#### **City Drivers Face Stiffer Court Fines**

Something new is taking place here!! You see for the first time in more than a decade, Lubbock drivers soon will be facing stiffer penalties for two common traffic offenses.

L a s t Saturday Corporation Court Judge Gene Blair announced t h a t effective July 3, motorists will be fined \$25 instead of \$10 for driving without a license on the first offense, and \$100 instead of \$25 for the second offense.

Another action of the court will be to increase speeding fines

If the violator obtains a valid license between the time the first offense ticket is issued and his appearance in court, which normally will vary from 10 to 30 days, the fine will be reduced to \$5. The second offense in such a a situation will be reduced to \$10.

According to Judge Blair, "This move is being made to encourage a 1 1 drivers to obtain a valid drivers license and to urge them to comply with the speed limits."



UNLAWFUL CARRYING OF WEAPONS

No person shall carry on or about his person any pistol, switchblade knife, throwing blade knife or a knife with a blade over 5 1/2inches in length or brass knuckless, black jack, hand chain, night stick, pipe stick, dirk, dagger, sling shot or sword cane.

The penalty is by fine not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00 or confinement in the County jail for not less than one Only \$11.00 is needed to put

\* DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY (VANDALISM)

It shall be unlawful for any person to wilfully injure or destroy or attempt to injure or destroy any property belonging to another of any kind whatsoever, without the consent of the owner, or lien holder.






