started firing as fast as he could.

Six shots entered the publishers! upper bocy, two in the arms ar four in the chest. The man turned and fled the office.

Bleeding profusely, Wilson managed to telephone his wife and have her call an ambulance. At_ the hospital, he said he was given over 75 pints of blood, in a successful effort to save his life. His condition was such that doctors would not attempt to remove the bullets for a few days.
