The project director of the program is Buford Wiley, a former graduate of Dunbar and a student of Paul Quinn College at Waco.

This program will continue through September 2, a period of nine weeks.

Let's hope in the future that these type of constructive programs continue in our city.

RECREATION PROGRAM HERE

Buford Wiley, a graduate of the Paul L. Dunbar High School here and a student at Paul Quinn College at Waco, Texas, was hired last week by the Community Action Board in Lubbock County as project director of a special work-recreation program for young men between the ages of 14 and 20.

The program--which is designed for a nine week period ending September 2--will include work and recreation for the participants.

The work schedule for each

participants will begin each morning at eight lasting until nine a.m.

The Lubbock County Community Action Board was awarded a \$35,305 grant by the Office of Economic Opportunity to conduct this special summer youth program by Congressman George Mahon's office this week.

The program is directed primarily to Negro youth in the community, although it includes Anglo and Latin teenagers.

Aside for Wiley, Elton Conger, also a graduate of Dunbar and a student at Prairie View College, and Lewis Prez are the assistant directors of this project.

The program includes 16 coaches and 12 teachers who are hired for the program.

Youths involved in the program will work one hour per day in city beautification projects, and the remainder of the day will be spent in recreation and instruction. The program last from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

For their one hour of work, youths will be paid \$1.25, according to T.J. Patterson, Assistant Executive Director of CAB.

This type of program will enable the young participants involved to stay off the streets and make a constructive contribution to their community.

Centers for the youth program are at Mae Simmons Park-E.C. Struggs and Guadalupe Park and Mackenzie Park.

This program will include 256 boys.

Door prizes in the amount of \$200 in merchandise, all of which was donated by local merchants.

They departed the 'Hub City' last Saturday.

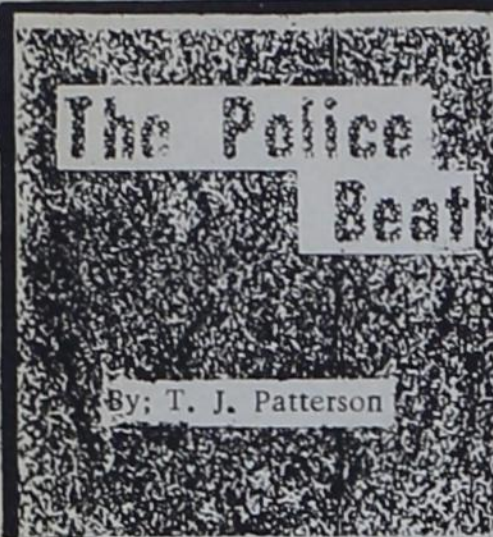
Prior to Jackson's leaving, he spoke to a special group of young men who are participating in a special work recreation program which is sponsored by the Community Action Board.

Once there the police arrested the parties involved and the mishap was quickly handled.

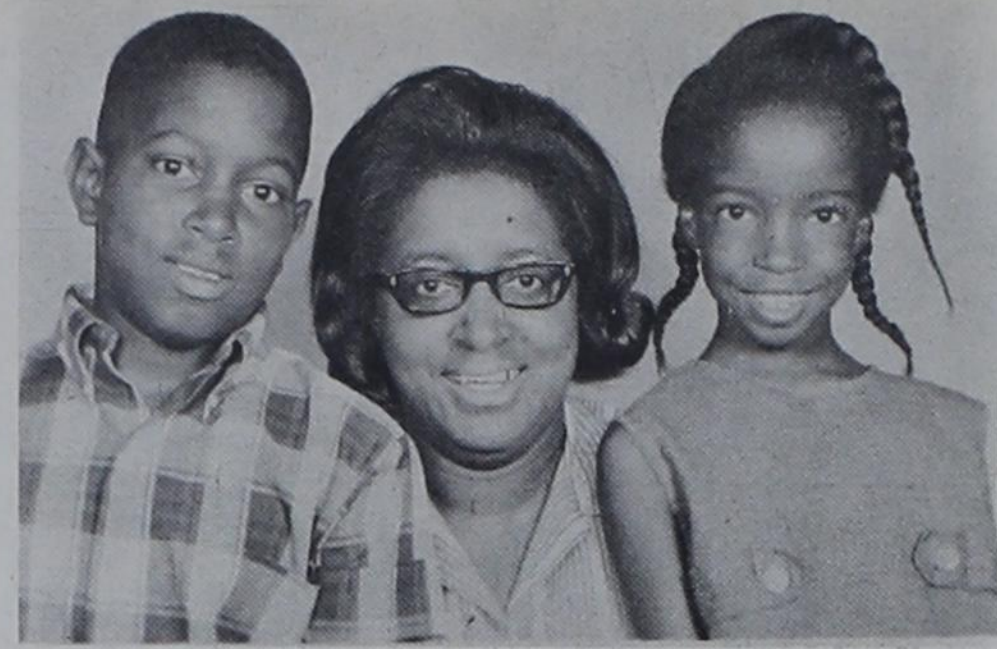
**BURGLARY**

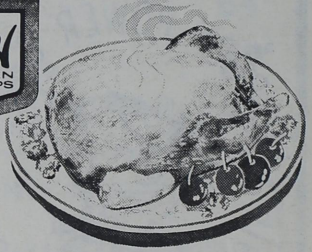

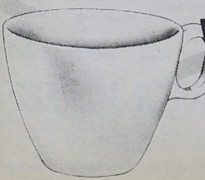
