Alabama Sending Big Contingent To Pythians Meet

Birmingham, Ala. (NPI)—With significant support—including the Chamber of Commerce of Birmingham area and the Mayor's Office--the Alabama Grand Lodge of Knights of Pythias is sending a strong delegation to the 44th biennial convention of the Supreme Lodge of Knights of Pythias to persuade the group to hold its 1969 session in Birmingham.

The K. of P. Supreme Lodge is meeting August 20-23 at the Emerson hotel, Baltimore, with Sir R.A. Hester, Dallas, Texas supreme chancellor, presiding.

Sir Dr. T.D. Mitchell, grand chancellor, Knights of Pythias of Alabama, is heading the 12-person delegation to the Supreme Lodge and its various departments-convention.

Other delegates include Sir S. S. Terry, Hueytown, vice-grand chancellor and Sir Ellis Jackson, grand inner guard, Evergreen, Alabama.

Delegates to the Imperial Temple of the Dramatic Order of Knights of Omar (D.O.K.O.) include Vol. George Pickens, deputy imperial potentate; Vol. Jimmy Hudson, board member and grand emir and Vol. John Dark, board member and grand mogul.

Sister Sally Moore, grand worthy counsellor, Grand Court Order of Calanthe and supreme register of deeds, is a delegate to the Supreme Court and Imperial Tent of the Princesses of Omar.

Other delegates are Sisters Hattie Smith, imperial princess; Mable Spence, imperial auditor; Lula B. Terry, Bessemer, grand princess; Virginia Pickens, grand princess and Ethel W. Smith, Mobile, grand impress.

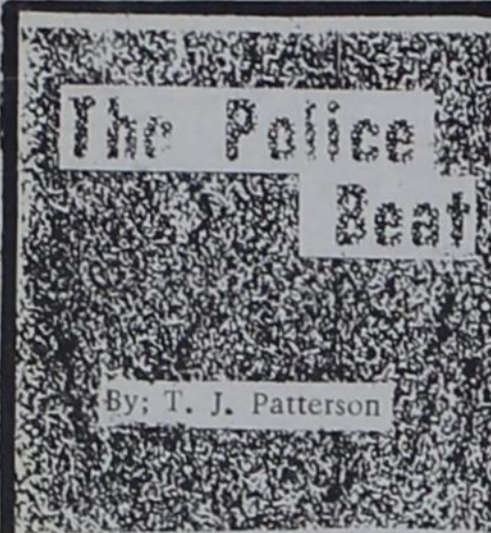

**Faulkner's Letter Reveals View That Negroes Must Lift Selves Up**

New York--(NPI)--The late Southern novelist William Faulkner felt that Negroes must pull themselves up by their own bootstraps, a recently disclosed letter written by him has shown.

The contents of the letter, written to Paul E. Pollard, Faulkner's one-time butler, were revealed by an official of Charles Hamilton Autographs, Inc., which bought the letter from Pollard for \$500.

In the letter, dated February 24, 1960, Faulkner refused a request by Pollard to make a contribution to the NAACP on the grounds that the organization favors actions which do Negroes harm.

Faulkner maintained, in his letter, that Negroes "must earn by being individually responsible to bear it, the freedom and equality they want and should have."

Since Negroes are in a minority, "they must behave better than white people," said the Nobel-Prize-winning author, who

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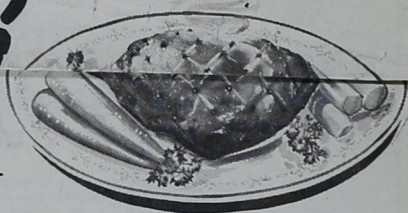

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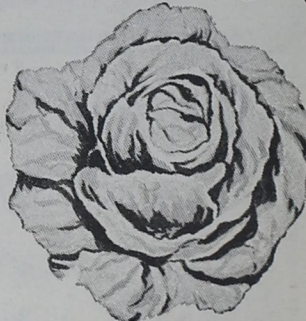
