The convention is sponsored by the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society of Brooklyn, New York on behalf of Jehovah's Witnesses. The convention theme is "God's Sons of Liberty" District Assembly. An attendance of 30,000 is expected. All sessions will be held at the air-conditioned Market Hall in Dallas.

According to Mr. Outten, the Dallas gathering will be one of six to be held in the United States this summer. Other conventions are also scheduled throughout Canada, Mexico, Central and South America.

Preparations were set in motion by the local congregation to coordinate their plans with the convention department in Dallas. "An advance meeting was held Saturday, June 11th in Dallas", Mr. Outten said. Approximately 1500 were present to hear preliminary instructions relative to rooming accommodations. "We have our rooming accommodations forms", he said, "and will be working out details relative to transportation to and from the assembly in the near future."

NAACP MEETING SET HERE

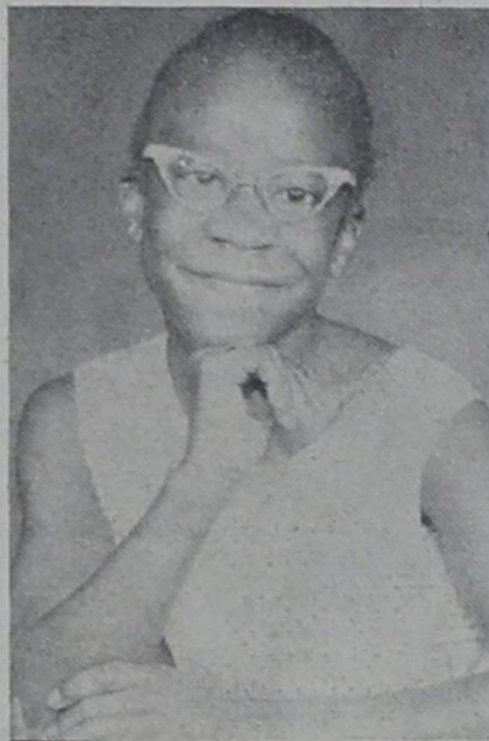
The local NAACP branch is presenting a "Freedom Fund" program and all the citizens of Lubbock are welcome to attend this religious affair, featuring local talent.

The Dreamliners will be warming up to defend the National title in the National Tournament in Wichita, Kansas starting August 12th. Your Good Health

Infectious diseases of all kinds rob your body of nitrogen, an essential element that is found in every living cell. The sole source of nitrogen in your body is the protein you eat, but if your diet is low in protein, or if you are poorly nourished, an infection will go hard with you.

It is a common observation that in any epidemic, the death toll is highest among the undernourished.

Nitrogen is lost from the body through the normal wearing out of the body cells and the elimination of the end products through the kidneys. Infections damage cells and thus increase the rate of cell destruction.

If an infection is complicated by a severe diarrhea, this further robs the body of nitrogen by sweeping proteins through the digestive tract so fast they are not digested and taken up in the blood.

In many infectious diseases, the appetite is poor and proteins are not replaced as fast as they are used up. When nutritional failure becomes acute through the factors mentioned, it may be necessary to give feedings directly into the veins.

Some well-meaning but misguided mothers give a sick member of the family a diet of easily digested sugars and starches. If no proteins are added, convalescence will be unnecessarily delayed.

Sugars and starches are stored in the liver and fat is stored in the adipose tissues, but the body has no way of storing the needed pro-

teins. They must be supplied every day in the diet.

When you become rundown, because of an infection, you are in double jeopardy because poor nutrition interferes with your ability to build up antibodies to counteract fresh infection.

When any member of the family gets an infection, you must increase your efforts to provide adequate protein nourishment.

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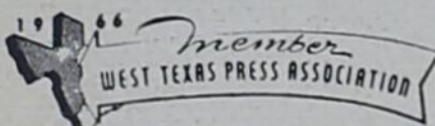

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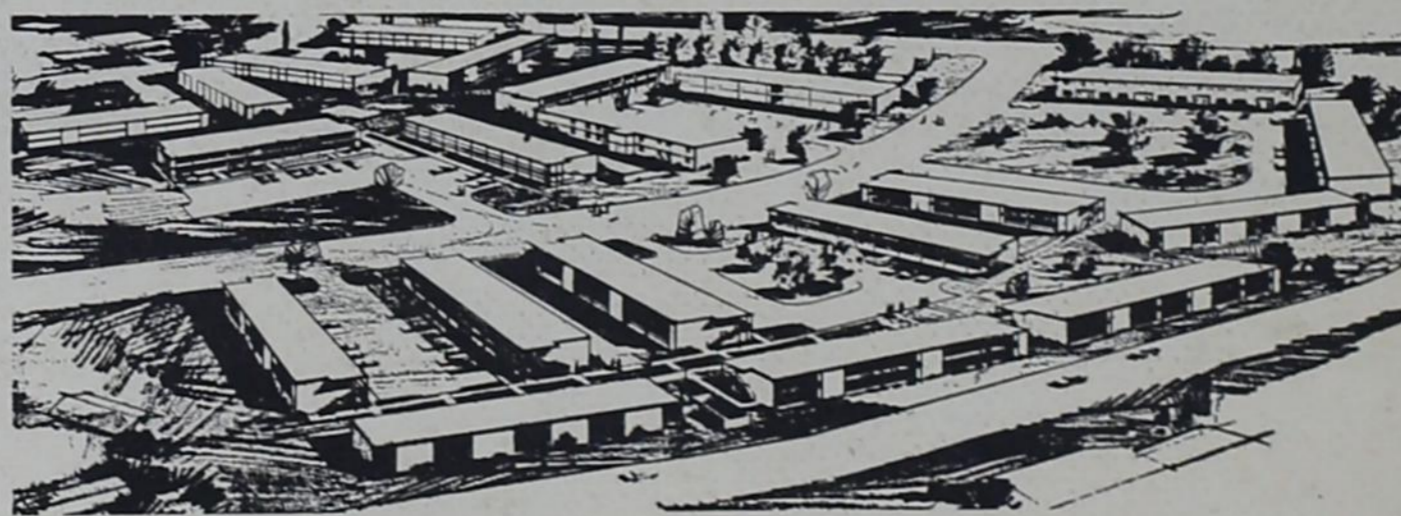
