
## ALLEY CLEANUP

According to the assistant superintendent of public works of Lubbock, Joel Locke, the city's alley cleanup program, which started on May 4, has been covering 81 blocks each work day and averaging 28 loads a day.

Locke admits that 1,448 blocks were cleaned in June, resulting in 493 truck loads of debris being carried away. The first cleanup started on May 4 and was completed in six weeks. The second o n e started on June 14 and was completed in five weeks. The current cleanup started July 20 and is expected to be completed in three or four weeks.

As many of you may recall, t h e City Council approved the accelerated alley cleanups, with a goal of cleaning and raking all alleys every 30 days. Prior to this action, the alleys had been cleaned and raked every three or four months. The council voted unanimously to appropriate \$110, 000 to conduct the speedup program on a five-month trail basis beginning in early May.


